8		<b>TION 1.</b> The Legislative Research Commission may conduct a
9	<b>▲</b>	study of the relationship between the State and local governments in
10	•	ovision of services. The study shall address the following issues:
11	(1)	Mandates that the State has placed on local governments regarding the
12		provision of services to State residents. This study shall include a
13		review of which mandates are a result of State law, which mandates
14		are a result of federal law, and which mandates are a result of a
15	( <b>2</b> )	combination of State and federal law.
16	(2)	Funding sources for local governments. The study shall include a
17		review of all appropriations made from the State to local governments,
18 19		all revenues shared between the State and local governments, and all methods of raising revenue allowed by the State to local governments
19 20	(3)	methods of raising revenue allowed by the State to local governments. A comparison of the State-local relationship in North Carolina with the
20 21	(3)	state-local relationships in other states. In particular, the study shall
22		compare the percentage of the costs of services borne by the State in
22		comparison to the percentage of similar cost borne by other states.
24	(4)	A comparison of local governments with regard to the burden on local
25		budgets of mandated programs. This study shall look at the property
26		tax rates in different jurisdictions and the percentage of local budgets
27		that support various programs.

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1	(5) A comparison of the combined State-local tax burden on individuals
2	and businesses in comparison with those in other states.
3	In considering appointees to the committee to study this matter, the
4	appointing authorities shall consider inclusion of local government representatives.
5	The Legislative Research Commission may make a final report of its findings
6	and recommendations to the 2005 General Assembly.
7	SECTION 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General
8	Assembly the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 2004-2005 fiscal
9	year to conduct the study required by this act.
10	<b>SECTION 3.</b> This act becomes effective July 1, 2004.
