1	A JOINT RE	SOLUTION DIRECTING THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION		
2	TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY AND COST-EFFECTIVENESS OF ESTABLISHING A			
3	STATEWIDE SUPPORTIVE HOUSING INITIATIVE FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH			
4	MENTAL HEALTH, DEVELOPMENTAL, OR SUBSTANCE ABUSE DISABILITIES.			
5	Whereas, individuals with mental health, developmental, or substance abuse			
6	disabilities often have multiple barriers to appropriate and stable housing and employment; and			
7	Whereas, these individuals can successfully live in the community with the proper			
8	services and supports; and			
9	Whereas, studies have shown that supportive housing leads to improved functioning			
10	in individuals with mental health, developmental, or substance abuse disabilities, and also leads			
11	to reduced emergency room visits and hospitalizations, increased use of appropriate services,			
12 13	and increased satisfaction with overall quality of life, including for individuals with significant mental health, developmental, or substance abuse disabilities; and			
13 14	Whereas, stable employment is a critical factor in an individual's ability to succeed			
14	in a community setting; and			
16	Whereas, supportive housing initiatives tend to increase an individual's participation			
17	in work and employment services; and			
18	Whereas, the costs of creating and operating supportive housing are offset by			
19	savings in other public systems; Now, therefore,			
20	Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:			
21	SECTION 1.(a) The Legislative Research Commission shall study the feasibility			
22	and cost-effectiveness of establishing a statewide supportive housing initiative for individuals			
23	with mental health, developmental, or substance abuse disabilities. The study shall examine			
24	whether this type of initiative could achieve each of the following goals with respect to this			
25	population:			
26	(1)	Fewer emergency room visits and hospital admissions.		
27	(2)	Fewer and shorter stays in psychiatric hospitals.		
28	(3)	Improved treatment outcomes and overall quality of life.		
29 30	(4) (5)	Improved levels of functioning within the community setting. Expanded funding resources for necessary and appropriate treatment,		
31	(3)	through Medicaid and other available sources.		
32	(6)	Decreased arrest, incarceration, and recidivism rates.		
33	(7)	Decreased rates of homelessness.		
34	(8)	Improved safety within the community setting for both clients and the		
35		public.		
36	(9)	Decreased rates of unemployment and improved supports for maintaining		
37		employment consistent with individual preferences and skills.		



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SECTION 1.(b) The Legislative Research Commission shall report its findings		
	ations, including any proposals for legislation or administrative action, to the	
General Assemb	bly no later than April 1, 2011. The Commission shall address all of the	
following in its findings and recommendations:		
(1)	A recommendation as to whether and how a statewide supportive housing	
	initiative could achieve each of the goals referenced in subdivisions (1)	
	through (9) of subsection (a) of this section.	
(2)	The number of supportive housing units that would be necessary for	
	successful implementation of a statewide supportive housing initiative in	
	North Carolina.	
(3)	The amount of capital investment that would be necessary for initiating and	
	maintaining a statewide supportive housing initiative.	
(4)	Different funding resources that could be used to pay for ongoing	
	operational costs of a statewide supportive housing initiative.	
(5)	The potential cost-savings to be achieved by the State through	
	implementation of a statewide supportive housing initiative.
