7		RULES OF THE REGULAR SESSIONS OF THE

10	I.	Order of Business, 1-5
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19		I. ORDER OF BUSINESS
20		RULE 1. Convening Hour, Limitation on Friday, Night, and Sunday
21	Legislat	ive Sessions. – The House shall convene each legislative day at the hour fixed by
22	the Hou	se. In the event the House adjourns on the preceding legislative day without

having fixed an hour for reconvening, the House shall convene on the next legislative day
at 1:30 p.m. During January and February of 1997, no sessions may be held on Friday.
No session shall continue after 10:00 p.m. on Monday nor after 9:00 p.m. on any other
days, and the Speaker shall adjourn the House without motion at that point, except that a
motion may be made as to the time and day of next convening. No session shall be held
on Sunday.

RULE 2. Opening the Session. – At the convening hour on each legislative
day, the Speaker shall call the members to order and shall have the session opened with
prayer. At the convening hour on the first day of each legislative week the Speaker, or
his designee, shall lead the members in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

RULE 3. Quorum. - (a) A quorum consists of a majority of the qualified
 members of the House.

(b) Should the point of a quorum be raised, the doors shall be closed and the Clerk shall call the roll of the House, after which the names of those not responding shall again be called. In the absence of a quorum, 15 members are authorized to compel the attendance of absent members and may order that absentees for whom no sufficient excuses are made be taken into custody wherever they may be found by special messenger appointed for that purpose.

RULE 4. Approval of Journal. – (a) The Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar,
 and Operations of the House shall cause the Journal of the House to be examined daily
 before the hour of convening to determine if the proceedings of the previous day have
 been correctly recorded.

(b) Immediately following the opening prayer and upon appearance of a quorum,
the Speaker shall call for the Journal report by the Chair of the Standing Committee on
Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House or by a Representative designated by the
Chair as to whether the proceedings of the previous day have been correctly recorded.
Without objection, the Speaker shall cause the Journal to stand approved.

RULE 5. **Order of Business of the Day.** – After the approval of the Journal of the preceding day, the House shall proceed to business in the following order:

- 30 (1) The receiving of petitions, memorials, and papers addressed to the
  31 General Assembly or to the House;
- 32 (1a) Messages from the Governor;
- 33 (2) Ratification of bills;
- 34 (3) Reports of standing committees and permanent subcommittees;
- 35 (4) Reports of select committees;
- 36 (5) Reports of referral by standing committee Chairs of bills to permanent
   37 subcommittees;
  - (6) First reading and reference to committee of bills and resolutions;
- 39 (7) Messages from the Senate;
- 40 (8) Concurrence with Senate amendments or Senate committee substitutes;
- 41 (9) The unfinished business of the preceding day;
- 42 (10) Calendar (each category in accordance with Rule 40):
  - (a) Local bills (roll call) third reading

2	(c) Local bills third reading
3	(d) Local bills second reading
4	(d1) Public bills and resolutions consent calendar:
5	1. (roll call) third reading

15	II. CONDUCT OF DEBATE
16	RULE 6. Duties and Powers of the Speaker. – The Speaker shall have
17	general direction of the Hall. The Speaker may name any member to perform the duties
18	of the Chair, but substitution shall not extend beyond one day, except in the case of
19	sickness or by leave of the House.
20	RULE 7. <b>Obtaining Floor.</b> $-(a)$ When any member desires recognition for any
21	purpose, the member shall rise and respectfully address the Speaker. No member shall
22	proceed until recognized by the Speaker for a purpose.
23	(b) When a member desires to interrupt a member having the floor, the member
24	shall first obtain recognition by the Speaker and permission of the member occupying the
25	floor, and when such recognition and permission have been obtained, he or she may
26	propound a question to the member occupying the floor; but he or she shall not otherwise
27	interrupt the member having the floor, except as provided in subsection (c) of this rule;
28	and the Speaker shall, without the point of order being raised, enforce this rule.
29	(c) A member who has obtained the floor may be interrupted only for the
30	following reasons:
31	1. A request that the member speaking yield for a question,
32	2. A point of order,
33	3. A parliamentary inquiry, or
34	4. A question of privilege.
35	RULE 8. Questions of Privilege. – Upon recognition by the Speaker for that
36	purpose, any member may speak to a question of privilege for a time not to exceed three
37	minutes. Questions of privilege shall be those affecting, first, the rights of the House
38	collectively, its safety, dignity, and the integrity of its proceedings; second, the rights,
39	reputation, and conduct of members, individually, in their representative capacity only;
40	and shall have precedence of all other questions, except motions to adjourn. Privilege
41	may not be used to explain a vote or debate a bill. The Speaker shall determine if the
42	question is one of privilege and shall, without the point of order being raised, enforce this
43	rule.

1 RULE 9. **Points of Order.** -(a)The Speaker shall decide questions of order and may speak to points of order in preference to other members arising from their seats for 2 3 that purpose. Any member may appeal from the ruling of the Chair on questions of order; on such appeal no member may speak more than once, unless by leave of the 4 5 House. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present shall be necessary to sustain any 6 appeal from the ruling of the Chair. 7 When the Speaker calls a member to order, the member shall be seated except (b)

that a member called to order may clear a matter of fact, or explain, but shall not proceed in debate so long as the decision stands. If the member appeals from the ruling of the Chair and the decision by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present be in favor of the member called to order, the member may proceed; if otherwise, the member shall not; and if the case, in the judgment of the House, requires it, the member shall be liable to censure by the House.

RULE 10. Limitations on Debate. - (a) No member shall speak on, debate, or
 solicit cosponsors for a bill or resolution at its first reading.

16 (b) No member shall speak more than twice on the main question, nor longer than 17 20 minutes for the first speech and 10 minutes for the second speech; nor shall the 18 member speak more than twice upon an amendment or motion to reconsider, commit, 19 appeal, or postpone, and then not longer than 10 minutes for the first speech and five 20 minutes for the second speech.

21 (c) A member may speak only once and for not more than 20 minutes on the 22 question of the adoption of a minority report.

(d) The House, by consent of a majority of the members present, may suspend the
operation of subsections (b) and (c) of this rule during any debate on any particular
question before the House.

RULE 11. **Reading of Papers.** – When there is a call for the reading of the text of a paper which has been presented to the House, and there is objection to such reading, the question shall be determined by a majority vote of the members of the House present. Except for protests permitted by the Constitution, no member may have material printed in the Journal until said material has been presented to the House and the printing approved by the House, and said material shall not exceed 1,000 words.

32 RULE 12. General Decorum. -(a) The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum.

33 (b) Decency of speech shall be observed and disrespect to personalities carefully
 34 avoided.

(c) When the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, no person
shall speak, stand up, walk out of, or cross the House, nor when a member is speaking,
engage in disruptive discourse or pass between the member and the Chair.

38 (d) Food or beverages shall not be permitted on the floor of the House during the39 first two hours of the daily session.

40 (e) The reading of newspapers shall not be permitted on the floor of the House41 while the House is in session.

42 (f) Smoking or the consumption of food or beverages shall not be permitted in43 the galleries at any time.

1	(g) Special recitals, performances by musicians or other groups shall not be
2	permitted on the floor of the House; and special guests of members of the House shall not
3	be permitted on the floor of the House.
4	(h) Members shall observe appropriate attire, coat and tie for male members
5	and dignified dress for female members.
6	(i) The use of cellular telephones shall not be permitted in the House
7	Chamber.
8	III. MOTIONS
9	RULE 13. Motions Generally. – (a) Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the
10	Speaker or any two members request it. No motion relating to a bill shall be in order
11	which does not identify the bill by its number and short title.
12	(b) When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker, or, if written, it shall
13	be handed to the Chair and read aloud by the Speaker or Clerk before debate.
14	(c) After a motion has been stated by the Speaker or read by the Speaker or Clerk,
15	it shall be in the possession of the House; but it may be withdrawn before a decision or
16	amendment, except in case of a motion to reconsider, which motion, when made by a
17	member, shall be in possession of the House and shall not be withdrawn without leave of
18	the House.
19	RULE 14. Motions, Order of Precedence. – When there are motions before
20	the House, the order of precedence is as follows:
21	To adjourn
22	To lay on the table
23	Previous question
24	To postpone indefinitely
25	To reconsider
26	To postpone to a day certain
27	To re-refer
28	To amend an amendment
29	To amend
30	To substitute
31	To pass the bill
32	No motion to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a day
33	certain, to commit or to make a particular amendment, being decided, shall be again
34	allowed at the same stage of the bill or proposition.
35	RULE 15. Motion to Adjourn. $-(a)$ A motion to adjourn shall be seconded before
36	the motion is put to the vote of the House.
37	(b) A motion to adjourn shall be decided without debate and shall always be in

(b) A motion to adjourn shall be decided without debate, and shall always be in
order, except when the House is voting or some member is speaking; but a motion to
adjourn shall not follow a motion to adjourn until debate or some other business of the
House has intervened.

RULE 16. Motion to Table. - (a) A motion to table shall be seconded before the
motion is put to the vote of the House and is in order except when a motion to adjourn is
before the House.

A motion to table shall be decided without debate. (b)1 2 A motion to table a bill shall constitute a motion to table the bill and all (c) 3 amendments thereto. 4 (d)When the question before the House is the adoption of an amendment to a bill 5 or resolution, a motion to table the bill is not in order; and a motion to table an 6 amendment applies to the amendment only, and the motion may not expressly or by 7 implication or construction be expanded to include a motion to table the bill also. 8 (e) When a question has been tabled, it shall not thereafter be considered 9 except on motion to reconsider under Rule 18, or to remove from the table approved by a 10 two-thirds (2/3) vote. RULE 17. Motion to Postpone Indefinitely. – A motion to postpone 11 12 indefinitely is in order except when a motion to adjourn or to lay on the table or for the However, after one motion to postpone 13 previous question is before the House. 14 indefinitely has been decided, another motion to postpone indefinitely shall not be 15 allowed at the same stage of the bill or proposition. When a question has been postponed indefinitely, it shall not thereafter be considered except on motion to reconsider under 16 17 Rule 18, or to place on the favorable calendar approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote. 18 RULE 18. Motion to Reconsider. -(a)When a question has been decided, it is in order for any member to move for the reconsideration thereof, on the same or the 19 20 succeeding legislative day; provided that if the vote by which the motion was originally 21 decided was taken by a recorded vote, only a member of the prevailing side may move for reconsideration. 22 23 (b)A motion to reconsider shall be determined by a majority vote, except the 24 following shall require a two-thirds (2/3) vote: a second or subsequent motion to 25 reconsider, and a motion to reconsider: 26 (1)A vote upon a motion to table, 27 A motion to postpone indefinitely, (2)A motion to remove a bill from the unfavorable calendar, 28 (3) 29 A motion that a bill be read twice on the same day, or (4) 30 A motion to remove from the table. (5)A motion to reconsider the vote by which a person has been elected as Speaker 31 (c)or Speaker Pro Tempore shall not be in order. - (3) Any other question upon direction of the Speaker or upon motion of any member supported by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present.

3 (c) When the electronic voting system is used, 15 seconds shall be allowed for 4 voting on the question before the House, unless the Chair shall direct otherwise. The 5 system shall be set to close automatically when that time has expired. Once the system is 6 locked, the vote shall be recorded and printed.

7 (d) The voting station at each member's desk in the Chamber shall be used only by 8 the member to which the station is assigned. Under no circumstances shall any other 9 person vote at a member's station. It is a breach of the ethical obligation of a member 10 either to request that another person vote at the requesting member's station, or to vote at 11 another member's station. The Speaker shall enforce this rule without exception.

12 (e) When the electronic voting system is used, the Speaker shall state the question and shall then state substantially the following: "All in favor vote 'ave'; all 13 opposed vote 'no'; the Clerk will open the vote." In order to have the vote recorded, the 14 15 member must vote by the electronic voting system within the time allowed for that vote, unless the voting station assigned to a member is malfunctioning. The Speaker shall 16 17 enforce this rule without exception. After the allotted time for voting has elapsed, the 18 Speaker shall say: "The Clerk will now lock the machine and record the vote." After the machine is locked and the vote recorded, the Speaker shall announce the vote and declare 19 20 the result.

(f) One copy of the machine printout of the vote record of all votes taken on the electronic system shall be filed in the office of the Principal Clerk, and one copy shall be filed in the Legislative Library where it shall be open to public inspection. A legible copy of the bill, amendment, or motion on which the vote was taken shall be filed with the printout of the vote in the Legislative Library.

26 When the Speaker ascertains that the electronic voting system is (g) 27 inoperative before a vote is taken or while a vote is being taken on the electronic system, the Speaker shall announce that fact to the House and any partial electronic system voting 28 29 record shall be voided. In such a case, if the Constitution of North Carolina or the Rules 30 of the House require a call of the ayes and noes, the Clerk shall call the roll of the House, and the aves and noes shall be taken manually and shall be recorded on the Journal. All 31 32 roll call votes shall be taken alphabetically. All other votes shall be taken by voice vote. 33 If, after a vote is taken on the electronic system, it is discovered that a malfunction caused an error in the electronic system printout, the Speaker shall direct the Reading Clerk and 34 35 the Principal Clerk to verify and correct the printout record and so advise the House.

7 RULE 21. Voice Votes; Stating Questions. – (a) When the electronic voting 8 system is not used, the Speaker shall rise and put a question.

The question shall be put in this form, namely, "Those in favor (as the question 9 (b)10 may be) will say 'Aye'', and after the affirmative voice has been expressed, "Those opposed will say 'No"'. 11

12 (c)No statement, explanation, debate, motion, parliamentary inquiry, or point of 13 order shall be allowed once the voice vote has begun. Any point of order or 14 parliamentary inquiry may be raised, however, after the completion of the vote.

15 RULE 22. Determining Questions. – (a) Unless otherwise provided by the 16 Constitution of North Carolina or by these rules, all questions shall be determined by a 17 simple majority of the members present and voting.

18 (b)No member may vote unless the member is in the chamber when the question 19 is put. This subsection of this rule cannot be suspended.

20 RULE 23. Voting by Division. – Any member may call for a division of the 21 members upon the question before the result of the vote has been announced. Upon a call 22 for a division, the Speaker shall cause the number voting in the affirmative and in the 23 negative to be determined. Upon a division and count of the House on any question, no 24 member away from the member's seat shall be counted.

25 RULE 24. Roll Call Vote. -(a)Before a question is put, any member may call for the ayes and noes. If the call is sustained by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present, 26 27 the question shall be decided by the ayes and noes upon a roll call vote.

Every member who is in the Hall of the House when the question is put shall 28 (b) 29 vote upon a call of the ayes and noes, unless excused pursuant to Rule 24.1A.

30 RULE 24.1A. Excuse From Deliberations and Voting on a Bill. – (a) Any member shall, upon request, be excused from the deliberations and voting on a particular bill, but 31 32 to do so must make that request after the second reading of the bill and before any motion 33 or vote on the bill or any amendment thereto. If the reason for the request arises at some 34 point later in the proceedings, the request may be made at that time.

35 (b) The member may make a brief oral statement of the reasons for making that request. The member may send forward to the Principal Clerk, on a form provided by the 36 Clerk, a concise written statement of the reason for the request, and the Clerk shall 37 38 include this statement in the Journal.

39 The member so excused shall not debate the bill or any amendment to the bill, (c)vote on the bill, offer or vote on any amendment to the bill, or offer or vote on any 40 motion concerning the bill at that reading, any subsequent reading, or any subsequent 41 42 consideration of the bill.

(d) A member may request that his or her excuse from deliberations on a particular bill be withdrawn.

3 RULE 24.1B. **Division of Amendments.** – Any member may call for an 4 amendment to be divided into two or more amendments to be voted on separately, and 5 the Speaker shall determine whether the amendment admits of such a division.

6 RULE 25. **Voting by Speaker.** – In all elections the Speaker may vote. In all 7 other instances the Speaker may vote, or may reserve this right until there is a tie in 8 which event the Speaker may vote; but in no instance may the Speaker vote twice on the 9 same question.

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#### V. COMMITTEES

RULE 26. Standing Committees and Permanent Subcommittees Generally. – (a)
 The Speaker shall appoint a Chair, or Cochairs, of every standing committee
 and select committee, if any. In the construction of these rules, the word "Chair"as
 applied to a standing committee extends to and includes a Cochair of the standing
 committee. The Speaker shall have the exclusive right and authority to establish select
 committees, but this does not exclude the right of the House by resolution to establish
 select committees.

18 (b) All permanent subcommittees of each standing committee shall be appointed 19 by the Speaker and the members appointed, along with the Chair of the standing 20 committee, shall constitute the standing committee of which the permanent subcommittee 21 is a part. The Speaker shall appoint all members of permanent subcommittees at the 22 beginning of the first regular session in a manner to reflect the partisan membership of 23 the House.

(c) The Speaker shall appoint the members of all standing committees having no
 permanent subcommittees, at the beginning of the first regular session in a manner to
 reflect the partisan membership of the House.

27 (d) The first member announced on each permanent subcommittee shall be the28 Chair. The Speaker may designate one or more Vice-Chairs.

(e) Each Chair of a permanent subcommittee shall be a Vice-Chair of the
 standing committee of which it is a permanent subcommittee. The Speaker may name
 other members as Vice-Chairs of the standing committee. The Speaker may name one or
 more Vice-Chairs for any standing committee not having permanent standing
 subcommittees.

(f) The Chair of the standing committee shall be a voting member of eachpermanent subcommittee of the standing committee.

(g) Either the Chair or Acting Chair, designated by the Chair or by the 36 Speaker, and five other members of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, 37 38 or a majority of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, whichever is fewer, 39 shall constitute a quorum of that standing committee or permanent subcommittee. For purposes of determining a quorum, the Speaker Pro Tempore, Majority Leader, and 40 Majority Whip, when serving only as ex officio members under subsection (i) of this rule, 41 42 shall be counted among the membership of the committee or subcommittee only when 43 present.

33	RULE 28. Standing Committee and Permanent Subcommittee Meetings. – (a)
34	Standing committees and permanent subcommittees of standing committees
35	shall be furnished with suitable meeting places pursuant to a schedule adopted by the
36	Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House. Select
37	committees shall be furnished with suitable meeting places as their needs require by the
38	Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House.
39	(b) Subject to the provisions of subsection (c) of this rule, standing committees

Subject to the provisions of subsection (c) of this rule, standing committees 39 (0)and permanent subcommittees thereof shall permit other members of the General 40 Assembly, the press, and the general public to attend all sessions of said standing 41 committees or permanent subcommittees. 42

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The Chair or other presiding officer shall have general direction of the meeting 1 (c) place of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee and, in case of any 2 3 disturbance or disorderly conduct therein, or if the peace, good order, and proper conduct 4 of the legislative business is hindered by any person or persons, the Chair or presiding 5 officer shall have power to exclude from the session any individual or individuals so 6 hindering the legislative business.

7 Procedure in the standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall be (d)8 governed by the rules of the House, so far as the same may be applicable to such 9 procedure. Before a question is put, any member may call for the ayes and noes. If the 10 call is sustained by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present, the question shall be decided by the ayes and noes upon a roll call vote. All roll call votes shall be taken alphabetically 11 12 and shall be subject to Rule 21(c).

13 (e) No standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall meet on any day when the House shall not convene except by permission of the Speaker or by approval of 14 15 the House by resolution adopted by a majority vote of the House.

(f) No standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall meet during any 16 17 session of the House. Standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall meet at 18 their regularly scheduled hour. No permanent subcommittee shall meet at the same time that its standing committee is meeting. Standing committees and permanent 19 20 subcommittees may meet at other times as authorized by the Chair of the Standing 21 Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House in order to assure the availability of the meeting room and that no conflicts will exist with the meetings of other 22 23 bodies. All standing committee and permanent subcommittee meetings shall adjourn no 24 later than:

25

15 minutes preceding a regular session of the House, and

26 27

(1)10 minutes preceding the hour of the next regularly scheduled standing (2)committee or permanent subcommittee meeting.

(g) Any call or notice of a standing committee or permanent subcommittee 28 29 meeting between legislative sessions shall be mailed to each member of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee at least five days prior to such meeting. If a 30 member of the body so requests in writing to the Chair of the standing committee or 31 32 permanent subcommittee, the member shall be notified by certified mail of the meetings.

33 (h) During standing committee and permanent subcommittee meetings, the Chair may exercise the right to vote, or may reserve this right until there is a tie, in which 34 35 event the Chair may vote, but in no instance may the Chair vote twice on the same 36 question.

RULE 28.1. 37 Ethics Committee Investigations Into Violations of the Open 38 Meetings Law. – (a) On its own motion, or in response to signed and sworn 39 complaint of any individual filed with the Standing Committee on Ethics, the Committee shall inquire into any alleged violation by members of the House of the Open Meetings 40 Law (Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes), as the same may be amended 41 42 in the future.

1 (b) If, after such preliminary investigation as it may make, the Committee 2 determines to proceed with an inquiry into the conduct of any individual, the Committee 3 shall notify the individual as to the fact of the inquiry and the charges against him and 4 shall schedule one or more hearings on the matter. The individual shall have the right to 5 present evidence, cross-examine witnesses, and be represented by counsel at any 6 hearings.

(c) After the Committee has concluded its inquiries into the alleged violations,
the Committee shall dispose of the matter by taking one of the following actions:

- 9
- (1) Dismiss the complaint and take no further action.
- 10 11

(2) Issue a letter of reprimand to the legislator, if the legislator

- unintentionally violated the provisions of the Open Meetings Law.
- (3) Issue a letter of reprimand if the violation of the Open Meetings Law
   was intentional, or if the legislator has previously received a letter of
   reprimand. The Chair of the Committee on Ethics shall have the public
   letter of reprimand spread on the pages of the House Journal.
- 16
- (4) Refer the matter to the House for appropriate action.

17 RULE 29. Notice of Standing Committee and Permanent Subcommittee 18 Meetings and Hearings. – Public notice of all standing committee and permanent 19 subcommittee meetings shall be given in the House. The Chair of the standing 20 committee or permanent subcommittee shall notify or cause to be notified the sponsor of 21 each bill which is set for hearing or consideration before the standing committee or 22 permanent subcommittee as to the date, time, and place of that meeting.

23 RULE 29.1. Public Hearings. – (a) Requests for a public hearing shall be made in 24 writing to the Chair of the standing committee and, if applicable, the Chair of the permanent subcommittee to which the bill has been referred. The Chair of the standing 25 committee may schedule a public hearing by the standing committee as a whole after the 26 27 adjournment of a regular daily House session. The Chair of the permanent subcommittee may schedule a public hearing before the permanent subcommittee at its regularly 28 29 scheduled hour. Denial of a request made by a House member may be appealed to the 30 Speaker.

Notice shall be given not less than five calendar days prior to public hearings.
These notices shall be issued as information for the press, and information shall be posted
in the places designated by the Principal Clerk.

34 (b) Persons desiring to appear and be heard at a public hearing shall submit 35 their request to the Chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee. The 36 standing committee or permanent subcommittee Chair may designate one or more 37 members to arrange the order of appearance of interested parties. A brief written 38 statement of testimony may be submitted without oral presentation and shall be 39 incorporated in the minutes of the public hearing.

40 RULE 29.2. **Minutes to Legislative Library.** – The Chair of a standing 41 committee or a permanent subcommittee shall insure that written minutes are compiled 42 for each of the body's meetings. The minutes shall indicate the members present and the 43 actions taken at the meeting. Not later than 20 days after the adjournment of each session

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of the General Assembly, the Chair shall deliver the minutes to the Legislative Library.
 The Speaker of the House may grant a reasonable extension of time for filing said
 minutes upon written application of the Chair.

RULE 30. Standing Committee of the Whole House. – (a) A Standing
Committee of the Whole House shall not be formed, except by suspension of the rules, if
there be objection by any member.

7 (b) After passage of a motion to form a Standing Committee of the Whole House, 8 the Speaker shall appoint a Chair to preside in the standing committee, and the Speaker 9 shall leave the dais.

10 (c) The rules of procedure in the House shall be observed in the Standing 11 Committee of the Whole House, so far as they may be applicable, except the rule limiting 12 the time of speaking and the previous question.

(d) In the Standing Committee of the Whole House, a motion that the standing
 committee rise shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, and shall be
 decided without debate.

16 (e) When a bill is submitted to the Standing Committee of the Whole House, it 17 shall be read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be last considered. The 18 body of the bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but all amendments, noting the page 19 and line, shall be duly entered by the clerk on a separate paper as the same shall be 20 agreed to by the standing committee, and be so reported to the House. After report, the 21 bill shall again be subject to be debated and amended by sections before a question on its 22 passage be taken.

# VI. HANDLING OF BILLS

RULE 31. Introduction of Bills and Resolutions. – (a) All bills and resolutions
shall be introduced by submitting same to the Principal Clerk's office on the legislative
day prior to the first reading and reference thereof according to the following schedule:
by 8:30 p.m. each Monday, by 3:00 p.m. each Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and
Friday.

29 (b)Bills shall not become resolutions provided the Senate has a similar rule. 30 Resolutions shall not become bills. Resolutions are not law but may be used when a law is not necessary for the purpose contained therein. Resolutions shall not be used to 31 appropriate funds for any purpose, but may be used to create study commissions or 32 33 committees or establish investigative committees, to honor deceased persons, and to 34 adopt House rules and internal affairs. Resolutions cannot amend, repeal, or modify a 35 statute; nor do they have life beyond the term of the session during which they are 36 adopted.

37 (c) Every bill or resolution shall be read in regular order of business, except upon
 38 permission of the Speaker or on the report of a standing committee.

(d) All bills and resolutions shall show in their captions a brief descriptive
statement of the true substance of same, which captions may thereafter be amended.
Captions of public bills may be amended only by amendment proposed by the standing
committee to which the bill was referred. Third reading shall not be had on any bill or
resolution on the same day that such caption is amended.

1 (e) A Substitute Bill shall be covered with the same color jacket as the original 2 bill and shall be prefaced as follows:

- 3 "House Substitute for" or "House Committee Substitute for\_\_\_\_\_
- 4

(f) House Resolutions need not be read more than twice.

5 (g) All memorializing, celebration, commendation, and commemoration 6 resolutions, except those honoring the memory of deceased persons, shall be excluded 7 from introduction and consideration in the House.

8 RULE 31.1. Deadlines on Introduction and Receipt of Limitation on Number of 9 **Public Bills Introduced; Single Subject Rule.** – (a) All bills resolutions or 10 recommended by commissions or standing committees authorized or directed by act or resolution of the General Assembly to report to the 1997 Regular Session of the General 11 12 Assembly, or to report prior to convening of that session, must be introduced not later than the first Thursday in February (February 6) of the first year of the biennial session; 13 14 provided that any such measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative 15 Services Office by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives before 3:00 p.m. on the next Thursday (February 13) shall be treated as if it had been 16 17 introduced pursuant to this subsection.

18 (a1) All bills prepared to be introduced for departments, agencies, or 19 institutions of the State must be introduced not later than the last Thursday in February 20 (February 27) of the first year of the biennial session; provided that any such measure 21 submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives before 3:00 p.m. on the next 22 Thursday (March 6) shall be treated as if it had been introduced pursuant to this 23 subsection. A bill introduced under this subsection shall be identified as an Agency Bill 24 25 after its short title.

(a2) All local bills must be introduced not later than the fourth Thursday in
March (March 27) of the first year of the biennial session; provided that any such
measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by
4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives before 3:00 p.m.
on the next Thursday (April 3) shall be treated as if it had been introduced pursuant to
this subsection.

32 (b) All public bills not containing appropriations or tax law changes must be 33 introduced not later than the second Thursday in April (April 10) of the first year of the 34 biennial session; provided that any such measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division 35 of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House 36 of Representatives before 3:00 p.m. on the next Thursday (April 17) shall be treated as if 37 it had been introduced pursuant to this subsection.

38 (c) All public bills containing appropriations and tax law changes, or containing 39 appropriations but not tax law changes, must be introduced not later than the fourth 40 Thursday in April (April 24) of the first year of the biennial session; provided that any 41 such measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office 42 by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives before 3:00 43 p.m. on the next Thursday (May 1) shall be treated as if it had been introduced pursuant

to this subsection. All public bills containing tax law changes must be introduced not 1 later than the second Thursday in May (May 8) of the first year of the biennial session; 2 3 provided that any such measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative 4 Services Office by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives 5 before 3:00 p.m. on the next Thursday (May 15) shall be treated as if it had been 6 introduced pursuant to this subsection. If any bill is eligible for introduction on account of the date only under this subsection, and the bill is amended so that qualifying 7 8 appropriation or tax law change does not remain in the bill, it shall not be eligible for 9 further consideration. For the purpose of this section, a "tax law change" includes any 10 provision that would require a bill under Rule 38(b) to be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance or the Standing Committee on Ways and Means. 11

(c1) All resolutions, except those honoring the memory of deceased persons or adjourning the General Assembly must be introduced not later than the last Thursday in April (April 24) of the first year of the biennial session; provided that any such measure submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 p.m. on that date and introduced in the House of Representatives before 3:00 p.m. on the next Thursday (May 1) shall be treated as if it had been introduced pursuant to this subsection.

(d) In order to be eligible for consideration by the House during the first Regular Session, all Senate bills other than finance or appropriations bills or adjournment resolutions, must be received and read on the floor of the House as a message from the Senate no later than May 1; provided that a message from the Senate received by the next legislative day stating that a bill has passed its third reading and is being engrossed shall comply with the requirements of this subsection and provided that the Senate has a similar rule.

25 (d1) No member may introduce more than 10 public bills. For the purpose of the subsection, the introducer is the member who is listed as the first sponsor. A member 26 27 may assign a portion of this limit to another member by notifying the Principal Clerk in writing on a form prepared by the Principal Clerk. This subsection does not apply to bills 28 29 or resolutions recommended by commissions or standing committees authorized or directed by act or resolution of the General Assembly to report to the 1997 Regular 30 Session of the General Assembly, or to report prior to convening of that session. This 31 32 subsection does not apply to joint resolutions or House resolutions.

(d2) Except by motion approved by a majority of members of the House
 present and voting, no public House bill other than the Current Operations
 Appropriations Act or the Capital Improvement Appropriations Act may contain more
 than one subject.

(e) This rule, other than subsection (d2), does not apply to bills establishing
districts for Congress or State or local entities. This rule, other than subsection (d2), does
not apply to measures ratifying an amendment or amendments to the Constitution of the
United States.

RULE 32. Reference to Standing Committee and to Permanent Subcommittees.
 - (a) Each bill, joint resolution, or House resolution not introduced on the report of a

1	standing committee shall immediately upon its first reading be referred by the Speaker to
2	such standing committee or permanent subcommittee as the Speaker deems appropriate.
3	(b) The standing committee Chair may refer each bill referred to the standing
4	committee to the permanent subcommittee specifically charged with the subject matter of
5	the bill. A report of that referral shall be made in writing and submitted to the body
6	pursuant to Rule 5(5). Except as provided in Rule 36, the permanent subcommittee to
7	which the bill is referred shall report the bill back to the full standing committee. That
8	subcommittee report shall include one of the following recommendations:
9	(1) Favorable, without prejudice, or unfavorable as to the original bill with
10	the recommendation that the report be made to the standing committee;
11	(2) Favorable, without prejudice, or unfavorable as to the original bill, as
12	amended, with the recommendation that the report be made to the
13	standing committee;
14	(3) Favorable or without prejudice to the proposed committee substitute,
15	and unfavorable to the original bill, with the recommendation that the
16	report be made to the standing committee;
17	(4) Favorable as to the original bill with the recommendation that the report
18	be made directly to the floor of the House, if approved by the standing
19	committee Chair;
20	(5) Favorable to the original bill, as amended, with the recommendation
21	that the report be made directly to the floor of the House, if approved by
22	the standing committee Chair;
23	(6) Favorable to the proposed committee substitute with the
24	recommendation that the report be made directly to the floor of the
25	House, if approved by the standing committee Chair, and unfavorable to
26	the original bill.
27	Any recommendation of favorable or without prejudice may include a
28	recommendation of re-referral to another standing committee. After a bill is reported to a
29	standing committee by a permanent subcommittee of that standing committee, the
30	standing committee Chair may re-refer the bill to another permanent subcommittee of
31	that standing committee.
32	Upon recommendation to the standing committee, the bill shall be before that
33	body for further action unless the permanent subcommittee Chair reports the bill directly
34	pursuant to Rule 36.
35	(b1) Notwithstanding subsection (b) of this rule, the Local, Regional and State
36	Revenues Subcommittee may include in its report to the Finance Committee a
37	recommendation that the original bill be reported unfavorably or without prejudice
38	directly to the floor of the House, if approved by the Chair of the Finance Committee.
39	(c) When a committee substitute is adopted by a permanent subcommittee or a
40	standing committee for a bill which was introduced with no substantive provisions and
41	the committee substitute deletes a majority of the provisions of the original bill and adds
42	provisions that are not germane to the original bill, no further action may be taken by any

standing committee or permanent subcommittee upon such bill until the second 1 2 legislative day thereafter.

3 RULE 33. Papers Addressed to the House. – Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker. A brief statement of the 4 5 contents thereof may be orally made by the introducer before reference to a committee, 6 but such papers shall not be debated or decided on the day of their first being read unless 7 the House shall direct otherwise.

8 RULE 34. Introduction of Resolutions and Bills, Copies Required. – (a)

9 Whenever any resolution or bill is introduced, a duplicate copy thereof shall be 10 attached thereto, and the Principal Clerk shall cause said duplicate copy to be numbered as the original resolution or bill is numbered, and shall cause the same to be available at 11 12 all times to the member introducing the same.

13 (b)14 A House 15

Whenever any resolution or bill is filed for introduction, it shall be in a House 16 (c)17 bill jacket containing 30 copies and in the form designated by the Speaker. Anv 18 resolution or bill not accompanied by the required number of copies shall be immediately returned to the introducer. The Clerk shall stamp the copies with the number stamped 19 20 upon the original bill.

21 RULE 35. Duplicating and Availability of Copies of Bills. – (a) The Legislative Services Officer shall cause such bills as are introduced to be duplicated in 22 23 such numbers as may be specified by the Speaker. The Legislative Services Officer shall 24 cause one copy of each resolution and public bill for each member to be delivered to the member's clerk or secretary who shall place it in the appropriate notebook on the 25 member's desk. If a member so requests, a second copy shall be delivered to the 26 27 member's clerk or secretary who shall place it in the member's office. The remaining copies shall be placed in the Printed Bills Room and made available to the committees to 28 29 which the bill is referred, to individual members on request, and to the general public.

30 A public bill is a bill affecting 15 or more counties. A local bill is one (b)affecting fewer than 15 counties. No public bill and, upon objection by a member, no 31 32 local bill may be considered unless copies of the bill have been made available to the 33 entire membership of the House.

34 RULE 35.1. Assessment Reports. – Every bill or resolution proposing the 35 establishment of an occupational or professional licensing board, as defined in Article 18A of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes, or a study for the need to establish such a 36 37 board shall have attached to the jacket of the original bill or resolution at the time of its 38 consideration on second and third readings by the House or by any standing committee or 39 permanent subcommittee of the House, an assessment report from the Legislative Committee on New Licensing Boards pursuant to Article 18A of Chapter 120 of the 40 General Statutes. The assessment report shall not constitute any part of the expression of 41 42 legislative intent proposed by the formation of a licensing board. Upon receipt of the request, the Legislative Committee on New Licensing Boards shall prepare and return the 43

assessment report as soon as possible but not later than 60 days, reserving the right toextend this time to 90 days.

RULE 36. **Report by Standing Committee or Permanent Subcommittee.** – All House bills and resolutions shall be reported from the standing committee or permanent subcommittee to which referred with such recommendations as the standing committee or permanent subcommittee may desire to make except in the case where the principal introducer requests in writing to the Chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee that the bill not be considered.

9 With the written approval of the Chair of the standing committee and with the 10 recommendation of the subcommittee pursuant to Rule 32(b)(4) through (6), the Chair of the permanent subcommittee may report the bill directly to the floor with that 11 12 recommendation. With the written approval of the Chair of the Finance Committee, the Chair of the Local, Regional, and State Revenues Subcommittee may report directly to 13 14 the floor a bill with the recommendation of that Subcommittee under Rule 32(b)(4)15 through (6) or Rule 32(b1). If a permanent subcommittee recommends reporting a bill to the floor and the Chair of the standing committee fails to give approval, the bill shall be 16 17 deemed to have been reported to the standing committee with the same recommendation 18 as the subcommittee would have made to the House.

Favorable Report. When a standing committee or permanent subcommittee 19 (a) 20 reports a bill with the recommendation that it be passed, the bill shall be placed on the 21 favorable calendar on the day designated by the Chair of the Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, except that in the absence of the Chair of the 22 23 Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, the Speaker may take such 24 action, and except that bills on the Public Consent Calendar shall be placed on the favorable calendar as provided by Rule 40. In order to place a bill on the calendar for a 25 legislative day, notice shall be given orally in the House or in writing to the Principal 26 27 Clerk. When a committee substitute is adopted and receives a favorable report by the committee or permanent subcommittee, the standing committee or permanent 28 29 subcommittee Chair shall submit to the standing committee or permanent subcommittee 30 the question of an unfavorable report on the original bill. The standing committee's or permanent subcommittee's action, if any, on the original bill shall be reported at the same 31 32 time the committee substitute is reported.

(b) **Report Without Prejudice.** When a standing committee or the Local,
 Regional, and State Revenues Subcommittee reports a bill without prejudice, the bill shall
 be placed on the favorable calendar in the same manner as provided in subsection (a) of
 this rule.

37 (c) Postponed Indefinitely. When a standing committee reports a bill with the
 38 recommendation that it be postponed indefinitely and no minority report accompanies it,
 39 the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable calendar.

(d) Unfavorable Report. When a standing committee or the Local, Regional, and
 State Revenues Subcommittee reports a bill with the recommendation that it be not
 passed and no minority report accompanies it, the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable
 calendar.

(e) Minority Report. When a bill is reported by a standing committee with a 1 recommendation that it be not passed or that it be postponed indefinitely, but it is 2 3 accompanied by a minority report signed by at least one-fourth (1/4) of the members of 4 the standing committee who were present and voting when the bill was considered in 5 standing committee, the question before the House shall be: "The adoption of the 6 minority report." If the minority report is adopted by majority vote, the bill shall be 7 placed on the favorable calendar for consideration. If the minority report fails of 8 adoption by a majority vote, the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable calendar.

9 RULE 36.1. **Fiscal Notes.** – (a) The Chair or Cochair of the Appropriations 10 Committee, of the Finance Committee, of the Ways and Means Committee, or of the 11 Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House Committee, upon the floor of the House 12 may request that a fiscal analysis be made of a bill, resolution, or an amendment to a bill 13 or resolution which is in the possession of the House and that a fiscal note be attached to 14 the measure, when in the opinion of that Chair the fiscal effects of that measure are not 15 apparent from the language of the measure.

16 (b) The fiscal note shall be filed and attached to the bill or amendment within two 17 legislative days of the request. If it is impossible to prepare a fiscal note within two 18 legislative days, the Director of Fiscal Research shall, in writing, so advise the Speaker, 19 the Principal Clerk, and the member introducing or proposing the measure and shall 20 indicate the time when the fiscal note will be ready.

(c) The fiscal note shall be prepared by the Fiscal Research Division on a form
approved by the Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House Committee as to content
and form and signed by the staff member or members preparing it. If no estimate in
dollars is possible, the fiscal note shall indicate the reasons that no estimate is provided.
The fiscal note shall not comment on the merit but may identify technical problems. The
Fiscal Research Division shall make the fiscal note available to the membership of the
House.

(d) A sponsor of a bill or amendment may deliver a copy of the bill or amendment
to the Fiscal Research Division for the preparation of a fiscal note. The sponsor shall
attach the fiscal note to the bill when filed or to the amendment when its adoption is
moved.

(e) The sponsor of a bill or amendment to which a fiscal note is attached who
objects to the estimates and information provided may reduce to writing the objections.
These objections shall be appended to the fiscal note attached to the bill or amendment
and to the copies of the fiscal note available to the membership.

(f) Subsection (a) of this rule shall not apply to the current operations
appropriations bill or the capital improvements appropriations bill. This rule shall not
apply to a bill or amendment requiring an actuarial note under these rules.

RULE 36.2. Actuarial Notes. - (a) Every bill or resolution proposing any change in
 the law relative to any:

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- 42

(1) State, municipal, or other retirement system funded in whole or in part out of public funds; or

1 2 (2) Program of hospital, medical, disability or related benefits provided for teachers and State employees, funded in whole or in part by State funds;

3 shall have attached to it at the time of its consideration by any standing committee or 4 permanent subcommittee a brief explanatory statement or note which shall include a 5 reliable estimate of the financial and actuarial effect of the proposed change to that 6 retirement or pension system. The actuarial note shall be attached to the jacket of each 7 proposed bill or resolution which is reported favorably by any standing committee or any 8 permanent subcommittee, shall be separate therefrom, and shall be clearly designated as 9 an actuarial note. A bill described in subsection (a)(1) of this rule shall be referred to the 10 Committee on Pensions and Retirement upon its introduction.

(b) The sponsor of the bill or resolution shall present a copy of the measure, with a request for an actuarial note, to the Fiscal Research Division which shall prepare the actuarial note as promptly as possible but not later than two weeks after the request is made unless an extension of time is agreed to by the sponsor as being necessary in the preparation of the note. Actuarial notes shall be prepared in the order of receipt of request and shall be transmitted to the sponsor of the measure. The actuarial note of the Fiscal Research Division shall be prepared and signed by an actuary.

18 The sponsor of the bill or resolution shall also present a copy of the measure to (c) the actuary employed by the system or program affected by the measure. Actuarial notes 19 20 shall be prepared and transmitted to the sponsor of the measure not later than two weeks 21 after the request is received, unless an extension of time is agreed to by the sponsor as being necessary in the preparation of the note. The actuarial note shall be attached to the 22 23 jacket of the measure. The provisions of this subsection may be waived by the measure's 24 sponsor for a measure affecting local government retirement or pension plans not administered by the State or any local government program of hospital, medical, 25 disability or related benefits for local government employees not administered by the 26 27 State.

(d) The note shall be factual and shall, if possible, provide a reliable estimate of
both the immediate effect and, if determinable, the long-range fiscal and actuarial effect
of the measure. If, after careful investigation, it is determined that no dollar estimate is
possible, the note shall contain a statement to that effect, setting forth the reasons why no
dollar estimate can be given. No comment or opinion shall be included in the actuarial
note with regard to the merits of the measure for which the note is prepared. Technical
and mechanical defects in the measure may be noted.

35 (e) When any permanent subcommittee or standing committee reports a measure to which an actuarial note is attached at the time of permanent subcommittee or 36 standing committee consideration, with any amendment of such nature as would 37 38 substantially affect the cost to or the revenues of any retirement or pension system, or 39 program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits for teachers or State 40 employees, the Chair of the permanent subcommittee or standing committee reporting the measure shall obtain from the Fiscal Research Division an actuarial note of the fiscal and 41 42 actuarial effect of the proposed amendment. The actuarial note shall be attached to the jacket of the measure. An amendment to any bill or resolution shall not be in order if the 43

amendment affects the costs to or the revenues of a State-administered retirement or 1 2 pension system, or program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits for 3 teachers or State employees, unless the amendment is accompanied by an actuarial note, 4 prepared by the Fiscal Research Division, as to the actuarial effect of the amendment. 5 The Fiscal Research Division shall make all relevant actuarial notes (f)6 available to the membership of the House. 7 RULE 36.4. Local Legislation Affecting State Highway System. - A local bill affecting the State Highway System shall be referred to the Committee on 8 9 Transportation. 10 RULE 37. Removing Bill From Unfavorable Calendar. - A bill may be removed from the unfavorable calendar upon motion carried by a two-thirds (2/3) vote. 11 12 A motion to remove a bill from the unfavorable calendar is debatable. 13 RULE 38. Reports on Appropriation and Revenue Bills. – (a) All standing 14 committees, other than the Standing Committee on Appropriations and the Standing 15 Committee on Ways and Means, when favorably reporting any bill or resolution which: Carries an appropriation from the State; or 16 1 17 2. Requires or will require in the future substantial additional State monies 18 from the General Fund or Highway Fund to implement its provisions, shall indicate same in the report, and said bill or resolution shall be 19 20 referred to the Standing Committee on Appropriations or the Standing 21 Committee on Ways and Means, at the direction of the Speaker, for a further report before being acted upon by the House. 22 23 All standing committees, other than the Standing Committee on Finance and (b)24 the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, when favorably reporting any bill which in any way or manner raises revenue, reduces revenue, levies a tax, authorizes the levying 25 of a tax, an assessment, or a fee, or authorizes the issue of bonds or notes, whether public, 26 27 public-local, or private, shall indicate same in the report, and said bill shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance or the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, at 28 29 the direction of the Speaker, for a further report before being acted upon by the House. Action on Amendment Before Re-Referral. If any standing committee 30 (c)recommends adoption of an amendment or committee substitute of a bill which, under the 31 rules of the House must be referred to the Standing Committees on Appropriations, 32 33 Standing Committee on Finance, or Standing Committee on Ways and Means, the amendment or committee substitute shall be considered and, if adopted, the amendment 34 35 or substitute engrossed before the bill is re-referred. 36 RULE 39. Recall of Bill From Standing Committee; Discharge Petition. – 37 (a) When a House bill has been introduced and referred to a standing committee, or when

(a) When a House bill has been introduced and referred to a standing committee, or when
a Senate bill has been referred to a standing committee, if after 10 legislative days the
standing committee has failed to report the bill, then the introducer of the House bill or
some member designated by him, or some House member designated by the introducer of
the Senate bill, may, after three legislative days' public notice given in the House and
delivered in writing to the Chair of the standing committee, on motion supported by a
vote of three-fifths (3/5) of the members of the House, recall the same from the standing

committee to the floor of the House for consideration and such action thereon as a
 majority of the members present may direct.

3 (b) A motion to discharge a committee from consideration of a bill or 4 resolution may be filed with the Principal Clerk if accompanied by a petition signed by three-fifths (3/5) of the members of the House asking that the committee be discharged 5 6 from further consideration of the bill or resolution. No petition may be circulated for 7 signatures until 10 legislative days after the bill has been referred to the committee. No 8 petition may be circulated for signature until notice has been given on the floor of the 9 House that the petition is to be circulated. If such a motion accompanied by a valid 10 petition is filed, the Principal Clerk shall place that motion on the calendar for the next legislative day as a special order of business. If the motion is adopted by the House, then 11 12 the committee to which the bill or resolution has been referred to is discharged from further consideration of the bill or resolution, and that bill or resolution is placed on the 13 14 calendar for the next legislative day as a special order of business. If the committee had, 15 prior to discharge, adopted any amendment or committee substitute for the bill, it shall be in order to offer that amendment or substitute on the floor as if it were a committee 16 17 amendment or substitute. The Principal Clerk shall provide a form for discharge petitions. 18 This rule shall not be temporarily suspended without one day's notice on the (c)

motion given in the House and delivered in writing to the Chair of the standing committee, and to sustain that motion two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the House shall be required.

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(d) Subsection (b) of this rule applies only if the Senate has a similar rule.

RULE 39.1. **Recall of Bill From Permanent Subcommittee.** – When a House bill has been referred to a permanent subcommittee, if after 10 legislative days the subcommittee has failed to act thereon, or at any time, with the agreement of the subcommittee Chair, the standing committee Chair may re-refer the bill from that permanent subcommittee to another permanent subcommittee of the same standing committee provided the report of the re-referral shall be made pursuant to Rule 32.

29 RULE 39.2. Re-Referral of Bills From One Standing Committee to Another Standing Committee. – Upon consent of the sponsor of the bill, the Speaker, 30 the Chair of the standing committee from whom the bill is to be re-referred, and the Chair 31 32 of the standing committee to whom the bill is to be re-referred, the Chair of the standing 33 committee from whom the bill is to be re-referred or the Chair of the Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House may move for a re-referral to another 34 35 standing committee and the bill shall be re-referred upon vote of the majority present 36 during a regular session of the House.

RULE 40. **Calendars and Schedules of Business.** – (a) The Clerk of the House shall prepare a daily schedule of business, including the Calendar of Bills and Resolutions for consideration and debate that day, in accordance with the Order of Business of the Day (Rule 5). The Clerk shall number all bills and resolutions in the order in which they are introduced. All bills and resolutions shall be taken up as they appear in each category (Rule 5(10)) in the order they were placed on the Calendar under Rule 36(a).

When a public bill has received a recommendation for a favorable report, (b)1 2 favorable report as amended, or favorable as to committee substitute, and the vote in the 3 committee was unanimous of the members present and voting, the Chair of the 4 Committee (or the Chair of the subcommittee if the bill is being reported directly to the 5 floor) may designate in the committee report that the bill is to go on the consent calendar. 6 The bill shall appear on the consent calendar for the second legislative day after the 7 report is made. The Principal Clerk shall note on the calendar for the next legislative day 8 the bills, including short titles, that will appear on the consent calendar for the following 9 legislative day. A bill shall be removed from the consent calendar if any member of the 10 House makes such request in writing to the Principal Clerk no later than one hour before convening of the House on the day the bill appears on the consent calendar, and in such 11 12 case the bill shall be placed on the regular calendar for that day. It shall not be in order to 13 offer any amendment to a bill on the consent calendar except committee amendments. 14 The Speaker may recognize the sponsor of the bill for not to exceed two minutes of 15 debate (or a person designated by the Chair of the committee reporting the bill in the case of a Senate bill). The Speaker shall then put the question on the bill. The bill shall 16 17 appear on the consent calendar for third reading unless a member requests, no later than 18 the adjournment of the daily session when the bill passed second reading, that the bill appear on the regular calendar. 19

RULE 41. **Reading of Bills.** – (a) Every bill shall receive three readings in the House prior to its passage. The first reading and reference to standing committee of a House bill shall occur on the next legislative day following its introduction. The first reading and reference to standing committee of a Senate bill shall occur on the next legislative day following its receipt on messages from the Senate. The Speaker shall give notice at each subsequent reading whether it be the second or third reading.

(b) No bill shall be read more than once on the same day without the concurrence
of two-thirds (2/3) of the members present and voting; provided, no bill governed by
Article II, Section 23 of the North Carolina Constitution or described in Rule 20 (a)(2)
herein shall be read twice on one day under any circumstance.

RULE 42. Effect of a Defeated Bill. - (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection
(b) of this rule, after a bill has:

32 1. Been tabled,

- 2. Been postponed indefinitely,
  - 3. Failed to pass on any of its readings, or
- 4. Been placed on the unfavorable calendar,

the contents of that bill or the principal provisions of its subject matter shall not be considered in any other measure originating in the Senate or originating thereafter in the House. Upon the point of order being raised and sustained by the Chair, that measure shall be laid upon the table, and shall not be taken therefrom except by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting.

41 (b) No local bill shall be held by the Chair to embody the contents of or the 42 principal provisions of the subject matter of any statewide measure which has been laid 1 on the table, has failed to pass on any of its readings, or has been placed on the 2 unfavorable calendar.

RULE 43. Amendments. – No amendment to a measure before the House shall be in order unless the amendment is germane to the measure under consideration. A House amendment deleting a previously adopted House amendment shall not be in order, except that this sentence does not apply to amendments adopted under Rule 38(c).

If the Senate adopts an amendment or committee substitute to a House bill, the
House may not refuse to receive the bill on account of lack of germaneness if the Senate
has a similar rule.

Only one principal (first degree) amendment shall be pending at any one time. If a subsequent or substitute principal amendment shall be offered, the Speaker shall rule it out of order. However, any member desiring to offer a subsequent or substitute principal amendment in opposition to the pending amendment may inform the House by way of argument against the pending amendment that if it is defeated the member proposes to offer another principal amendment, and the member may then read and explain such proposed amendment.

Perfecting (or second degree) amendments may be offered and considered without limitation as to number, and in the event of multiple perfecting amendments, they shall be voted upon in inverse order.

RULE 43.1. Engrossment. – Bills and resolutions, except those making
 appropriations, which originate in the House and which are amended, shall be engrossed
 before being sent to the Senate.

RULE 43.2. House Concurrence in Senate Amendments to House Bills. –
 The House shall not concur in a Senate amendment to a bill originating in the House until
 the next legislative day after the day on which the House receives the Senate amendment.

RULE 43.3. Committee Substitutes Adopted by the Senate to Bills Originating in the House; Procedure for Treatment of Material Amendments Thereto. -(a) Whenever the Senate has adopted a committee substitute for a bill originating in the House, and has returned the bill to the House for concurrence in that committee substitute, the House may not concur in that committee substitute until the next legislative day following the day on which the House receives that committee substitute.

32 (b) The Speaker may, and upon motion supported by a majority of the House 33 present and voting shall, refer the bill to an appropriate standing committee for 34 consideration of the committee substitute.

(c) The Speaker shall, in placing the bill on the calendar, rule whether the
 committee substitute is a material amendment under Article II, Section 23 of the State's
 Constitution which reads:

38 "Revenue bills. – No law shall be enacted to raise money on the credit of the State, or 39 to pledge the faith of the State directly or indirectly for the payment of any debt, or to 40 impose any tax upon the people of the State, or to allow the counties, cities, or towns to 41 do so, unless the bill for the purpose shall have been read three several times in each 42 House of the General Assembly and passed three several readings, which readings shall 43 have been on three different days, and shall have been agreed to by each House

20	House, or shall refuse to concur in a substitute adopted by the Senate for a bill originating
21	in the House or whenever the Senate shall decline or refuse to concur in amendments put
22	by the House to a bill originating in the Senate, or shall refuse to concur in a substitute
23	adopted by the House for a bill originating in the Senate, a conference committee may be
24	appointed by the Speaker upon the Speaker's own motion or shall be appointed upon
25	request by the principal sponsor of the original bill, the Chair of the House standing
26	committee which reported the bill, or by the sponsor of the amendment in which the
27	Senate refused to concur; and the bill under consideration shall thereupon go to and be
28	considered by the joint conferees on the part of the House and Senate. In appointing

41	or two-thirds $(2/3)$ vote of the members present and voting, no bill shall be sent from the Heure on the day of the again
42	House on the day of its passage, except on the last day of the session.
43	VII. LEGISLATIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

1 2 RULE 45. **Elected Officers.** -(a) The House shall elect one of its members Speaker.

3 (b) The House shall elect one of its members Speaker Pro Tempore who shall 4 perform such duties as the Speaker may assign and shall preside over the House in the 5 absence or incapacity of the Speaker and shall perform all of the duties of the Speaker 6 until such time the Speaker may assume the Chair.

7 The House shall elect a Principal Clerk, who shall continue in office until (c) 8 another is elected. The Speaker shall appoint a Reading Clerk and a Sergeant-at-Arms, 9 who shall serve at the Speaker's pleasure. The Principal Clerk, Reading Clerk, and 10 Sergeant-at-Arms shall have and perform duties and responsibilities, not inconsistent with these rules, as the Speaker may assign. Unless directed otherwise by the Speaker on 11 12 behalf of the House, the Principal Clerk or an employee designated by the Principal Clerk shall receive House bills not approved by the Governor. In addition, the Sergeant-at-13 14 Arms may assign the Reading Clerk additional duties, to be performed while the House is 15 not in its daily session.

16 RULE 46. Assistants to Principal Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms. – The 17 Principal Clerk and the Sergeant-at-Arms may appoint, with the approval of the Speaker, 18 such assistants as may be necessary to the efficient discharge of the duties of their 19 respective offices.

RULE 47. Speaker's Clerk, Chaplain, and Pages. – (a) The Speaker may appoint
one or more clerks to the Speaker, a Chaplain of the House, and pages to wait upon the
sessions of the House.

(b) When the House is not in session, the pages shall be under the supervision ofthe Supervisor of Pages.

25 (c) No member may have more than 10 persons designated as honorary pages.

RULE 48. **Clerks and Secretaries.** – (a) Each standing committee and permanent subcommittee shall have a clerk. The clerk to a standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall serve as secretary to the Chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee.

30 (b) Each member shall be assigned a secretary, unless the member has a standing 31 committee or permanent subcommittee clerk to serve as secretary.

32 The selection and retention of clerks and secretaries shall be the sole 33 prerogative of the individual member or members. Such clerks and secretaries shall file initial applications for employment with the Principal Clerk and shall receive 34 35 compensation as prescribed by the Legislative Services Commission. The employment period of clerks and secretaries shall commence not earlier than the convening date of the 36 General Assembly and shall terminate not later than the final adjournment or recess of the 37 38 General Assembly unless employment for an extended period is approved by the 39 Speaker. The clerks and secretaries shall adhere to such uniform rules and regulations 40 not inconsistent with these rules regarding hours and other conditions of employment as the Legislative Services Commission shall fix by appropriate regulations. 41

42 RULE 49. **Compensation of Clerks and Secretaries.** – No clerk, laborer, or 43 other person employed or appointed under Rules 46, 47, and 48 hereof shall receive

during such employment, appointment, or service, any compensation from any 1 2 department of the State government, and there shall not be voted, paid, or awarded any 3 additional pay, bonus, or gratuity to any of them; but they shall receive only the pay now 4 provided by law for such duties and services. 5 **VIII. PRIVILEGES OF THE HALL** RULE 50. Admittance to Floor. - No person except members, officers, and 6 7 employees of the General Assembly and former members of the General Assembly who 8 are not registered under the provisions of Article 9 of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes 9 of North Carolina shall be allowed on the floor of the House during its session, unless 10 permitted by the Speaker or otherwise provided by law. Employees of the General Assembly shall wear identification tags, approved by the Legislative Services Officer, 11 12 when on the floor of the House. 13 RULE 51. Admittance of Press. – Reporters wishing to take down debates 14 may be admitted by the Speaker, who shall assign such places to them on the floor or 15 elsewhere, to effect this object, as shall not interfere with the convenience of the House. 16 Reporters admitted to the floor of the House shall observe the same requirements of attire 17 for members contained in Rule 12(h). 18 RULE 52. Extending Courtesies. – Courtesies of the floor, galleries, or lobby 19 shall be extended at the discretion of the Speaker and only by the Speaker. Requests by 20 members to extend these courtesies shall be typewritten and delivered to the Speaker. No 21 member shall orally ask the Speaker to extend these courtesies during the daily session. 22 RULE 53. Order in Galleries and Lobby. - In case of any disturbance or 23 disorderly conduct in the galleries or lobby, the Speaker or other presiding officer is 24 empowered to order the same to be cleared. 25 **IX. GENERAL RULES** 26 RULE 54. Attendance of Members. - No member or officer of the House 27 shall absent himself from the service of the House without leave, unless from sickness or 28 disability. 29 RULE 55. Documents to Be Signed by the Speaker. - All acts, addresses, 30 and resolutions and all warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House shall be 31 signed by the Speaker or other presiding officer. 32 RULE 56. Printing or Reproducing Materials. – There shall be no printing 33 or reproducing of paper(s) that are not legislative in essence except upon approval of the Speaker. 34 35 RULE 57. Placement or Circulation of Materials. - Persons other than 36 members of the House shall not place or cause to be placed any materials on members' desks in the House Chamber without obtaining approval of the Speaker. Any material 37 38 placed on members' desks in the House Chamber, or circulated to House members 39 anywhere in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building, shall bear the 40 name of the originator. RULE 58. **Rules, Rescission and Alteration.** -(a) These rules shall not be 41 42 permanently rescinded or altered except by House simple resolution passed by a twothirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting. The introducer of the resolution 43

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must on the floor of the House give notice of intent to introduce the resolution on thelegislative day preceding its introduction.

3 (b) Except as otherwise provided herein, the House upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of 4 the members present and voting may temporarily suspend any rule.

5 RULE 59. **Cosponsorship of Bills and Resolutions.** – (a) Any member 6 wishing to cosponsor a bill or resolution which has been introduced may do so by 7 appearing in the office of the Principal Clerk for such purpose within one-half hour 8 following the adjournment of the session during which such bill or resolution was first 9 read and referred.

10 (b) No member shall permit anyone, other than that member's secretary or clerk, or 11 another member, to have possession of and solicit for bill or resolution cosponsorship, the 12 jacket of a bill or resolution.

13 RULE 60. **Correcting of Typographical Errors.** – The Legislative Services 14 Officer may correct typographical errors appearing in House bills or resolutions provided 15 that such corrections are made before ratification and do not conflict with any actions or 16 rules of the Senate and provided further that such correction be approved by the Chair of 17 the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, the Speaker, 18 or other presiding officer.

19 RULE 61. Assignment of Seats. – After initial assignment of seats, a member 20 shall continue to occupy the seat to which initially assigned until assigned a permanent 21 seat; once assigned a permanent seat, the member shall occupy it for the entire biennial 22 session. In event of vacancy, that member's successor will occupy the seat of the member 23 replaced for the remainder of the biennial session.

RULE 61.1. **Office Assignments.** – The Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House shall assign to each member an office space. When available, Chairs of standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall be assigned an office adjacent to the room in which the standing committee or permanent subcommittee generally meets if the Chair so desires. The Speaker shall be assigned an office of his or her choice.

RULE 61.2. **Convening and Assigning Seats in the New House.** – (a) The Principal Clerk of the previous House of Representatives shall convene the House of Representatives at 12:00 noon on the date established by law for the convening of each regular session, and preside over the body until the members elect a Speaker. In the case of a vacancy, inability, or refusal to so serve, the duty shall devolve upon the sergeant-atarms of the prior House, and in the case of a vacancy in that office, or inability or refusal to so serve, the duty shall devolve upon the reading clerk of the prior House.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House of the prior House to assign seats to the members of the House of Representatives in its Chamber. In the case of a death of the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, or that Chair's inability or refusal to serve, the Speaker of the prior House of Representatives shall appoint a person to assign seats to members of the House of Representatives in its Chamber. In the event that the party that had a majority of members in the prior House

will no longer have a majority of members of the new House, then the duty assigned in 1 2 this subsection to the Chair of the committee of the prior House shall instead be the duty 3 of the person nominated as Speaker by the majority party caucus for the new House, or 4 some member-elect designated by the Speaker-nominee. In the event no party will have 5 a majority, then the duty assigned in this subsection to the Chair of the committee of the 6 prior House shall instead be the joint duty of one person chosen each by the caucuses of the two parties having the greatest numbers of members. 7 8 RULE 62. Matters Not Covered in These Rules. - Except as herein set out 9 the rules of Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall govern the operation of the 10 House.
