A JOINT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF TUITION FORGIVENESS AND OTHER INCENTIVES TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF SOCIAL WORKERS IN COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH IN UNDERSERVED COUNTIES IN NORTH CAROLINA.

Whereas, North Carolina's mental health system faces serious challenges, among them a lack of a well-trained clinical workforce to provide adequate levels of evidence-based care to our citizens, particularly in rural areas; and

Whereas, 35% of counties in North Carolina meet federal criteria for being underserved by mental health professionals; and

Whereas, the State is investing heavily in the education of social work professionals by supporting nine MSW programs at the public universities; and

Whereas, the dividends of the State's investment are not fully benefiting those citizens most in need of mental health services, including 12% of children with serious emotional disturbance, and 5.4% of adults with serious, debilitating mental illness; Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1.(a) The Legislative Research Commission may study the feasibility of tuition forgiveness and other incentives to increase the number of social workers in community mental health in underserved counties in North Carolina. In conducting the study, the Commission may assess the feasibility of a Community Mental Health Scholars Tuition Forgiveness Program ("Program") for the purpose of expanding the number of professional master's level social workers in community mental health to serve underserved counties. The Commission's study may also include (i) identifying policy or system barriers to the creation of a tuition forgiveness program or to hiring of graduates in underserved counties; (ii) recommending a structure for a tuition forgiveness program if such a program is found feasible; and (iii) recommending

other possible incentives to increase the number of MSW social workers providing community mental health services.
