A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO EXPAND THE STATE/COUNTY SPECIAL ASSISTANCE IN-HOME
DEMONSTRATION PROJECT BY PERMITTING THE DEPARTMENT OF
HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF
INDIVIDUALS WHO MAY BE ENROLLED IN THE PROJECT.

6 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1.(a) The Department of Health and Human Services may use 7 8 funds from the existing State/County Special Assistance for Adults budget to provide 9 Special Assistance payments to eligible individuals in in-home living arrangements. These payments may be made for up to a two-year period beginning July 1, 2003, and 10 ending June 30, 2005. The standard monthly payment to individuals enrolled in the 11 Special Assistance demonstration project shall be fifty percent (50%) of the monthly 12 payment the individual would receive if the individual resided in an adult care home and 13 qualified for Special Assistance, except if a lesser payment amount is appropriate for the 14 individual as determined by the local case manager. The Department shall implement 15 Special Assistance in-home eligibility policies and procedures to assure that 16 demonstration project participants are those individuals who need and, but for the 17 18 demonstration project, would seek placement in an adult care home facility. The Department shall make this demonstration project available to all counties on a 19 voluntary basis. To the maximum extent possible, the Department shall consider 20 geographic balance in the dispersion of payments to individuals across the State. The 21 22 Department shall make an interim report to the cochairs of the House of Representatives 23 Appropriations Committee, the cochairs of the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the cochairs of the Senate 24 Appropriations Committee, and the Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee on 25 Human Resources by June 30, 2004, and a final report by January 1, 2005. The final 26 27 report shall also be sent to the North Carolina Study Commission on Aging. This report shall include the following information: 28

18		level and quantity of services for residents in adult care homes.		
19	(9)	A fiscal analysis and programmatic results of increasing the		
20		demonstration project participant's monthly assistance payment to fifty		
21		percent (50%) of the Special Assistance monthly payment.		
22	(10)	A fiscal analysis of the budgetary impact of any increases in staff		
23		responsibility resulting from utilization of the Demonstration Program.		
24	SECT	FION 1.(b) The Department shall incorporate data collection tools		
25	designed to con	mpare quality of life among institutionalized vs. noninstitutionalized		
26	populations (i.e	. an individual's perception of his or her own health and well-being,		
27	years of health	y life, and activity limitations). To the extent national standards are		
28	available, the De	epartment shall utilize those standards.		
29	SECT	FION 1.(c) The Department shall expand its report of the		
30	Demonstration Program in order to fully assess the success of the pilot. The Department			
31	shall contract with an independent consultant to develop an evaluation design that			
32	ensures that the evaluation includes an assessment of the impact of the Program on the			
33	economic security, health, and well-being of the participants.			
34	SECTION 2. The Department of Health and Human Services shall use funds			
35	appropriated to it for the 2003 biennium for the Special Assistance payments authorized			
36	in Section 1 of t	his act.		
37	SECT	FION 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2003.		
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
