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The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee of the North Carolina General Assembly requires the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) to provide a biennial report on the implementation of the Founding Principles Act. This report outlines the steps NCDPI has taken to support districts and schools with implementation of the requirements in this legislation since the submission of the last report in October 2019.

On June 23, 2011, the North Carolina General Assembly passed The Founding Principles Act (SL 2011-273) that directed local boards of education to require, as a condition of high school graduation, students to successfully complete a semester course, "American History I - The Founding Principles." Additionally, the Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) and local boards of education, as appropriate, were directed to provide "curriculum content" to support this course. Lastly, the Act directs the State Board of Education (SBE) to align "any curriculum-based tests developed and administered statewide" to include the content expressed in the Act.

In 2019, legislation was passed that directed DPI and the SBE to begin the revision process of the social studies standards. It also stipulated the creation of a new course called Founding Principles of the United States of America and North Carolina: Civic Literacy. The standards for the Founding Principles of the United States of America and North Carolina: Civic Literacy course were approved by the State Board of Education on February 4, 2021.

The North Carolina Standard Course of Study for Founding Principles of the United States of America and North Carolina: Civic Literacy course provides instructional alignment to the legislation. 2021 – 2023 Biennium

In July 2019, House Bill 924, which modifies the current legislation, was passed into law. Revision of the *K-12 Social Studies Standard Course of Study* took place during the 2019-2021 school years. The new standards were approved on February 4, 2021. NCDPI will provide ongoing professional development for teachers in civic education and will report on how all requirements are being met in the next biennial report due in October 2023.

There is no longer a state test for Founding Principles of the United States of America and North Carolina: Civic Literacy. Any assessments for this course are aligned with the standards and created locally.
