4	PARKS SYSTEM, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE ENVIRONMENTAL
5	REVIEW COMMISSION.
6	Whereas, Section 5 of Article XIV of the North Carolina Constitution states
7	that it shall be a proper function of the State of North Carolina to acquire and preserve
8	park, recreational, and scenic areas and, in every other appropriate way, to preserve as a
9	part of the common heritage of this State its open lands and places of beauty; and
10	Whereas, the General Assembly enacted the State Parks Act in 1987,
11	declaring that the State of North Carolina offers unique archaeological, geological,
12	biological, scenic, and recreational resources, and that such resources are part of the
13	heritage of the people of the State to be preserved and managed by those people for their
14	use and for the use of their visitors and descendants; and
15	Whereas, an area on the Avery and Watauga county line, including Hanging
16	Rock Ridge and the headwaters of Dutch Creek, is known to be nationally significant
17	for its excellent examples of the rare High Elevation Rocky Summit community type
18	and other exemplary natural communities; and
19	Whereas, rare species found at the site include Heller's blazing star, Blue
20	Ridge goldenrod, spreading avens, American speedwell, wretched sedge, Roan
21	rattlesnakeroot, and golden tundra-moss; and
22	Whereas, this site was known by the Cherokee as Yonah-wayah, or Bear's
23	Paw; and
24	Whereas, the Bear Paw State Natural Area has been found to possess
25	biological resources of statewide significance; and
26	Whereas, the area known as Yellow Mountain in Avery and Mitchell
27	Counties near the Roan Mountain massif is known to be nationally significant for its

Grassy Bald and Heath Bald natural community types, as well as its assemblage of other
outstanding high-elevation natural communities; and

Whereas, the site supports dozens of rare plant and animal species, including the northern flying squirrel, the spruce-fir moss spider, Gray's lily, Roan Mountain bluet, and the rock gnome lichen; and

6 Whereas, the Yellow Mountain State Natural Area has been found to possess7 biological resources of statewide significance; and

8 Whereas, both of these natural areas are valuable for scientific research and 9 education, and as examples of the diverse natural resources of North Carolina; Now, 10 therefore,

11 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

12 **SECTION 1.** The General Assembly authorizes the Department of 13 Environment and Natural Resources to add Bear Paw State Natural Area to the State 14 Parks System as provided in G.S. 113-44.14(b).

15 **SECTION 2.** The General Assembly authorizes the Department of 16 Environment and Natural Resources to add Yellow Mountain State Natural Area to the 17 State Parks System as provided in G.S. 113-44.14(b).

18 **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law.
