A BILL TO BE ENTITLED  AN ACT TO REPLACE THE SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION WITH THE DIVISION OF ALCOHOLISM AND CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY PROGRAMS.  The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:  Section 1. G.S. 143B-262.1 is repealed.  Sec. 2. Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:			
"§ 143B-262.1A. Department of Correction – Division of Alcoholism and Chemica			
<u>An Assistant Secretary for Alcoholism and Chemical Dependency Programs shall be employed and shall report to the Office of the Secretary of Correction.</u> The responsibilities of the Assistant Secretary and staff shall include the following:  (1) Administration and coordination of all alcoholism and chemical dependency programs, grants, contracts, and related functions in the Department of Correction;			
(2) Development and maintenance of working relationships and agreements with agencies and organizations that will assist in developing and

3		<u>(3)</u>	Development and coordination of the use of volunteers in alcoholism

8		<u>(5)</u>	Development of programs that provide effective treatment for inmates,

12			dependency field, the service structure of various recovery programs,	
13			and other supporters of the program in the Department of Correction;	
14		<u>(7)</u>	Direct supervision of the directors of treatment units, specialized	
15			personnel, and programs that exist or may be developed in the	
16			Department of Correction; and	
17		<u>(8)</u>	Assistance in the development of policies and procedures to provide	
18			access to employees with alcoholism, chemical dependency, or other	
19			problems.

41	<u>(d)</u>		Division of Prisons, there shall be a unit superintendent responsible for	
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43	as required. A residential chemical dependency treatment program offered in a Division			

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of Prisons facility shall be self-contained, so that the residential and treatment program space is separate from any other program or inmate housing.

The Secretary of Correction may designate alcohol and drug treatment facilities to be operated by the Division of Alcoholism and Chemical Dependency Programs and administered under the direction of the Assistant Secretary.

(e) Extensive use may be made of inmates working in the role of ancillary staff, peer counselors, role models, or group leaders as the program manager determines. Additional resource persons, who may be required for specialized treatment activities, presentations, or group work, may be employed on a fee or contractual basis."

Sec. 3. G.S. 143B-264 reads as rewritten:

## "§ 143B-264. Department of Correction – organization.

The Department of Correction shall be organized initially to include the Post-Release Supervision and Parole Commission, the Board of Correction, the Division of Prisons, the Division of Youth Development, the Division of Adult Probation and Parole, and such other divisions as may be established under the provisions of the Executive Organization Act of 1973.

The Department shall establish a Substance Abuse Program. All substance abuse programs established or in existence shall be administered by the Department of Correction under the Substance Abuse Program.

The Department shall establish the Division of Alcoholism and Chemical Dependency Programs. All alcoholism and chemical dependency programs established or in existence shall be administered by the Department of Correction under the Division of Alcoholism and Chemical Dependency Programs."

Sec. 4. This act becomes effective July 1, 1995.
