2 AN ACT TO APPOINT PERSONS TO VARIOUS PUBLIC OFFICES UPON THE
3 RECOMMENDATION OF THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE OF THE SENATE
4 AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND TO
5 MAKE VARIOUS CHANGES TO BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS.

6 Whereas, G.S. 120-121 authorizes the General Assembly to make certain
7 appointments to public offices upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore
8 of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and

9 Whereas, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the
10 House of Representatives have made recommendations; Now, therefore,
11 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

29 the unexpired term.

39 its first meeting held on or after July 1 of each year, the Commission shall elect from its
40 members a chairman and vice-chairman to serve through June 30 of the next following

18 residential school; one parent of a student in a preschool program; and one parent of a
19 student in a mainstream education program, with at least one parent coming from each
20 region of the North Carolina schools for the deaf regions. One member appointed by the
21 Governor shall be recommended by the President of the North Carolina Association of
22 the Deaf; one member shall be recommended by the President of the North Carolina
23 Pediatric Society; one member shall be recommended by the President of the North
24 Carolina Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf; and one member shall be nominated by
25 the Superintendent of Public Instruction. ~~One member~~ Two members shall be appointed
26 from the House of Representatives by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and
27 ~~one member~~ two members shall be appointed from the Senate by the President Pro
28 Tempore of the Senate. The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall appoint six
29 members as follows: one from the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, one from the
30 Division of Aging, one from the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities,
31 and Substance Abuse Services, one from the Division of Social Services, one from a
32 North Carolina Chapter of SHHH (Self Help for the Hard of Hearing), and one from
33 SPEAK (Statewide Parents' Education and Advocacy for Kids)."

35 —BOARD OF CORRECTION

36 **SECTION 2.15.** G.S. 143B-265(b) reads as rewritten:

37 "(b) The Board of Correction shall consist of one voting member from each of the
38 ~~12-13~~ congressional districts, appointed by the Governor to serve at his pleasure. One
39 member shall be a psychiatrist or a psychologist, one an attorney with experience in the
40 criminal courts, one a judge in the General Court of Justice and nine members appointed
41 at large. The Secretary of Correction shall be an additional nonvoting member and
42 chairman ex officio. The terms of office of the nine members presently serving on the

1 Board shall continue, but any vacancy occurring on or after July 1, 1983, shall be filled
2 by the Governor in compliance with the requirement of membership from the various
3 congressional districts."

5 —ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT COMMISSION

6 **SECTION 2.16.** G.S. 143B-283(d) reads as rewritten:

7 "(d) In addition to the members designated by subsection (a) of this section, the
8 General Assembly shall appoint ~~four~~six members, ~~two~~three upon the recommendation
9 of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and ~~two~~three upon the recommendation
10 of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Appointments by the General Assembly
11 shall be made in accordance with G.S. 120-121, and vacancies in those appointments
12 shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. Members appointed by the General
13 Assembly shall serve terms of two years."

14
15 —AERONAUTICS COUNCIL

16 **SECTION 2.17.** G.S. 143B-357(a) reads as rewritten:

17 "(a) The Aeronautics Council of the Department of Transportation shall consist of
18 ~~14~~15 members appointed by the Governor, who, in making such appointments, shall
19 designate one person from each of the congressional districts of the State and two
20 members selected at large. At least four of the appointed members shall possess a broad
21 knowledge of aviation and airport development.

22 Five of the initial members of the Council shall be the five members of the
23 Governor's Aviation Committee whose terms expire on June 30, 1977, who shall serve
24 on the Council until June 30, 1977. Thereafter, their successors shall be appointed for a

26 four years beginning July 1, 1975. The initial term of the member representing the 12th
27 Congressional District shall commence on January 3, 1993, and expire on June 30,
28 1996. Thereafter, after the expiration of their respective terms of office, the successors
29 shall be appointed for terms of four years. Any appointment to fill a vacancy on the
30 Council created by the resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be
31 for the balance of the unexpired term."

33 —PROGRESS BOARD

34 **SECTION 2.18.** G.S. 143B-372.1(c) reads as rewritten:

35 "(c) The Governor or the Governor's designee shall be chair of the North Carolina
36 Progress Board. The Governor shall appoint a vice-chair from among the membership
37 of the North Carolina Progress Board to serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The
38 North Carolina Progress Board may elect such other officers as it sees fit."

39
40 —HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION

41 **SECTION 2.19.** G.S. 143B-392(a) reads as rewritten:

1 "(a) The Human Relations Commission of the Department of Administration shall
2 consist of ~~21~~22 members. The Governor shall appoint one member from each of the
3 ~~12~~13 congressional districts, plus five members at large, including the chairperson. The
4 Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives shall appoint two members to
5 the Commission. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint two members
6 to the Commission. The terms of four of the members appointed by the Governor shall
7 expire June 30, 1988. The terms of four of the members appointed by the Governor
8 shall expire June 30, 1987. The terms of four of the members appointed by the
9 Governor shall expire June 30, 1986. The terms of four of the members appointed by
10 the Governor shall expire June 30, 1985. The terms of the members appointed by the
11 Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives shall expire June 30, 1986. The
12 terms of the members appointed by the Lieutenant Governor shall expire June 30, 1986.
13 The initial term of office of the person appointed to represent the 12th Congressional
14 District shall commence on January 3, 1993, and expire on June 30, 1996. At the end of
15 the respective terms of office of the initial members of the Commission, the
16 appointment of their successors shall be for terms of four years. No member of the
17 commission shall serve more than two consecutive terms. A member having served two
18 consecutive terms shall be eligible for reappointment one year after the expiration of his
19 second term. Any appointment to fill a vacancy on the Commission created by the
20 resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be filled in the manner of
21 the original appointment for the unexpired term."

23 —GOVERNOR'S ADVOCACY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH

24 **SECTION 2.20.** G.S. 143B-415(a) reads as rewritten:

25 "(a) The Governor's Advocacy Council on Children and Youth shall consist of ~~18~~
26 19 members. The composition of the Council shall be as follows: two members
27 appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate from the membership of the
28 Senate; two members selected by the Speaker of the House of Representatives from the
29 membership of the House of Representatives; ~~14~~15 members appointed by the

31 Of the members appointed by the Governor, at least one shall come from each

41 **SECTION 2.21.** Part 27 of Article 9 of Chapter 143B, as recodified by
42 Section 7.6 of S.L. 2001-424, reads as rewritten:

2 **"§ 143B-426.30. North Carolina Board of Science and Technology; creation;**
3 **powers and duties.**

4 The North Carolina Board of Science and Technology of the Department of
5 ~~Administration-Commerce~~ is created. The Board has the following powers and duties:

- 6 (1) To identify, and to support and foster the identification of, important
7 research needs of both public and private agencies, institutions and
8 organizations in North ~~Carolina~~Carolina that relate to the State's
9 economic growth and development;
- 10 (2) To make recommendations concerning policies, procedures,
11 organizational structures and financial requirements that will promote
12 effective use of scientific and technological resources in fulfilling the
13 research needs ~~identified~~identified and that will promote the economic
14 growth and development of North Carolina;
- 15 (3) To allocate funds available to the Board to support research projects,
16 to purchase research equipment and supplies, to construct or modify
17 research facilities, to employ consultants, and for other purposes
18 necessary or appropriate in discharging the duties of the ~~Board~~Board;
- 19 (4) To advise and make recommendations to the Governor, the Secretary
20 of Commerce, and the Economic Development Board on the role of
21 science and technology in the economic growth and development of
22 North Carolina.

23 **"§ 143B-426.31. North Carolina Board of Science and Technology; membership;**
24 **organization; compensation; staff services.**

25 (a) The North Carolina Board of Science and Technology consists of the
26 Governor, the Secretary of Commerce, the Science Advisor to the Governor, and 17
27 members appointed as follows: the Governor shall appoint one member from the
28 University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, one member from North Carolina State
29 University at Raleigh, and two members from other components of the University of
30 North Carolina, all nominated by the President of the University of North Carolina; one
31 member from Duke University, nominated by the President of Duke University; one
32 member from a private college or university, other than Duke University, in North
33 Carolina, nominated by the President of the Association of Private Colleges and
34 Universities; one member from the Research Triangle Institute, nominated by the
35 executive committee of the board of that institute; one member from the
36 Microelectronics Center of North Carolina, nominated by the executive committee of
37 the board of that center; one member from the North Carolina Biotechnology Center,
38 nominated by the executive committee of the board of that center; four members from
39 private industry in North Carolina, at least one of whom shall be a professional engineer
40 registered pursuant to Chapter 89C of the General Statutes or a person who holds at
41 least a bachelors degree in engineering from an accredited college or university; and
42 two members from public agencies in North Carolina. Two members shall be appointed

1 by the General Assembly, one shall be appointed upon the recommendation of the
2 President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and one shall be appointed upon the
3 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with
4 G.S. 120-121. The nominating authority for any vacancy on the Board among members
5 appointed by the Governor shall submit to the Governor two nominations for each
6 position to be filled, and the persons so nominated shall represent different disciplines.

7 (b) Members appointed to the Board by the General Assembly shall serve for
8 two-year terms beginning 1 July of odd-numbered years. Vacancies in appointments
9 made by the General Assembly shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. The
10 two members from public agencies shall serve for terms expiring at the end of the term
11 of the Governor appointing them. The other 13 members appointed to the Board by the
12 Governor shall serve for four-year terms, and until their successors are appointed and
13 qualified. Of those 13 members, six shall serve for terms that expire on 30 June of years
14 that follow by one year those years that are evenly divisible by four, and seven shall
15 serve for terms that expire on 30 June of years that follow by three years those years
16 that are evenly divisible by four. Any appointment to fill a vacancy on the Board created
17 by the resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be for the balance of
18 the unexpired term.

19 (c) The Governor or the Governor's designee shall serve as ~~chairman~~ chair of the
20 Board. The vice ~~chairman~~ vice-chair and the secretary of the Board shall be designated
21 by the Governor or the Governor's designee from among the members of the Board. ~~The~~
22 ~~Science Advisor to the Governor shall serve as executive director of the Board. The~~
23 ~~Secretary of Administration or his designee shall serve as secretary to the Board.~~

24 (d) The Governor may remove any member of the Board from office in
25 accordance with the provisions of G.S. 143B-16.

26 (e) Members of the Board who are employees of State agencies or institutions
27 shall receive subsistence and travel allowances authorized by G.S. 138-6. Legislative
28 members of the Board shall receive subsistence and travel allowances authorized by
29 G.S. 120-3.1.

30 (f) A majority of the Board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

31 (g) The Secretary of ~~Administration~~ Commerce shall provide all clerical and
32 other services required by the Board."

34 —VIRGINIA-NORTH CAROLINA INTERSTATE HIGH-SPEED RAIL
35 COMMISSION

36 **SECTION 2.22.** Section 1 of S.L. 2001-266 reads as rewritten:

37 "**SECTION 1.** Upon the Virginia General Assembly's concurring action, the
38 Virginia-North Carolina Interstate High-Speed Rail Commission is established. The
39 North Carolina component shall consist of ~~six~~ eight members to be appointed as
40 follows:

- 41 (1) Three members of the House of Representatives to be appointed by the
42 Speaker of the House of ~~Representatives; and~~ Representatives.

- 1 (1a) One public member appointed by the Speaker of the House of
2 Representatives; and

10 member Board of Trustees. ~~Three-Four~~ members shall be appointed by the Governor,
11 ~~three-four~~ by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro
12 Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120-121, and ~~three-four~~ by the General
13 Assembly upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in
14 accordance with G.S. 120-121. Persons appointed shall be knowledgeable in the
15 acquisition and management of natural areas. Each appointing officer shall designate

17 and one to serve a six-year term. Thereafter, all appointments shall be for six years,
18 subject to reappointment. ~~All initial appointments shall be made on or before January 1,~~
19 ~~1988.~~ Appointments shall expire January 1 of even-numbered years. The Governor shall
20 appoint one Trustee to serve as Chairman of the Board. The Secretary shall provide the
21 Trustees with staff support and meeting facilities using expenditures from the Fund. The
22 office of Trustee is declared to be an office that may be held concurrently with any other
23 executive or appointive office, under the authority of Article VI, Section 9, of the North
24 Carolina Constitution."

25 **SECTION 2.23.(b)** The three members of the Natural Heritage Trust Fund
26 Board of Trustees appointed under G.S. 113-77.8(a), as amended by subsection (a) of
27 this section, shall be appointed on or before January 1, 2002. Notwithstanding G.S.
28 113-77.8(a), the member of the Natural Heritage Trust Fund Board of Trustees
29 appointed by the Governor under G.S. 113-77.8(a), as amended by subsection (a) of this
30 section, shall serve an initial term of two years; the member of the Natural Heritage
31 Trust Fund Board of Trustees appointed by the General Assembly upon the
32 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives under G.S.
33 113-77.8(a), as amended by subsection (a) of this section, shall serve an initial term of
34 four years; and the member of the Natural Heritage Trust Fund Board of Trustees
35 appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro
36 Tempore of the Senate under G.S. 113-77.8(a), as amended by subsection (a) of this
37 section, shall serve an initial term of six years. Thereafter, the terms of all members of
38 the Natural Heritage Trust Fund Board of Trustees appointed under G.S. 113-77.8(a), as
39 amended by subsection (a) of this section, shall be for six years. This section shall not
40 be construed to affect the terms of current members of the Natural Heritage Trust Fund
41 Board of Trustees.

42 **SECTION 2.24.** G.S. 143B-344.30 reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 143B-344.32. Staff and offices.**

2 The Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall provide office space
3 and staff for the State Infrastructure Council as requested by the Council. Upon the
4 request of a chair of the State Infrastructure Council, who is also a member of the
5 General Assembly, the Legislative Services Office shall also provide professional staff
6 services to the Council."
