	ECTION 1. G.S. 50C-1 reads as rewritten:

7	nonconsensual sexual conduct.

9	(8) Victim. – A person against whom an act of unlawful conduct has been
10	committed by another person not involved in a personal relationship
11	with the person as defined in G.S. 50B-1(b)."
