BILL SUMMARY: The bill amends G.S. 20-63(h) to change the methodology by which contract agents are compensated by the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) for handling title, registration, and other transactions with the public.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY: DMV paid contract agents \$14,042,104 in calendar 2002 under the current compensation schedule, which lists ten transactions. Section I of the bill groups transactions into four categories and lays out the following new compensation schedule:

Title Transactions	\$2.97
Registration Transactions	\$1.38
Customer Service Transactions	\$1.48
International Registration Plan and	
Motor Carrier Transactions	\$1.64

According to DMV, contract agents would be paid only once for a transaction, i.e., if a customer received a title and registration the contractor would be paid \$2.97 for the Title Transaction, rather than \$2.97 for the Title plus an additional \$1.38 for the registration for a total of \$4.35. Under the DMV interpretation, contract agents would have received an additional \$893,537 in 2002, an increase of 6.4%, based on the number of transactions in that year. The calculation is as follows:

The proposed compensation is assumed to grow by 2% per year as the number of transactions increases. The increased expense in FY2003-04 would be \$911,408, etc.

According to DMV, extensive programming would be necessary to change the current compensation method. Changes to the State Titling and Registration System (STARS) would include reclassification of transaction categories for compensation purposes and modification of the compensation process to treat stand-alone registration services differently than those done in conjunction with a title. DMV estimates that 570 hours of professional time would be required at a cost of \$80 per hour for a total of \$45,600. In addition, there would be additional computer charges of \$6,840 for a total Information Technology cost of \$52,440.

TECHNICAL CONSIDERATIONS: DMV notes that the amount of programming required would mean that a July 1, 2003 implementation date could not be met.

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
