7	"Motor Vehicle Repair Shops and Collision Repair Estimators and Technicians.
8	"§ 20-420. Short title.
9	This Article shall be known as the North Carolina Motor Vehicle Repair Shops and
10	Collision Repairs Licensure Act.
11	" <u>§ 20-421. Purpose.</u>
12	The General Assembly declares that in order to protect the safety and welfare of the
13	people of North Carolina against unqualified motor vehicle repair shops, collision repair
14	estimators, and collision repair technicians or improper motor vehicle or collision
15	repair, it is necessary to provide for the licensing and regulation of certain motor vehicle
16	repair shops, collision repair estimators, and collision repair technicians.
17	" <u>§ 20-422. License required; exemptions.</u>
18	(a) After July 1, 2006, no person shall own or operate a motor vehicle repair shop
19	or engage in business as a collision repair estimator or collision repair technician, unless
20	the person has been properly licensed under the provisions of this Article. Any person
21	violating the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.
22	(b) Nothing in this Article shall be construed to prohibit or affect:
23	(1) Practice by persons employed by any federal, State, or municipal
24	agency.

A motor vehicle repair shop shall be allowed to operate for a period of 30 19 (c) 20 days while the Board inspects and determines the shop's compliance with this Article 21 and the Board's rules. If the Board is unable to complete the inspection within 30 days, the shop will be authorized to operate until the inspection can be completed. 22 23 A license to operate a motor vehicle repair shop shall not be transferable from (d) 24 one location to another or from one owner to another. Reciprocity. 25 Upon filing an application and payment of the required fee, the Board may issue a 26 27 license without examination to an applicant who is licensed to operate a motor vehicle repair shop or licensed as a collision repair estimator or a collision repair technician in 28 29 another state or territory if the requirements for licensure in that state or territory are 30 substantially equal to the requirements for licensure in this State as determined by the Board. 31 32 "§ 20-429. Fees. 33 The Board shall establish fees not to exceed the following amounts: 34 Issuance of a license \$200.00 (1)35 (2)Renewal of a license \$200.00 \$250.00 (3) Examination 36 \$150.00 37 (4)Reinstatement 38 (5) \$150.00. Late fees 39 "§ 20-430. Motor vehicle repair shop records. Each motor vehicle repair shop shall maintain repair records, which shall 40 (a) include written repair estimates and repair invoices. A customer's records shall be 41 42 available to the customer for inspection and copying for a period of at least 12 months. The motor vehicle repair shop may charge a reasonable fee for copying. The customer 43 44 may not remove the original records from the premises. The Board shall have access to

"<u>§ 20-433. Injunc</u>tive relief. 9 10 The Board may apply to the superior court for an order enjoining violations of this Article. Upon a showing by the Board that any person has violated this Article, the court 11 12 may grant injunctive relief." **SECTION 2.** Any person who submits proof to the Board that the person 13 14 has owned or operated a motor vehicle repair shop or practiced as a collision repair 15 estimator or collision repair technician full-time for at least five consecutive years prior 16 to the effective date of this act, has completed a nationally recognized certification 17 program in motor vehicle repair or collision repair services as approved by the Board, or 18 is certified as a collision repair estimator or collision repair technician by a nationally recognized organization approved by the Board may be granted the appropriate license 19 20 upon completion of an inspection, in the case of a motor vehicle repair shop, and 21 investigation of the applicant's work history by the Board, and payment of the required fee under G.S. 20-429, enacted in Section 1 of this act, without having to satisfy the 22 23 requirements of G.S. 20-426, enacted in Section 1 of this act. All persons who do not 24 make application to the Board within one year of the effective date of this act shall be required to complete all requirements prescribed by the Board and to otherwise comply 25 with the provisions of Article 18 of Chapter 20 of the General Statutes, enacted by 26 27 Section 1 of this act. **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law. 28
