

The Public Health Study Commission met 1 time during the 2008-2009 interim. The Public Health Study Commission heard from the individuals listed below during the meeting.

## December 12, 2008

- Dr. Ed Baker, Director, North Carolina Institute of Public Health, presented an overview of Public Health Incubator Collaboratives in North Carolina.
- Dr. Leah Devlin, State Health Director, Division of Public Health (DPH), spoke to the Commission on the public health system and the recommended priorities for the future.
- Dr. Rosemary Summers, Orange County Health Director, discussed recommendations to strengthen public health infrastructure.
- Dr. Marcus Plescia, Chronic Disease and Injury Section Chief, DPH, reported on childhood obesity and diabetes prevention.
- Dr. Jeff Engle, Epidemiology Section Chief, DPH presented information on HIV bridge counselors for the correction system and Chlamydia testing in males.
- Dr. Kevin Ryan, Women's and Children's Health Section Chief, DPH, reported on health issues for women and children. Priorities in this area included school health, early intervention, and infant mortality.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

### Chairs: Senator William Purcell, MD Representative Bob England, MD

#### **RECOMMENDATION 1:**

The Public Health Study Commission recommends that the General Assembly enact legislation to appropriate funds from the General Fund to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, to implement high priority initiatives within the North Carolina Public Health Improvement Plan, Public Health Task Force 2008 Final Report. Funds appropriated should be used to supplement and not supplant existing State, federal, county, or other funds allocated for the following identified purposes: build local health department capacity to provide the 10 essential public health services, implement the State's obesity prevention plan, hire counselors for HIV-positive inmates released from State prisons, hire additional school nurses, expand utilization of 17-Alpha Hydroxy Progesterone Caproate among low income women to reduce recurrent pre-term births, expand state initiatives addressing SIDS, provide universal childhood vaccines to all children in the State, continue screening public awareness, and other preventive efforts of the Diabetes and Kidney Programs, support the State's smoking cessation help line, and fund and further support the operations of the Stroke Advisory Council.

### **RECOMMENDATION 2:**

The Public Health Study Commission recommends that the General Assembly amend Chapter 130A of the General Statutes to create a new Article 5A establishing an Office of Men's Health within the Department of Health and Human Services to expand the State's public health concerns and focus to include a comprehensive outlook on the overall health status of men.

1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 2 AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO IMPLEMENT HIGH PRIORITY PUBLIC HEALTH INITIATIVES, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE PUBLIC HEALTH 3 4 STUDY COMMISSION. 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 6 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, the sum of 7 8 thirty-five million five hundred sixty-seven thousand five dollars (\$36,567,005) for the 9 2009-2010 fiscal year, and thirty-one million one hundred forty-five thousand nine hundred seventy-two dollars (\$31,145,972) for the 2010-2011 fiscal year. 10 Funds appropriated by this act shall be used to supplement and not supplant existing State, 11 federal, county, or other funds allocated for the identified purpose. These funds shall be 12 13 used to implement high priority initiatives of the Public Health Study Commission, and shall be allocated by the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public 14 15 Health, in the following amounts for the purposes indicated: \$18,200,000 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$18,200,000 in the 2010-(1)16 2011 fiscal year for noncategorical General Aid to County funds to build capacity for 17 the 10 essential public health services in local health departments statewide. 18 \$3,829,454 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$3,829,454 in the 2010-19 (2)20 2011 fiscal year for Childhood Obesity Prevention to continue funding interventions in preschools, schools, communities, faith organizations, and healthcare settings that 21 promote and support physical activity and healthy eating; and continue funding worksite 22 chronic disease/obesity prevention programs for State employees. 23 24 (3) \$209,138 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$199,304 in the 2010-2011 25 fiscal year for counselors for HIV-positive inmates released from State prisons to ensure that they are referred to HIV provider agencies for case management. 26

1 (4) \$5,000,000 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$5,000,000 in the 2010-2 2011 fiscal year to hire 83 additional school nurses to work toward the goal of 3 achieving a Statewide school nurse to student ratio of 1:750.

4 (5) \$247,000 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$247,000 in the 2010-2011 5 fiscal year to improve birth outcomes by expanding utilization of 17-Alpha Hydroxy 6 Progesterone Caproate for low income women to reduce recurrent pre-term births; and 7 by expanding and strengthening current statewide initiatives addressing SIDS risk 8 reduction, Safe Sleep, and secondhand smoke exposure for women of reproductive age 9 and their families.

10 (6) \$709,296 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$1,418,592 in the 2010-2011 11 fiscal year to maintain compliance with the Centers for Disease Control and 12 Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices in providing protection for 13 children against influenza as part of the State's universal immunization program.

(7) \$86,756 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$86,756 in the 2010-2011 fiscal
year to continue screening, public awareness, and other preventive efforts of the
Diabetes and Kidney Programs.

(8) \$6,883,179 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$1,815,684 in the 2010-2011
fiscal year to hold the Early Intervention Program harmless for the loss of revenues
associated with the rate reduction of Targeted Case Management services.

(9) \$352,182 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$349,182 in the 2010-2011
fiscal year for gonorrhea/chlamydia testing among men in local health department
Sexually Transmitted Disease clinics.

(10) \$1,000,000 in the 2009-2010 fiscal year for operation of the North
 Carolina Tobacco Quitline. These funds shall be used to maximize funding from the
 State alliance project being underwritten by the American Legacy Foundation to
 promote tobacco-use cessation for adults.

(11) \$50,000 for the 2009-2010 fiscal year to support further operation of the
Stroke Advisory Council so that the Council may continue to identify and address the
issues needed to establish a coordinated system of stroke care for the State and to
improve stroke care provided in the State.

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**SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2009.

2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE OFFICE OF MEN'S HEALTH, WITHIN THE
3	DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES, AS RECOMMENDED
4	BY THE PUBLIC HEALTH STUDY COMMISSION.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	<b>SECTION 1.</b> Chapter 130A of the General Statutes is amended by adding
7	the following new Article to read:
8	" <u>Article 5A.</u>
9	" <u>Men's Health.</u>
10	" <u>§ 130A-131.26. Office of Men's Health established.</u>
11	(a) There is established in the Department the Office of Men's Health. The
12	purpose of the office is to expand the State's public health concerns and focus to include
13	a comprehensive outlook on the overall health status of men. The primary goals of the
14	Office shall be the prevention of disease and improvement in the quality of life for men
15	over their entire lifespan. The Department shall develop strategies for achieving these
16	goals which shall include, but not be limited to:
17	(1) Developing a strategic plan to improve public services and programs
18	targeting men;
19	(2) Conducting policy analyses on specific issues related to men's health;
20	(3) Facilitating communication among the Department's programs and
21	between the Department and external men's health groups and
22	community-based organizations;
23	(4) Building public health awareness and capacity regarding men's health
24	issues by providing a series of services including evaluation,
25	recommendation, technical assistance, and training; and

1		(5) Developing initiatives for modification or expansion of health services
2		oriented towards men's health issues with the intent of establishing
3		meaningful public/private partnerships in the future.
4	<u>(b)</u>	The Office shall study the feasibility of establishing initiatives for:
5		(1) Early intervention services for men infected with HIV; and
6		(2) Outreach, treatment, and follow-up services to men at high risk for
7		contracting sexually transmitted diseases.
8	In condu	ting the study, the Department shall take into consideration related services
9	<u>already i</u>	place in the Department and at the local level."
10		SECTION 2. The Department of Health and Human Services shall use funds
11	available	for the 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 fiscal years to implement this act.
12		<b>SECTION 3.</b> This act becomes effective July 1, 2009.
