| 5 | Whereas, women that receive no prenatal care are three times more likely to |
| 6 | deliver a low birth weight baby; and |
| 7 | Whereas, eighty percent (80%) of women at risk for having a low birth |
| 8 | weight baby can be identified through their first prenatal visit; and |
| 9 | Whereas, a shift of only half a pound (250 grams) in a baby's birth weight |
| 10 | saves an average of \$14,000 in first year medical costs alone, and a shift of just over one |
| 11 | pound (500 grams) saves about \$28,000; and |
| 12 | Whereas, the cost of caring for five low birth weight babies will pay for the |
| 13 | prenatal care of 149 women; and |
| 14 | Whereas, hospitals and physicians receive payment for delivery in hospitals |
| 15 | through Emergency Medicaid, but prenatal care is not covered; and |
| 16 | Whereas, the demand for prenatal services offered to non-Medicaid, |
| 17 | low-income patients served in local public health departments has increased |
| 18 | significantly due to the surge of the uninsured population; and |
| 19 | Whereas, block grant funds, which are a combination of State and federal |
| 20 | funding, have decreased since the mid 1990's and are projected to continue to decrease; |

| 22 | Whereas, appropriations from local governments, which have made up the |
| 23 | additional revenue needed to keep the local health department maternity program viable, |
| 24 | have decreased due to the rising costs of the county share of Medicaid and the |
| 25 | withholding of tax revenue from the State; and |

Whereas, many counties have serious concern for the future viability of their
maternity programs, which will limit the access of care for uninsured maternity patients;
Now, therefore,

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5 **SECTION 1.** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 6 Department of Health and Human Services the sum of seven million dollars 7 (\$7,000,000) for the 2003-2004 fiscal year and the sum of seven million dollars 8 (\$7,000,000) for the 2004-2005 fiscal year. These funds shall be allocated to local 9 public health departments for service delivery to non-Medicaid, low-income prenatal 10 patients.

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SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2003.
