2 AN ACT TO DEFINE AND REGULATE CERTAIN ACTIVITIES OF NONGOVERNMENTAL HOME INSPECTORS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

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Section 1. Chapter 87 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Article to read:

"ARTICLE 9.
"HOME INSPECTORS.

"§ 87-115. Home inspector defined; exception.

For the purpose of this Article, any person, firm, or corporation who for any fee, wage, fixed price, or any other form of compensation undertakes to inspect or examine the manner of construction, workmanship, and materials for construction of any residential structure which is required to conform to the North Carolina State Building Code is a 'home inspector.' A person employed by the State of North Carolina or any political subdivision thereof as a code enforcement official and who is certified pursuant to Article 9C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes is not a home inspector and is not subject to the provisions of this Article.

"§ 87-116. Certain home inspection activities regulated.

(a) Before any home inspector provides to any person any opinion on whether the manner of construction, workmanship, or materials for construction of any residential structure in this State either conforms to or is in variance with the North Carolina State Building Code, such home inspector shall be currently licensed to practice as:

4	<u>(2)</u>	A plumbing or heating contractor, licensed under Article 2 of this

7	<u>(3)</u>	An electrical contractor, licensed under Article 4 of this Chapter, if the
8		opinion relates to electrical requirements imposed by the North
9		Carolina State Building Code.
