This publication sets before you the actions of the 1993 General Assembly with respect to the legislative recommendations from the Legislative Research Commission's committees. This summary does not address state agencies' responses, if any, to recommendations for administrative action.

In brief, all of the bills recommended by the 1991-92 LRC's committees were introduced in the 1993 General Assembly. Of the introduced legislation, 57.3% were ratified in some form.

The LRC proposals, initiated as a result of the first year's work of the 1993-94 LRC study committees and introduced in the 1994 "Short Session", had a success rate of 63.2%. Thus, the success rate for all LRC bills introduced during the 1993 General Assembly from the 1991-92 LRC biennium and the first year of the 1993-94 LRC biennium totalled 58.1%.

This compares to a success rate, during the 1993 General Assembly, of 39.5% for public bills, generally. Local legislation is not reckoned in these figures in that local bills usually receive little opposition and the Legislative Research Commission usually does not concern itself with those purely local matters.

The comparable figures for the 1991 General Assembly are a 63% success rate for introduced LRC initiatives against a 37.8% success rate for public bills generally.

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INTRODUCTION

The North Carolina Legislative Research Commission, as an interim study organization of the General Assembly, studies issues as directed by the preceding legislative session of the Commission Chairmen. These studies are done by assigned interim study committees. Study committees may find that legislation is necessary to address the needs found. These committees endorse various draft bills; the complete text of these bills may be found in the individual interim study committee reports. The purpose of this report is to indicate the results of the legislative recommendations of the committees which were to report to the 1993 General Assembly.

In the "Activity Summaries by Study" section, legislative recommendations are grouped by committee. The recommendations are further divided into those bills which were not introduced and those which were introduced. Bills introduced and ratified are designated by **bold faced type**. Bills which were introduced and not ratified carry no special type of designation.

While the text of each introduced bill is the same as the text of each study committee recommendation, the text of the ratified bill may differ from the study committee recommendation. When companion bills were introduced in both houses based on single study committee recommendations, the companion bills are counted as one bill for statistical purposes. If one bill was ratified and one was not, this counts as one ratification; similarly, if neither bill was ratified, this counts as one unratified bill. Studies contained in the Studies Bill of 1993 (HB 1319) passed by both houses in 1993 but unratified that year were authorized by the cochairmen of the Legislative Research Commission pursuant to their authority, and are therefore treated as having been ratified.

In the "Statistics" section of this report the numbers of bills recommended; recommended but not introduced; recommended and introduced; ratified; and not ratified are listed by study committee, then totaled. The 1991-92 Legislative Research Commission study committees recommended 110 bills to the 1993 Session. Of the 110 bills recommended, 100% (110 of 110) of the bills were actually introduced. Of the introduced bills, 57.3% (63 of 110) were ratified in some form.

Also, the 1993-94 LRC Committees could make recommendations in their interim reports to the 1994 Session and 19 bills were introduced from these Committees. Of these 19 bills, 12 bills were ratified giving a success rate of 63.2%. When we look at all the LRC bills, from both the 1991-92 and 1993-94 Committees, we see that a total of 129 bills were introduced and 75 were ratified. The success rate for all LRC bills introduced during the 1993 Session of the General Assembly was 58.1% as compared to a success rate of 39.5% for public bills.

In comparison with the 1993 General Assembly, the success rate for all LRC bills introduced during the 1991 General Assembly was 63%. A total of 149 bills were introduced from both the 1989-90 and 1991-92 study committees and 94 were ratified. The success rate for public bills introduced during the 1991 General Assembly was 37.8%.

The 58.1% ratification rate for all bills introduced by LRC study committees is higher than the 39.5% ratification rate of public bills. During the 1993 and 1994 legislative sessions, a total of 3847 bills and joint resolutions were introduced, not including simple resolutions. During the same period, 819 bills and resolutions were actually ratified. The success rate for public bills is obtained by first finding the total number of public bills. The total number of public bills is obtained by subtracting the total number of local substantive and appropriations bills from the total number of bills and joint resolutions. To this number, we add the 79 bills, which although not ratified, were incorporated by reference in the umbrella studies. For the 1993 and 1994 legislative sessions, 2287 public bills were introduced. Of those, 904 public bills were ratified or incorporated by reference. When 904 is divided by 2287, the result is a success rate of 39.5%.
