## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- AN ACT TO REQUIRE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES TO CONDUCT
  A COMPREHENSIVE STUDY OF THE DIVISION OF YOUTH SERVICES'
- 4 JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM.
- 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. (a) The Department of Human Resources shall 6 conduct a comprehensive study of the Division of Youth Services' juvenile justice system in order 7 to ensure the efficacy, cost-effectiveness, and optimal utilization of the system and its 8 continuum of services. The Department may contract with an independent consultant to 9 The Administrative Office of the Courts, the Department of 10 assist it in its study. Correction, and any other State or local agencies the Department considers have a role 11 in the juvenile justice system shall cooperate with the Department in its study. 12

The Department shall convene an advisory panel to assist it in its study. This panel shall consist of the Administrative Officer of the Courts, as many juvenile court judges as the Department considers necessary, three Senators recommended by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, three Representatives recommended by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and any others the Department considers necessary.

19 Members of this advisory panel shall receive the subsistence and travel 20 expenses set forth in Chapter 120 and Chapter 138 of the General Statutes, as 21 appropriate.

22 (b) This study shall include:

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1	(1)	An analysis, including an assessment of safety risks to community and

3	(2)	An assessment of adult and juvenile recidivism rates of recent training
4	(2)	school residents;
5	(3)	An analysis of the cost and success of dispositions of juvenile
6	$(\mathbf{J})$	offenders who are placed on probation or assigned to other programs;
7	(4)	An evaluation of the Community-Based Alternative Program;
8	(5)	An assessment of the juvenile offender systems and programs used in
9	$(\mathbf{c})$	other states;
10	(6)	The development of an early warning system by which potential
11		youthful offenders are identified at a very early age so that intervention
12		can be made to prevent adverse outcomes;
13	(7)	An evaluation of vocational education in the training schools;
14	(8)	An analysis of other services and treatments offered in training
15		schools;
16	(9)	Alternatives to detention and to training schools;
17	(10)	Proposals for appropriate reforms of the current dispositional system
18		that will help juvenile offenders become productive citizens, control
19		costs, and protect the public safety; and
20	(11)	Recommendations to enable accountability and evaluation of outcomes
21		of juvenile programs and dispositions, including recommendations for
22		system changes that will enable tracking of participants in juvenile
23		offender programs into the adult criminal and other juvenile offender
24		programs.
25	(c) The Department shall complete this study by October 31, 1994, and shall	
26	report the results of this study to the 1995 General Assembly by February 1, 1995.	
27	Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of	
28	Human Resources the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for the 1994-95	
29	fiscal year to fund this study. In addition, notwithstanding G.S. 143-23, the Department	
30	of Human Resources, with the approval of the Office of Budget and Management, may	
31	use any funds available to the Department to fund this study.	
32	Sec. 3	3. This act is effective upon ratification.
