A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO PHASE OUT THE COUNTY SHARE OF THE NONFEDERAL SHARE 3 OF MEDICAID COSTS OVER A FIVE-YEAR PERIOD.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5 **SECTION 1.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, the 6 county portion, excluding administrative costs, of the nonfederal share of the State Medical Assistance Program is reduced by three percent (3%) each fiscal year 7 8 beginning July 1, 2007, until the county portion of the nonfederal share, excluding administrative costs, equals zero percent (0%). Effective July 1, 2012, one hundred 9 10 percent (100%) of the nonfederal share of the Medical Assistance Program, excluding 11 county administrative costs, shall be borne by the State.

SECTION 2. Effective July 1, 2012, G.S. 108A-54 reads as rewritten:

13 "§ 108A-54. Authorization of Medical Assistance Program.

14 The Department is authorized and empowered to establish a Medical Assistance Program from federal, State and countyfederal and State appropriations and to adopt 15 16 rules and regulations under which payments are to be made in accordance with the 17 provisions of this Part. The nonfederal share may be divided between the State and the counties, in a manner consistent with the provisions of the federal Social Security Act, 18 19 except that the share required from the counties may not exceed the share required from 20 the state. If a portion of the nonfederal share is required from the counties, the boards of 21 county commissioners of the several counties shall levy, impose and collect the taxes required for the special purpose of medical assistance as provided in this Part, in an 22 23 amount sufficient to cover each county's share of such assistance." 24 **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law.
