

 - Limit the types of non-state entities eligible for permanent license plates

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Permanent Silver License Plates





Silver License Plates


- N.C. Gen. Stat. § 20-84(b)(2)-(16) authorizes permanent plates for various non-State entities
- Requirements to obtain a silver license plate
 - Proof of ownership that meets the statutory eligibility
 - Proof of financial responsibility
 - Pay \$6 registration fee

Total Silver License Plates 120,461

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Silver License Plates by Registering Entity



Issues with Silver License Plates

- The Program Evaluation Division identified 4,218 silver license plates belonging to entities not listed in statute
- The Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee requested DMV identify entities receiving unauthorized silver license plates

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Division of Motor Vehicles' Review of Silver License Plates





Review of Silver License Plates

- Over 1,000 of the 4,218 silver license plates were properly issued
 - 625 registered to entities listed in N.C. Gen. Stat. § 20-84
 - 412 registered to telephone membership corporations
- N.C. Gen. Stat. § 117-33 makes telephone membership corporations eligible for silver license plates

Obstacles to DMV Oversight

- Difficult to ensure non-state entities use a vehicle exclusively for the purpose specified in law
 - Vehicle used for disaster relief by individual or chapter of the American Red Cross
 - Trailers owned by charitable organizations and used for parades

Obstacles to DMV Oversight

- Difficult to determine whether certain nonstate entities still exist
 - Sheltered workshops
 - REACT Teams
- Statutes do not clarify that community colleges should be eligible

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Recommendations







Recommendation 1

General Assembly should consider limiting eligibility for permanent license plates to government entities and reviewing the basis for issuing permanent license plates to non-governmental entities



Consider Limiting the Eligibility for Permanent License Plates

- Limit eligibility to government entities
 - State agencies and institutions
 - Counties, cities, or towns
 - Local boards of education
 - Local community colleges
- Review basis for issuing permanent license plates to non-government entities
 - Serves a public purpose
 - Provides government services
 - Defined in state law

Consider Limiting Eligibility for Permanent License Plates

- Potentially eliminate over 24,000 permanent license plates
- Ineligible entities will need to apply for a license plate with an annual registration renewal
- State could generate up to \$650,000 in annual registration fees



Recommendation 2

General Assembly should direct the Division of Motor Vehicles to cancel all permanent plates registered to non-state entities and re-issue permanent license plates to qualifying non-state entities



Re-issue Permanent License Plates to Non-State Entities

- Cancel all existing silver license plates
- Re-issue permanent license plates to eligible non-State entities by January 15, 2013
- Cost to manufacture new license plate is covered by the \$6 registration fee

Recommendation 3

General Assembly should require that all permanent license plates be registered in the name of eligible entity and require entities to use a standard naming convention



Registering Permanent License Plates

- Permanent license plates should be registered to an organization, not an individual
- Eligible entities should use a standard naming convention
 - Recommendation from the first report on stateowned vehicles, Inadequate Data and Fleet Information Management Weaken Accountability for North Carolina's Vehicles

Recommendation 4

General Assembly should authorize the Division of Motor Vehicles to revoke permanent license plates registered to non-state entities that fail to obtain an annual vehicle inspection



Strengthen DMV Authority

- DMV has authority to revoke license plates for non-compliance with liability insurance
- Additional authority will ensure vehicles with permanent license plates comply with required vehicle inspection





Summary

- Statutory changes are needed to limit eligibility of permanent license plates and strengthen oversight
- General Assembly should
 - consider limiting permanent plates to governmental entities
 - review the basis of eligibility for non-governmental entities
 - direct DMV to cancel existing silver license plates and re-issue permanent license plates
 - revise statutes to require use of a standard naming convention
 - grant additional oversight authority to DMV




Legislative Options
