3	AND BODYWORK THERAPY PRACTICE ACT TO EXPAND THE EXISTING
4	LAWS REGULATING MASSAGE AND BODYWORK THERAPY SCHOOLS;
5	TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD TO ESTABLISH FEES FOR LICENSING
6	MASSAGE AND BODYWORK THERAPY SCHOOLS; TO ALLOW THE
7	DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO CONDUCT CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD
8	CHECKS FROM STATE AND NATIONAL REPOSITORIES OF CRIMINAL
9	HISTORY OF APPLICANTS FOR LICENSURE TO PRACTICE MASSAGE
10	AND BODYWORK THERAPY; AND TO AMEND THE EXISTING LAWS
11	REGARDING ADULT ENTERTAINMENT.
12	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
13	<b>SECTION 1.</b> G.S. 90-621 reads as rewritten:
14	"§ 90-621. Declaration of purpose.
15	The General Assembly recognizes that the improper practice of massage and
16	bodywork therapy is potentially harmful to the public. Mandatory licensure of those
17	engaged in the practice of massage and bodywork therapy is necessary to ensure
18	minimum standards of competency and to protect the public health, safety, and
19	welfare. The purpose of this Article is to ensure the protection of the health, safety, and
20	welfare of the citizens of this State receiving massage and bodywork therapy services.
21	This purpose is achieved by establishing standards of education and training to enable
22	each student to master the body of knowledge and demonstrate an accomplished
23	proficiency in the field of massage and bodywork therapy. Mandatory licensure of those
24	engaged in the practice of massage and bodywork therapy assures the public that each
25	individual has satisfactorily met the standards of the profession and continues to meet
26	both the ethical and competency goals of the profession."
27	SECTION 2. G.S. 90-622 reads as rewritten:

22		Substitutes; Article 5A, Endangering Executive and Legislative
23		Officers; Article 6, Homicide; Article 7A, Rape and Other Sex
24		Offenses; Article 8, Assaults; Article 10, Kidnapping and Abduction;
25		Article 13, Malicious Injury or Damage by Use of Explosive or
26		Incendiary Device or Material; Article 14, Burglary and Other
27		Housebreakings; Article 15, Arson and Other Burnings; Article 16,
28		Larceny; Article 17, Robbery; Article 18, Embezzlement; Article 19,
29		False Pretenses and Cheats; Article 19A, Obtaining Property or
30		Services by False or Fraudulent Use of Credit Device or Other Means;
31		Article 19B, Financial Transaction Card Crime Act; Article 20,
32		Frauds; Article 21, Forgery; Article 26, Offenses Against Public
33		Morality and Decency; Article 26A, Adult Establishments; Article 27,

2		territory of the United States, District of Columbia, or a foreign
3		country to act.
4	(3)	Massage and bodywork therapy. – Systems of activity applied to the
5		soft tissues of the human body for therapeutic, educational, or
6		relaxation purposes. The application may include:
7		a. Pressure, friction, stroking, rocking, kneading, percussion, or
8		passive or active stretching within the normal anatomical range
9		of movement.
10		b. Complementary methods, including the external application of
11		water, heat, cold, lubricants, and other topical preparations.
12		c. The use of mechanical devices that mimic or enhance actions
13		that may possibly be done by the hands. The application of
14		systems of activity by a massage and bodywork therapist during
15		the course of therapy shall not include any action pursued with
16		the intent of providing sexual stimulation or pursuing sexual
17		contact.
18	(4)	Massage and bodywork therapist. – A person licensed under this
19	( )	Article.
20	(5)	Practice of massage and bodywork therapy The application of
21		massage and bodywork therapy to any person for a fee or other
22		consideration. "Practice of massage and bodywork therapy" does not
23		include the diagnosis of illness or disease, medical procedures,
24		chiropractic adjustive procedures, electrical stimulation, ultrasound,
25		prescription of medicines, or the use of modalities for which a license
26		to practice medicine, chiropractic, nursing, physical therapy,
27		occupational therapy, acupuncture, or podiatry is required by law. The
28		practice of massage and bodywork therapy does not include:
29		a. The diagnosis of illness or disease.
30		b. Medical procedures, chiropractic adjustive procedures,
31		electrical stimulation, ultrasound, or prescription of medicines.
32		c. The use of modalities for which a license to practice medicine,
33		chiropractic, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy,
34		acupuncture, or podiatry is required by law.
35		d. Sexual activity, which shall mean any direct or indirect physical
36		contact or verbal communication, by any person or between
37		persons, which is intended to erotically stimulate either person,
38		or which is likely to cause such stimulation and includes sexual
39		intercourse, fellatio, cunnilingus, masturbation, or anal
40		intercourse. As used in this sub-subdivision, masturbation
41		means the manipulation of any body tissue with the intent to
42		cause sexual arousal. Sexual activity can involve the use of any
43		device or object and is not dependent on whether penetration,
44		orgasm, or ejaculation has occurred."
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1	SECTION 3. G.S. 90-625 reads as rewritten:
2	"§ 90-625. North Carolina Board of Massage and Bodywork Therapy.
3	(a) The North Carolina Board of Massage and Bodywork Therapy is created. The
4	Board shall consist of seven members who are residents of this State and are as follows:
5	(1) Five members shall be massage and bodywork therapists who have
6	been licensed under this Article and have been in the practice of
7	massage and bodywork therapy for at least five of the last seven years
8	prior to their serving on the Board. The appointments may be made
9	from lists provided by the North Carolina Therapeutic Massage and
10	Bodywork Task Force. Consideration shall be given to geographical
11	distribution, practice setting, clinical specialty, involvement in
12	massage and bodywork therapy education, and other factors that will
13	promote diversity of the profession on the Board. Two of the five
14	members shall be appointed by the General Assembly, upon the
15	recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, two
16	shall be appointed by the General Assembly, upon the
17	recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and one
18	shall be appointed by the Governor.
19	(2) One member shall be a physician licensed pursuant to Article 1 of
20	Chapter 90 of the General Statutes. Statutes or a person once licensed
21	as a physician whose license lapsed while the person was in good
22	standing with the profession and eligible for licensure. The
23	appointment shall be made by the Governor and may be made from a
24	list provided by the North Carolina Medical Society.
25	(3) One member shall be a member of the general public who shall not be
26	licensed under Chapter 90 of the General Statutes or the spouse of a
27	person who is so licensed, or have any financial interest, directly or
28	indirectly, in the profession regulated under this Article. The
29	appointment shall be made by the Governor.
30	(b) Legislative appointments shall be made in accordance with G.S. 120-121. A
31	vacancy in a legislative appointment shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122.
32	(c) Each member of the Board shall serve for a term of three years, ending on
33	June 30 of the last year of the term. A member shall not be appointed to serve more than
34	two consecutive terms.
35	(d) The Board shall elect annually a chair and other officers as it deems
36	necessary. The Board shall meet as often as necessary for the conduct of business but no
37	less than twice a year. The Board shall establish procedures governing the calling,
38	holding, and conducting of regular and special meetings. A majority of the Board shall
39	constitute a quorum.
40	(e) Each member of the Board may receive per diem and reimbursement for
41	travel and subsistence as set forth in G.S. 93B-5.
42	(f) Members may be removed by the official who appointed the member for
43	neglect of duty, incompetence, or unprofessional conduct. A member subject to
44	disciplinary proceedings as a licensee or other professional credential shall be

3	(a) It is unlawful for a person not licensed or exempted under this Article to
4	engage in any of the following:
5	(1) Practice of massage and bodywork therapy.
6	(2) Advertise, represent, or hold out himself or herself to others to be a
7	massage and bodywork therapist.
8 9	(3) Use any title descriptive of any branch of massage and bodywork therapy, as provided in G.S. 90-623, to describe his or her practice.
10	(b) A person who violates subsection (a) of this section shall be guilty of a Class
11	1 misdemeanor.
12	(b1) It is unlawful for an individual, association, partnership, corporation, or other
12	entity to open, operate, or advertise a massage and bodywork therapy school without
14	first having obtained the approval required by G.S. 90-637.1.
15	(b2) An individual, association, partnership, corporation, or other entity that
16	violates subsection (b1) of this section shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
17	(c) The Board may make application to superior court for an order enjoining a
18	violation of this Article. Upon a showing by the Board that a person person, association,
19	partnership, corporation, or other entity has violated or is about to violate this Article,
20	the court may grant an injunction, restraining order, or take other appropriate action."
21	SECTION 13. G.S. 90-634.1 reads as rewritten:
22	"§ 90-634.1. Civil penalties; disciplinary costs.
23	(a) Authority to Assess Civil Penalties. – The Board may assess a civil penalty
24	not in excess of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the violation of any section of this
25	Article or the violation of any rules adopted by the Board. The continuation of the same
26	act for which the penalty is imposed shall not be the basis for an additional penalty. The
27	clear proceeds of any civil penalty assessed under this section shall be remitted to the
28	Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund in accordance with G.S. 115C-457.2.
29	(b) Consideration Factors. – Before imposing and assessing a civil penalty, the
30	Board shall consider the following factors:
31	(1) The nature, gravity, and persistence of the particular violation.
32	(2) The appropriateness of the imposition of a civil penalty when
33	considered alone or in combination with other punishment.
34	(3) Whether the violation was willful and malicious.
35	(4) Any other factors that would tend to mitigate or aggravate the
36	violations found to exist.
37	(c) Schedule of Civil Penalties. – The Board shall establish a schedule of civil
38	penalties for violations of this Article and rules adopted by the Board.
39 40	(d) Costs. The Board may assess the costs of disciplinary actions against a
40	person found to be in violation of this Article or rules adopted by the Board."
41	<b>SECTION 14.</b> Article 36 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended
42	by adding the following new sections to read:
43	" <u>§ 90-637. Authority to regulate massage and bodywork therapy schools.</u>

1	(a) The Board shall have authority to administer and enforce this Article and to			
2	grant and issue approval to massage and bodywork therapy schools whether in this State			
3	or another state.			
4	(b) For purposes of this Article, 'massage and bodywork therapy school' means			
5	any educational institution that conducts a training program or curriculum for a tuition			
6	charge, which is intended to teach adults the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary			
7	for the safe, effective, and ethical practice of massage and bodywork therapy, as defined			
8	in this Article.			
9	(c) If a school offers training programs at more than one physical location, each			
10	location shall constitute a separate school, as defined in this section.			
11	(d) Notwithstanding G.S. 90-625, regarding the regulation of massage and			
12	bodywork therapy schools, the Board shall have the power and duty to:			
13	(1) Formulate criteria and standards for approval of massage and			
14	bodywork therapy schools.			
15	(2) Provide for adequate investigations of all schools applying for			
16	<u>approval.</u>			
17	(3) Issue approvals to those applicant schools meeting the standards			
18	established by the Board.			
19	(4) Maintain a list of schools approved under the provisions of this			
20	Article.			
21	(5) Provide for periodic inspection of all schools approved in this State			
22	under the provisions of this Article.			
23	(6) <u>Require periodic reports of approved schools.</u>			
24	(e) The Board shall have general supervision over massage and bodywork			
25	therapy schools in this State for the purpose of protecting the health, safety, and welfare			
26	of the public by having approved schools maintain: (i) adequate, safe, and sanitary			
27	facilities; (ii) sufficient and qualified instructional and administrative staff; and (iii)			
28	satisfactory programs of operation and instructions; and by having the schools carry out

41 SECTION 17. G.S. 14-202.11(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) No person shall permit any building, premises, structure, or other facility that
contains any adult establishment to contain any other kind of adult establishment. No
person shall permit any building, premises, structure, or other facility in which sexually

- 1 oriented devices are sold, distributed, exhibited, or contained to contain any adult
- 2 establishment. No person shall permit the practice of massage and bodywork therapy, as
- 3 defined in G.S. 90-622, in an adult establishment."
