COMMUNITY COLLEGE PERSONNEL/SALARY INCREASES

SECTION 11. Section 29.11 of S.L. 2005-276 reads as rewritten:

8 "SECTION 29.11. The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for 9 Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal years 2005-2006 and 2006-2007, 10 funds to the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office necessary to provide an annual salary increase of the greater of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two 11 12 percent (2%), including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 2005, for all community college employees 13 14 supported by State funds. The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for 15 Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal year 2006-2007, funds to the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office necessary to provide an annual 16 17 salary increase of seven percent (7%), including funds for the employer's retirement and 18 social security contributions, commencing July 1, 2006, for all community college employees supported by State funds." 19

#### UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA SYSTEM/EPA COMPENSATION

**SECTION 12.** Section 29.12 of S.L. 2005-276 reads as rewritten:

23 "SECTION 29.12.(a) The For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, the Director of the Budget 24 shall transfer to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina sufficient funds from the Reserve for Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal year 25 2005-2006 and 2006-2007, to provide an annual salary increase of the greater of eight 26 27 hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two percent (2%), including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 2005, for all 28 29 employees of The University of North Carolina, as well as employees other than teachers of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, supported by State 30 funds and whose salaries are exempt from the State Personnel Act (EPA). The flat 31 32 dollar increase of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) shall be made to all employees 33 whose annual salary is less than or equal to forty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$42,500). The percentage annual salary increase of two percent (2%) authorized by this 34 35 section shall be made on an aggregated average basis, and these funds shall be allocated to individuals whose annual salary is greater than forty-two thousand five hundred 36 37 dollars (\$42,500), according to the rules adopted by the Board of Governors of The 38 University of North Carolina or the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina School of 39 Science and Mathematics, as appropriate, and may not be used for any purpose other 40 than for salary increases and necessary employer contributions provided by this section.

41 "SECTION 29.12.(a1) For the 2006-2007 fiscal year, the Director of the Budget
 42 shall transfer to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina sufficient
 43 funds from the Reserve for Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal year
 44 2006-2007, to provide an annual salary increase of seven percent (7%), including funds

for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 1 2 2006, for all employees of The University of North Carolina, as well as employees other 3 than teachers of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, supported by 4 State funds and whose salaries are exempt from the State Personnel Act (EPA). The 5 percentage annual salary increase of seven percent (7%) authorized by this section shall 6 be made on an aggregated average basis, according to the rules adopted by the Board of 7 Governors of The University of North Carolina or the Board of Trustees of the North 8 Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, as appropriate, and may not be used for 9 any purpose other than for salary increases and necessary employer contributions 10 provided by this section. "SECTION 29.12.(b) The Director of the Budget shall transfer to the Board of 11 12 Governors of The University of North Carolina sufficient funds from the Reserve for Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal years 2005-2006 and 2006-2007, 13 14 to provide an average annual salary increase of two and twenty-four hundredths percent 15 (2.24%), including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 2005, for all teaching employees of the North Carolina School of 16 17 Science and Mathematics, supported by State funds and whose salaries are exempt from 18 the State Personnel Act (EPA). These funds shall be allocated to individuals according to the rules adopted by the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina School of Science 19 20 and Mathematics and may not be used for any purpose other than for salary increases 21 and necessary employer contributions provided by this section. "SECTION 29.12.(b1) The Director of the Budget shall transfer to the Board of 22 23 Governors of The University of North Carolina sufficient funds from the Reserve for 24 Compensation Increases, created in this act for fiscal year 2006-2007, to provide an average annual salary increase of seven percent (7%), including funds for the 25 employer's retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 2006, for 26 all teaching employees of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, 27 supported by State funds and whose salaries are exempt from the State Personnel Act 28 29 (EPA). These funds shall be allocated to individuals according to the rules adopted by

the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics and
 may not be used for any purpose other than for salary increases and necessary employer
 contributions provided by this section."

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#### MOST STATE EMPLOYEES/SALARY INCREASES

SECTION 13. Section 29.13 of S.L. 2005-276 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 29.13.(a) The salaries in effect June 30, 2005, of all permanent 36 full-time State employees whose salaries are set in accordance with the State Personnel 37 38 Act and who are paid from the General Fund or the Highway Fund shall be increased, effective July 1, 2005, by the greater of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two 39 percent (2%), unless otherwise provided by this act. Effective July 1, 2006, the salaries 40 of all permanent full-time State employees whose salaries are set in accordance with the 41 42 State Personnel Act, and who are paid from the General Fund or Highway Funds shall be increased by seven percent (7%). 43

"SECTION 29.13.(b) Except as otherwise provided in this act, the fiscal year 1 2 2005-2006 salaries for permanent full-time State officials and persons in exempt 3 positions that are recommended by the Governor or the Governor and the Advisory Budget Commission and set by the General Assembly shall be increased by the greater 4 5 of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two percent (2%), effective July 1, 2005, 6 unless otherwise provided by this act. Effective July 1, 2006, the compensation of 7 permanent full-time State officials and persons in exempt positions that are 8 recommended by the Governor or the Governor and the Advisory Budget Commission 9 and set by the General Assembly shall be increased by seven percent (7%).

10 "SECTION 29.13.(c) The salaries in effect for fiscal year 2005-2006 for all 11 permanent part-time State employees shall be increased, effective July 1, 2005, by pro 12 rata amounts of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two percent (2%), whichever is 13 greater. Effective July 1, 2006, the salaries of all permanent part-time State employees 14 shall be increased by seven percent (7%).

15 "SECTION 29.13.(d) The Director of the Budget may allocate out of special 16 operating funds or from other sources of the employing agency, except tax revenues, 17 sufficient funds to allow a salary increase, effective July 1, 2005, salary increases, in 18 accordance with subsection (a), (b), or (c) of this section, including funds for the 19 employer's retirement and social security contributions, for the permanent full-time and 20 part-time employees of the agency, provided the employing agency elects to make 21 available the necessary funds.

22 "SECTION 29.13.(e) Within For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, within regular 23 Executive Budget Act procedures as limited by this act, all State agencies and 24 departments may increase on an equitable basis the rate of pay of temporary and permanent hourly State employees, subject to availability of funds in the particular 25 agency or department, by pro rata amounts of the greater of the eight hundred fifty 26 27 dollar (\$850.00) or two percent (2%) increase provided for permanent full-time employees covered by the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, commencing July 28 29 1, 2005. For the 2006-2007 fiscal year, within regular Executive Budget Act procedures 30 as limited by this act, all State agencies and departments may increase on an equitable basis the rate of pay of temporary and permanent hourly State employees, subject to 31 32 availability of funds in the particular agency or department, by the seven percent (7%) 33 increase provided for permanent full-time employees covered by the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, commencing July 1, 2006." 34

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#### ALL STATE-SUPPORTED PERSONNEL/SALARY INCREASES

SECTION 14. Section 29.14 of S.L. 2005-276 reads as rewritten:

38 "SECTION 29.14.(a) Salaries and related benefits for positions that are funded 39 partially from the General Fund or Highway Fund and partially from sources other than 40 the General Fund or Highway Fund shall be increased from the General Fund or 41 Highway Fund appropriation only to the extent of the proportionate part of the salaries 42 paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund.

"SECTION 29.14.(b) The granting of the salary increases under this act does not 1 2 affect the status of eligibility for salary increments for which employees may be eligible 3 unless otherwise required by this act. 4 "SECTION 29.14.(c) The fiscal year 2005-2006 salary increases provided in this act are to be effective July 1, 2005, and do not apply to persons separated from State 5 6 service due to resignation, dismissal, reduction in force, death, or retirement, or whose 7 last workday is prior to July 1, 2005. The fiscal year 2006-2007 salary increases provided in this act are to be effective July 1, 2006, and do not apply to persons 8 9 separated from State service due to resignation, dismissal, reduction in force, death, or 10 retirement, or whose last workday is prior to July 1, 2006. Payroll checks issued to employees which represent payment of services provided 11 prior to these increases shall not be eligible for salary increases provided for in this act. 12 13 This subsection shall apply to all employees, subject to or exempt from the State 14 Personnel Act, paid from State funds, including public schools, community colleges, 15 and The University of North Carolina. 16 "SECTION 29.14.(d) The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve 17 for Compensation Increases in this act for fiscal year 2005-2006 and fiscal year 18 2006-2007 all funds necessary for the salary increases provided by this act, including 19 funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions. 20 "SECTION 29.14.(e) Nothing in this act authorizes the transfer of funds between 21 the General Fund and the Highway Fund for salary increases. "SECTION 29.14.(f) Permanent For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, permanent full-time 22 23 employees who work a nine-, ten-, or eleven-month work year schedule shall receive 24 the eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) or two percent (2%) annual increase provided by this act, whichever is greater. For the 2006-2007 fiscal year, permanent full-time 25 employees who work a nine-, ten-, or eleven-month work year schedule shall receive 26 27 the seven percent (7%) annual increase provided by this act." 28 29 APPROPRIATIONS/RESERVE FOR COMPENSATION INCREASE 30 SECTION 15.(a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Reserve for Compensation Increases the sum of seven hundred eleven million 31 32 twenty-five thousand dollars (\$711,025,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to implement 33 the legislative pay increases authorized by this act for public school personnel and State 34 employees. 35 SECTION 15.(b) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Reserve for Compensation Increases the sum of eight million seven hundred 36 seventy-five thousand dollars (\$8,775,000), nonrecurring, for the 2006-2007 fiscal year 37 38 to provide a one-time compensation bonus for teachers, principals, and assistant 39 principals who are at the top of their salary schedules in accordance with this act. **SECTION 15.(c)** There is appropriated from the Highway Fund to the 40 Reserve for Compensation Increases the sum of thirty-three million five hundred sixteen 41 42 thousand dollars (\$33,516,000) for the 2006-2007 fiscal year to implement legislative
