H 998. STATE PRIVACY ACT. TO PROVIDE UNDER STATE LAW A MIRROR AS TO FEDERAL LAW ON WHEN A SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER CAN BE REQUIRED TO BE PROVIDED. Makes it unlawful for state or local government agency to deny any person any right, benefit, or privilege because that person refuses to disclose his or her social security account number, with following exceptions: the disclosure is permitted or required by federal law; or the disclosure is to a state agency or local government that is maintaining a system of records that was in existence and operating before Jan. 1, 1975, if disclosure was required by statute or regulation adopted before that date in order to verify the identity of an individual. Provides that if a state agency or local government requests an individual to disclose his or her social security account number, the agency or government must inform the person whether disclosure is mandatory or voluntary, under what authority the number is sought, and what uses will be made of the number.
