1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO CODIFY THE PRACTICE OF ALTERNATING BETWEEN THE
3	HOUSES EACH BIENNIUM ORIGINATION OF THE CURRENT
4	OPERATIONS APPROPRIATIONS ACT.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	SECTION 1. G.S. 143-13 reads as rewritten:
7	"§ 143-13. Printing copies of budget report and bills and rules for the introduction
8	and origination of the same.
9	The Director shall cause to be printed one thousand copies each of the budget report,
10	the Current Operations Appropriations Bill, Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill,
11	and the Budget Revenue Bill. The Governor shall present copies thereof to the General
12	Assembly, together with the biennial message, except incoming Governors may, at the
13	first session of the General Assembly in their respective terms, submit the same after the
14	biennial message has been presented to the General Assembly. The Current Operations
15	Appropriations Bill and the Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill shall be
16	introduced by the chairman of the committee on appropriations in each house of the
17	General Assembly, and the Budget Revenue Bill shall be introduced by the chairmen of
18	the finance committees in each branch of the General Assembly: Provided, that for the
19	years in which the Governor is elected, other than when a Governor is elected for a
20	second successive term the Director shall deliver the budget report and the Current
21	Operations Appropriations Bill and the Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill and
22	the Budget Revenue Bill to the Governor-elect, on or before the fifteenth day of
23	December, and the said budget report, Appropriations, and Revenue Bills, shall be
24	presented by the Governor to the General Assembly with such recommendations in the
25	way of amendments, or other modifications, together with such criticism as he may

1 2	determine. In the 2007-2009 biennium, the House of Representatives shall originate the Current Operations Appropriations Bill and a bill in the second year of the biennium to
$\frac{2}{3}$	make general revisions in that act. Origination of the bill shall alternate between the two
4	houses each biennium thereafter. The provisions herein contained as to the introduction
5	of the bills mentioned in this section shall be considered and treated as a rule of
6	procedure in the Senate and House of Representatives until otherwise expressly
7	provided for by a rule in either, or both, of said branches of the General Assembly."
8	SECTION 2. Effective July 1, 2007, G.S. 143C-5-2 reads as rewritten:
9	"§ 143C-5-2. Order of appropriations bills.
10	(a) Each house of the General Assembly shall first pass its version of the Current
11	Operations Appropriations Act on third reading and order it sent to the other chamber
12	before placing any other appropriations bill on the calendar for second reading. This
13	section does not apply to the following bills:
14	(1) An appropriations bill to respond to a disaster as defined by
15	G.S. 166A-4(1).
16	(2) An appropriations bill making adjustments to the current year budget.
17	(3) An appropriations bill authorizing continued operations at current
18	funding levels."
19	(b) In the 2007-2009 biennium, the House of Representatives shall originate the
20	Current Operations Appropriations Bill and a bill in the second year of the biennium to
21	make general revisions in that act. Origination of the bill shall alternate between the two
22	houses each biennium thereafter."
23	SECTION 3. This act is effective when it becomes law.
