11			alcohol screening test.		
12		<u>(2)</u>	Attempt to foil or defeat a drug or alcohol screening	test by the	
13			substitution or spiking of a sample or the advertisement of	of a sample	
14			substitution or other spiking device or measure.		
15	<u>(b)</u>	<u>It is </u>	unlawful for a person to do any of the following:		
16		<u>(1)</u>	Adulterate a urine or other bodily fluid sample with the	ne intent to	
17			defraud a drug or alcohol screening test.		
18		<u>(2)</u>	Possess adulterants that are intended to be used to adulterate	<u>te a urine or</u>	
19			other bodily fluid sample for the purpose of defrauding	a drug or	
20			alcohol screening test.		
21		<u>(3)</u>	Sell adulterants with the intent that they be used to adulterant	te a urine or	
22			other bodily fluid sample for the purpose of defrauding	<u>a drug or</u>	
23			alcohol screening test.		
24	<u>(c)</u>	A vi	olation of this section is punishable as follows:		
25		<u>(1)</u>	For a first offense under this section, the person is guilty of	of a Class 1	
26			misdemeanor.		
27		<u>(2)</u>	For a second or subsequent offense under this section, the	e person is	
28			guilty of a Class I felony."		

SECTION 2. Section 1 of this act becomes effective December 1, 2002, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.
