10	"§ 18C-164. Transfer of net revenues.					
11	(a) The funds remaining in the North Carolina State Lottery Fund after receipt of					
12	all revenues to the Lottery Fund and after accrual of all obligations of the Commission					
13	for prizes and expenses shall be considered to be the net revenues of the North Carolina					
14	State Lottery Fund. The net revenues of the North Carolina State Lottery Fund shall be					
15	transferred periodically to the Education Lottery Fund, which shall be created in the					
16	State treasury.					
17	(b) From the Education Lottery Fund, the Commission shall transfer a sum equal					
18	to five percent (5%) of the net revenue of the prior year to the Education Lottery					
19	Reserve Fund. A special revenue fund for this purpose shall be established in the State					
20	treasury to be known as the Education Lottery Reserve Fund, and that fund shall be					
21	capped at fifty million dollars (\$50,000,000). Monies in the Education Lottery Reserve					
22	Fund may be appropriated only as provided in subsection (e) of this section.					
23	(c) The Commission shall distribute the remaining net revenue of the Education					
24	Lottery Fund, as follows, in the following manner:					
25	(1) A sum equal to fifty percent (50%) to support reduction of class size in					
26	early grades to class size allotments not exceeding 1:18 in order to					
27	eliminate achievement gaps and to support academic prekindergarten					
28	programs for at risk four year olds who would otherwise not be served					
29	in a high quality education program in order to help those					
30	four year olds be prepared developmentally to succeed in school.					
31	(2) A sum equal to forty percent (40%) ninety percent (90%) to the Public					
32	School Building Capital Fund in accordance with G.S. $115C-546.2$.					
33	(3) A sum equal to ten percent (10%) to the State Educational Assistance

9	(f) If the actual net revenues exceed the amounts appropriate	d in that fiscal year,			
10	the excess net revenues shall remain in the Education Lottery	Fund, and then be			
11	transferred as follows:				
12	(1) Fifty percent (50%) to the Public School Building	Capital Fund to be			
13	spent in accordance with this section.				
14	(2) Fifty percent (50%) to the State Educational Assi	stance Authority to			
15	be spent in accordance with this section."				
16	SECTION 3. This act is effective when it becomes law.
