9	(a) Short Title. – This section shall be known and may be cited as the 'Accessible'

22	<u>(1)</u>	Accessible electronic information service. – A service where news and	
23		other timely information, including newspapers, is provided to eligible	
24		individuals from a multistate service center, using high-speed	
25		computers and telecommunications technology for interstate	
26		acquisition of content and rapid distribution in a form appropriate for	
27		use by blind and disabled persons.	
28	(2)	Blind and disabled persons. – Those individuals who are eligible for	
29		library loan services through the Library of Congress and the State	
30		Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped pursuant to 36	
31		C.F.R. § 701.10(b).	
32	(3)	Director. – The Director of the Division of Services for the Blind in	
33		the Department of Health and Human Services.	
34	(4)	Qualified entity. – An agency, instrumentality, or political subdivision

There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 9 Department of Health and Human Services the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars 10 (\$75,000) for the 2004-2005 fiscal year to be used by the Division of Services for the Blind to establish an accessible electronic information service for blind and disabled 11 12 persons in this State. 13 **SECTION 3.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2004.
