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Executive Summary


On October 29, 2018, SL 2018-136 created the North Carolina Office of Recovery and Resiliency (NCORR) and charged the Office with providing quarterly and annual reports on the state's recovery progress. This quarterly report outlines state-funded recovery activities from January 1, 2024- March 31, 2024. The report is organized into three sections, which include:


- 1. **Executive Summary**. A brief overview of current recovery needs and activities.
- 2. **Summary of State Funding for Disaster Relief**. Summary reports of state-funded programs, by state agencies and departments, and the progress made to support the state's recovery from recent events.
- 3. **Appendix**. A detailed expenditure report (Excel spreadsheet) summarizing the status of funds for each state-appropriated program, by agency.

Access to state funds for long-term recovery is critical for the ability of state and local responding entities to meet not only the immediate recovery needs of hurricane survivors, but also make it possible for individuals and communities to participate in federal programs. These funded programs are also demonstrating enhanced abilities for state and local partners to respond to immediate needs.

For example, as of this quarter the Department of Agriculture has completed all their projects for 2016-124 4.1 (10 a&b) and 2018-138 1.3 (3). Based on SL 2023-134, \$6,994,546.00 was recaptured on the projects for 2016 and 2018. The Department of Agriculture has submitted their final numbers for the projects listed as of the March 2024 quarter.

For example, NCORR continues to work with the local governments in monitoring and assisting with final closeout of the grants and loans program based on the Memorandum of Agreements.

Figure 2. Hurricane Florence Declared Counties







Figure 4. Hurricane Dorian Declared Counties



Hurricane Matthew (DR 4285) – As of this reporting period, Individual Assistance provided \$128,034,983.45 for housing and other needs assistance. The Public Assistance Program for Matthew has obligated \$411,701,899, towards repairing public facilities and infrastructure in declared communities, totaling 1864 projects.

HMGP is helping 756 property owners become more resilient against future disasters and has reimbursed \$31.2 million to local governments thus far. As of June 2023, there have been 51 projects and 395 properties completed. The CDBG-DR program has disbursed \$191,588,697 as of June 2023 which includes activities such as housing repairs, housing reconstructions, buyouts, small rental repairs, multi-family housing construction, and public infrastructure repairs.

Hurricane Florence (DR 4393) - At the end of this reporting period, in total, 139,814 North Carolinians received Individual Assistance, with over \$157,694,724.02 in funds disbursed for housing and other needs assistance. Public Assistance has worked with local partners to develop 2,687 projects with obligated totals of \$1,022,734,986.

For Florence, the FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) is the process of approving 970 projects in 57 counties. North Carolina was approved for an "expedited" Hazard Mitigation Program for Florence, which is currently being implemented. Through this expedited program, NCEM is acquiring 172 properties with 122 completed as of March 2023. As of June 2023, HMGP has reimbursed \$12.3 million. The CDBG-DR program has disbursed \$119.1 million including activities such as housing repairs, housing reconstructions, & small rental repairs.

Tropical Storm Michael (DR 4412) – The state is coordinating a more limited recovery program for Tropical Storm Michael, primarily focused on providing Public Assistance for infrastructure repair in declared communities. As of the end of the reporting period, 211 Public Assistance projects have been proposed for a total of \$24,964,708.

Hurricane Dorian (DR 4465) Making landfall on September 1, 2019, this storm resulted in significant damage to public buildings, infrastructure, businesses, and housing in a limited number of communities. In response, the state executed a state-funded Individual Assistance program in addition to the federally declared Public Assistance Program. \$970,758.71 has been expended in state Individual Assistance funds to assist local communities with 81 displaced households. These households have moved forward in their housing and are covered through LTRG, and IA. Individual Assistance has closed this disaster. The Public Assistance program has 494 projects with obligated totals of \$85,859,073.

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These programs, in addition to those led by the state partners contributing to this report, are helping to support the unmet needs of North Carolinians and local communities across the state.

Federal Programs

1. Individual Assistance

The mission of FEMA's Individual Assistance Program is to provide rapid help to individual disaster survivors with uninsured costs during a disaster response and immediate recovery. Individual Assistance can include providing temporary housing, lodging expenses, basic household expenses, and home repairs. In some cases, if the threshold for a federal IA disaster declaration is not met or there is an additional need for assistance, a state-funded Individual Assistance Program will provide and/or supplement federal assistance. State-funded Individual Assistance was administered by NC Emergency Management for several recent disasters.

The mission of FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program is assisting North Carolinians, communities, state agencies, local governments and businesses to become less vulnerable to the impacts of natural hazards through the effective administration of hazard mitigation grants, floodplain management, and a coordinated approach to mitigation policy through state, regional and local planning activities. Through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, FEMA provides federal disaster grant assistance for eligible mitigation projects related to residential structures and publicly owned facilities. The State has received 206 project awards of 262 project submissions to FEMA under all disasters listed above. There were 17 withdrawn projects by the counties after all projects were submitted to FEMA for consideration prior to any being awarded. Since being awarded, another 11 projects have been withdrawn by the counties. The counties have opted to do the contracting to complete 93 of the 200 projects awarded and the State is responsible for completing the remaining 113 projects under the State Centric Model. There are still 39 projects pending FEMA review and approval for DRs-4393, 4465, 4487, 4568, 4588 and 4617. There are 61 projects completed between the combined efforts of the State and counties. The State does not have any OPEN disasters at present.

Recent Activities for Current Reporting Period (January – March 2024)

Currently NCEM HM has no pending RFIs for any disaster projects submitted to FEMA for consideration. Received additional awards for projects that have cleared the RFI process, increasing our state's number of awarded projects for both DR-4393, DR-4412, DR-4465, DR-4543, DR-4568 and DR-4588. The Section continues to work on completing projects in all current disasters with 24 projects already programmatically closed by FEMA and another 15 waiting for FEMA's programmatic closure.

The funding from this Session Law within the Division of Energy, Mineral, and Land Resources was used to address five separate projects in response to Hurricane Matthew. The first project addressed issues at Salvo Cemetery that occurred as a direct cause by Hurricane Matthew. Severe erosion began to impact the Salvo Day Use Cemetery in Dare County. Dare County installed a 230 feet vinyl bulkhead and armor stone along the sound front edges. This project was completed in June 2018. Projects two and three included the planning and implementation of controlled emergency breaches of Woodlake Dam in Moore County and Gables Dam in Cumberland County to render them safe. Both dams were severely damaged as a result of Hurricane Matthew threatening the life, health, safety and property of the downstream public. Projects one through three are complete. Projects four and five can be classified as Safety and Resilience projects that include dam overtopping studies of over 200 dams in the Neuse River Basin and approximately 50 dams in the Lumber River Basin. These studies include hydrology and hydraulic modeling to determine likely storm sizes that could overtop the dams in the study population. This information allows the state and local governments to set priorities on responses to dams given limited personnel resources as well as monitor the need for dam modifications in the future. These two study projects are complete currently. This project with its tasks is complete.

Dam Overtopping Hydrology and Hydraulic (H&H) Study

The purpose of this study is to deliver hydrologic and hydraulic (H&H) computer modeling, modeling reports/results, and a database to house the data collected from the H&H studies for 210 dams housed in the Neuse River Basin and 51 dams in the Lumber River Basin. The data, reports, and models collected from these targeted dams (high hazard and larger impoundments) are generated and available for use by the North Carolina Emergency Management Emergency Operations Center (NCEM EOC), Division of Energy, Mineral, and Land Resources (DEMLR), US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Local Emergency Management services and other State & Local agencies. This information will provide more complete and accurate data that could be used for emergency flood response, such as the amount and intensity of precipitation that it would take to overtop dams. This data may also be used to prepare for extreme flooding events, emergency response during the events, advise dam owners to draw down water levels behind structures in advance to a storm event to help with flash flooding and flood control, and to alert emergency management personnel of potential hazards before and during events.

This study is part of a larger project that also includes digitizing all historical data and engineering documents supported by a geodatabase currently being constructed by the USACE for our DEMLR Dam Safety Program to further enhance information availability, improve emergency response and contribute to our overall State resilience efforts.

Summary of Work:

The study for both the Neuse Basin and Lumber Basin are complete. The Volume comprising the 210 dams in the Neuse Basin has been published for download by Local and State EM with the following Laserfiche Link.

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5 Emergency Watershed Protection Program Match – CLOSED – Final Update SL 2018-138 1.3 (6)

Division of Coastal Management

The Division of Coastal Management has been granted federal assistance under the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) program, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to restore damages caused by Hurricane Florence. The project focus is removal of destroyed docks, decks, bulkheads, displaced vessels, and other shoreline structures that resulted in widespread marine debris in coastal waterways and on public trust properties from Brunswick County north through Carteret. Debris removal was prioritized through field mapping conducted by NRCS with assistance from the Division. As of February 2, 2020, NRCS and the Division entered into an agreement that includes a total project budget of \$2,416,884.00. This includes \$543,120 in non-federal match. \$250,000 of this match is from the Florence Disaster Bill (SL2018-138) and the \$293,120 is from lapsed salary from the Department of Environmental Quality. Work began in July 2020 and by the end of the EWP project in September 2021, over 1,254,280 pounds of debris, not including weights of 24 abandoned storm-displaced vessels, had been removed from State owned and public lands and waters. Although the federal support for this project has ended, the project continued until December 31, 2021, with leftover match funds from SL2018-138.

8 Disaster Recovery for Coastal Reserves SL 2019-250 1.2 (9)

This appropriation supports disaster recovery at the DEQ Division of Coastal Management's N.C. Coastal Reserve sites, specifically, "repair, restoration, and related environmental disaster recovery activities." Summary of Activities

These funds were used as match for two competitive proposals to the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), and both proposals were funded for a total of \$1,855,860. DCM is partnering on this project with the N.C. Office of Recovery and Resiliency, N.C. Sea Grant, and The Nature Conservancy. DCM designed and launched the NC Resilient Coastal Communities Program (RCCP) in October 2020, which consists of four phases:

- Phase 1: Community Engagement and Risk & Vulnerability Assessment
- Phase 2: Planning, Project Selection and Prioritization
- Phase 3: Engineering and Design

• Phase 4: Implementation

- 10 contracts completed with 10 subgrantees to provide Phases 1 & 2 technical assistance to 26 communities. Work has been completed and final deliverables received including 26 Community Resilience Strategies containing more than 130 prioritized resilience projects.

Part II. Collaborative Resilience Planning and Engineering to Strengthen Ecosystems at the Rachel Carson Reserve

Summary of Activities

Planning for habitat resilience at the Rachel Carson Reserve has included the following activities:

- Coordinated a land manager's workshop to assess what natural resource managers are doing to address habitat resilience in eastern North Carolina.
- Identified primary environmental stressors and assessed the vulnerability of Rachel Carson Reserve habitats to those stressors.
- Held a collaborative workshop with partners to evaluate vulnerability information and identify what should be done to enhance habitat resilience.
- Based on workshop participant input, staff identified two shovel-ready projects to be engineered
 at the Rachel Carson Reserve. However, due to budget constraints, only one project was chosen
 for implementation at this time and NFWF was notified of this change.
- Engaged with the Town of Beaufort on its Resilient Communities Program (NFWF Part I).
- Produced a draft of the Rachel Carson Reserve Habitat Resilience Plan
- Established Task Orders with N.C. State University's Department of Biological and Agricultural Engineering for engineering services related to the two shovel-ready projects that were identified and Duke University for remote sensing data collection and change analysis at Rachel Carson to further inform the plan and engineering services.
- Established a contract with Kris Bass Engineering, through DEQ Facilities Services, to conduct a feasibility study for an on-the-ground project.
- Duke University completed deliverables and Kris Bass engineering completed field work and submitted a draft feasibility study report.

Recent Activities for Current Reporting Period (January 2024 – March 2024)

During the reporting period, Duke University completed and submitted their final report and datasets for drone mapping that included analysis of shoreline elevation and change, which informed the feasibility study. Kris Bass engineering completed the feasibility study field work

and produced a draft report.

5. Various Projects within DEQ – DEMLR

SL 2019-224 2.1 (3)

This project is a continuation of our two Safety and Resilience projects that were initiated under SL 2016-124 4.1 (9). In those projects, the DEMLR Dam Safety Program developed hydrology and hydraulic models to determine storm sizes (the amount of rain) that would cause ~261 dams in the Neuse and Lumber River Basins to overtop. Dam overtopping is a sign of inadequate spillway capacity but more importantly is a characteristic of dams in stress which could lead to failure of the dam. This project continued this overall study effort into the Cape Fear River Basin. The information gained in this study will allow State and Local governments to set priorities on responses to dams given limited personnel resources as well as monitor the need for dam modifications in the future. The two studies funded under SL 2016-124 4.1 (9) have been completed and that reporting is closed for SL 2016-124 4.1(9). DEMLR Dam Safety has completed the existing projects and contracts under SL 2019-224 2.1(3) and has published those reports in Laserfiche with notification provided to NCEM for access as needed by State and Local EM for the Cape Fear River Basin study of 326 dams. We are currently planning an additional project to spend the remainder of the unobligated balance on an extended scope of this same project within further Hurricane Florence affected/impacted areas and developing a risk analysis system tied into our GIS system for ease of use and access by emergency response agencies.

 - 1. This last phase of this project took approximately 24 months and started in January 2021. This work involved surveying of dams, implementation of the study model and contracting with Engineering Firms to assist in developing the dam models. This project took place much quicker on a time per dam basis than with the initial projects in the Neuse and Lumber basins due to taking advantage of the process initially developed by that project. However, we were slowed substantially due to unavoidable vacancies in the Dam Safety Program. We do anticipate leveraging cost savings from the engineering service firms to expand this study into other impacted river basin areas impacted by Hurricane Florence.
 - 2. It is also anticipated that the Probable Maximum Precipitation Study, if it cannot be funded by NCORR through Federal HUD grants, will take as long as 18-24 months due to the size of the project and with coordinating with capturing cost savings by teaming with the State of South Carolina in developing the study for both States. At this time, we have been notified that NCORR will be able to use HUD funding for the PMP study. Once verified, we will re-apply DR funding to further expansion of our H&H studies.
- b. Amount and % spent/obligated on administrative activities by Program. This work was performed by DEQ with three Time Limited Staff, existing staff, and Contracted engineering firms. It is anticipated that less than 5% of the total project costs will go to administrative activities.

As of March 2024, the continuing action plan is to determine the best use of the remaining funds as related to Dam Safety Program needs in North Carolina. This federally authorized program is to provide emergency medical care to individuals affected by public health emergencies and catastrophic events that overwhelm the response capacity of state and local emergency medical systems. EPAP is activated as a cost-sharing program. The state requesting EPAP activation submits to FEMA a Mission Assignment request for EPAP activation and agree to the pay 25% of the total cost for EPAP activation.

FEMA views the EPAP as a program for immediately after the disaster in the impacted areas before they are set up and to provide assistance. 1. School Nutrition Employee Compensation

SL 2018-134, subsection 4.1(1)

Session law provided financial accommodations for extraordinary circumstances due to Hurricane Florence. Federal cash reimbursement for nutritious meals served to students as part of the instructional day accounts for the majority of revenues required to operate the school nutrition programs in local education agencies (LEAs) in NC. When unanticipated school closures prevent meal service to students, there is no basis for LEAs to claim cash reimbursement payments. LEAs rely on the reimbursement of Federal School Nutrition funds to support the local operation of their School Nutrition Programs. Without Federal cash reimbursements for meals served, there are no State or local funds to support the salaries/benefits of School Nutrition personnel. These funds were used to compensate School Nutrition employees who would have otherwise not been compensated.

2. Capital Recovery Funds

SL 2018-136, subsection 6.1.(6), SL 2018-138 subsections 1.3(1) and 1.3(2)

Session law provided an appropriation to support immediate disaster recovery efforts for the repair and renovation of facilities and the repair and/or replacement damaged furnishings and equipment as a result of the damage caused by Hurricane Florence in Local Administrative Agencies (LEAs). Documentation was required to substantiate the issuance of funds. All LEAs were required to take reasonable steps to obtain alternative funds to cover damages; where insurance funds or alternative funds were recovered, LEAs are required to return the recovered funds to the appropriate funding source.

Session law provided \$1,700,000 to the Department of Public Instruction as a directed grant to Hyde County for repairs to the Ocracoke School necessitated by Hurricane Dorian. These funds were transferred in full to Hyde County.

Summary of Activities

All the funds will be used for Fort Fisher Renovations and Expansion project. It is a \$25M-30M project. This \$5M will be used towards the design and/or construction of the project. While we work through the design process of the larger project, we are knocking out some high priority smaller repairs/renovations now with this funding that we feel cannot wait until the larger project is approved.

We have a current remaining balance of approximately \$2,760,172. Of that amount, approximately \$2,601,741 has been obligated to various projects, leaving a current unobligated balance of approximately \$158,431. An approximate breakdown of the current obligations is as follows: \$2,310,106 towards the design agreement for the large expansion / renovation project, \$127,135 for testing (Geotech and Hazardous Material Assessment) and surveying for the large expansion / renovation project, \$55,818 for HVAC repairs,

\$55,500 for repairs to concrete beams and columns, \$51,532 for electrical repairs, and \$1,650 associated with the low slope roof replacement.

Large Expansion / Renovation Project

Major renovation and expansion for the aquarium - Fort Fisher was last renovated in 2000 and needs major renovations for an updated look, better traffic flow, and more interesting, upgraded exhibits. This project would create new exhibits, with associated life support systems, as well as enlarge or enhance the existing gallery space. This would improve and augment visitor experiences, increase attendance (attract new visitors and encourage repeat visitation), and generate additional revenue. The new exhibits would create a more immersive experience for visitors with fish, animals, and birds. – Currently at 30% design development phase and we have the CMAR under agreement for Preconstruction Services (under separate fund). The first phase of the Geotechnical exploration is wrapping up, the Hazardous Materials Assessment is nearing completion, and the updated survey has been sent out for review.

HVAC Repair Project

- 1 Replacement of AHU 1-96, AHU-10 & CU 1-96 The Aquarium at Fort Fisher needs a project to replace two Air Handler Units and associated Condenser. All units are over 10 years old, heavily corroded, and are beginning to fail. Repair is not a feasible option at this point. completed and accepted by the State Construction Office.
- 2 Replacement of AHU-12, AHU-6B, AHU-14, and CU-6B The Aquarium needs a project to replace AHU-12 due to age, condition (corrosion, rusting, etc.), and susceptibility to failure. Repair is not a feasible option currently. Additionally, replacement of AHU-6B and CU-6B needs to occur for similar reasons and will be included in this project. in construction (anticipate SCO acceptance in April).

Electrical Repair Project

generator to remain active when normal power is restored. This is a potential life safety issue. – on hold with work expected to be incorporated into major expansion / renovation.

2 - The Buss Duct that runs across the saltwater area back of house has sustained significant corrosion and damage over the years and needs replacement. This project will replace the existing buss duct and relocate it, so it does not go over open water tanks. — completed and accepted by State Construction Office

Roof Repair Project

1 - Repair work on the Fort Fisher Aquarium roof includes removal of approximately 3,500-SF of loose gravel, cleaning the surface, installing emulsion coating, reinstalling gravel, repairing edging, and flashing. – completed

2 - Low Slope Roof Replacement includes removal of approximately 45,000 square feet of existing roofing, repairing underlying damage, and installing a new low slope roof. – Completed and accepted by SCO. Awaiting final invoice to be paid.

Structural Project

Repair concrete beam and column that has spalled. – in design

These funds will be used to supplement an existing project that is in the very early phases of design. This \$5M will be used towards the design and/or construction of the project. We are easily at least two years out before starting construction.

Grant-in-aid funds from the local government units were processed as requested during the quarter. During this reporting period, the Town of Fair Bluff's uptown commercial building (Business Development Center) continues to progress and is on track to be completed before the end date of the grant on June 30, 2024 (see photos below). Property Acquisition and hazardous materials abatement of abandoned commercial buildings on Main Street are making progress.

The Town of Princeville is continuing to work towards multiple disaster recovery milestones including but not limited to performance of service contracts for financial record-keeping, auditing, <u>Farmer's Market construction project</u>, and its largest disaster recovery project on the 53acre site.

The design/environmental phase of the 53-acre infrastructure project was completed by mid-January 2024. The total project funding for the 53-acre infrastructure project consists of: (1) \$2.8 million from Princeville's State directed grant (\$1,335,000 for design and \$1,465,00 for construction (inclusive of Princeville's \$1.2 million cost share obligation for its BRIC grant)); (2) HUD's CDGB-Infrastructure \$3.15 million grant; and FEMA's \$12 million Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities ("BRIC") grant (FEMA \$10 million and Princeville \$1.2 million to be paid with State directed grant funds). In January 2024, FEMA started the process to close out BRIC Grant Project 1 (design) and to approve Project 2 (construction). Notwithstanding the ongoing FEMA BRIC approval processes, the Town and the North Carolina Office of Recovery and Resiliency put the 53-acre project out for bids in January, and bids were opened on March 12, 2024. The Town, State, FEMA, and HUD may be able to award a construction contract before all bids expire on June 10, 2024.

\$100,000 of directed grant funds were obligated for a land acquisition or condemnation action that will allow Princeville to acquire title to a lot adjacent to the 53-acre site that is needed to connect the county's water system to the 53-acre site. The owner of the lot had previously rejected Princeville's offer(s) to purchase. Princeville has hired an attorney to handle this land acquisition. The Town's condemnation attorney is in the process of obtaining a new appraisal before issuing a new offer and notice of taking.

The engineering and construction for the Farmers Market site work was substantially completed in the third quarter. The design of the Farmers Market Building was substantially completed during the third quarter and the Building Project can be put out for bids and construction contract awarded before the end of the fourth quarter. All other Princeville disaster recovery projects have been completed, will be completed, and/or funds expended before June 30, 2024.

No change reported by the Town of Mount Olive on its wastewater treatment improvement projects, and the Town, Engineer, Contractor, and state regulators are still working on closing the project and related permits.

The City of Greensboro continues to complete and close tornado housing recovery projects with its non-profit partners in addition to abating and demolishing a school which was condemned due to tornado damage. The city began closing out of its grant project and submitting requests for reimbursements for completed construction projects. The grant should be closed out by the end of this fiscal year.

A total of \$23 million in grant awards have been committed or obligated to assist 10 severely impacted counties or communities by providing them with critical and pressing needs grants. In 2019 and 2020, a first group of grants were awarded to Brunswick, Craven, Duplin, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Robeson and Scotland Counties, and the City of Lumberton for housing recovery projects that addressed the most severe hardship cases involving low to moderate income, elderly, and/or disabled homeowners who were living in unsafe, unsanitary housing that pose urgent safety or public health risk due to mold, potential structural failure, fire safety, and/or lack of potable water. These grants were also used for mitigation reconstruction and acquisition activities. A total of \$5.8 million in nonprofit grant awards were provided to: Habitat for Humanity affiliates in eastern North Carolina; Wilmington Area Rebuilding Mission (WARM) (\$1 million grant); Baptists on Mission (\$1 million grant); and United Methodists (\$1 million grant) to support emergency housing repairs, mitigation reconstruction and acquisition activities that will benefit hurricane displaced families. The original grants to the Counties have been substantially closed out with the last buyout demolition scheduled for completion in early 2024.

On March 7, 2023, N.C. Department of Public Safety disbursed to OSBM-DR \$3,318,657.00 for additional Hurricane Florence housing recovery projects ("Phase 2"). Thereafter, OSBMDR disbursed awarded Phase 2 Disaster Recovery Act grants to non-profit volunteer organizations active in disasters (VOADs) and obligated funds for OSBM-DR delivered projects totaling \$2,400,000 for approximately 25 to 32 consisting of 13 new home reconstructions, 4 repairs, and 8 to 15 roof repairs for projects that may be in Beaufort, Bladen, Brunswick, Craven, Cumberland, Duplin, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Robeson, Scotland, and Sampson Counties. Grants were provided to three Baptists on Mission (BOM) affiliates, Fayetteville Area Habitat for Humanity (FAHFH), Scotland Habitat for Humanity, and Wilmington Area Rebuilding Ministry (WARM).

In December 2017 or early 2018, thirteen (13) Disaster Recovery Act grants were awarded to counties for Hurricane Matthew recovery for State housing recovery and hazard mitigation. Prior to the beginning of this quarter, OSBM-DR has expended on behalf of N.C. Division of Emergency Management \$12,722,575.91 and completed 164 housing recovery projects prior to the start of this quarter.

On or about May 31, 2023, N.C. Division of Emergency Management disbursed the balance of the subject appropriation of \$2,671,775.24 to OSBM-DR after deducting project costs and expenses incurred in fiscal years 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, and 2022 that totaled \$4,605,648.85.
