1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO MAKE THE CRIMINAL OFFENSE OF SIMPLE ASSAULT A FELONY
3	RATHER THAN A MISDEMEANOR WHEN THE SIMPLE ASSAULT IS
4	COMMITTED AGAINST A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, A FIREFIGHTER, OR
5	EMERGENCY PERSONNEL AND TO INCREASE THE PENALTY FOR ASSAULT
6	AGAINST CERTAIN EMERGENCY PERSONNEL IF THE ASSAULT IS WITH A
7	DEADLY WEAPON OR INFLICTS SERIOUS BODILY INJURY.
8	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
9	SECTION 1. Article 8 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding
10	a new section to read:
11	" <u>§ 14-33.3. Simple assault on law enforcement officer.</u>
12	Unless the conduct is covered under some other provision of law providing greater
13	punishment, any person who commits any assault, assault and battery, or affray is guilty of a
14	Class I felony if, in the course of the assault, assault and battery, or affray, he or she assaults a
15	law enforcement officer while the officer is discharging or attempting to discharge the officer's
16	official duties."
17	SECTION 2. G.S. 14-34.6 reads as rewritten:
18	"§ 14-34.6. Assault or affray on a firefighter, an emergency medical technician, medical
19	responder, emergency department nurse, or emergency department physician.
20	(a) A person is guilty of a Class A1 misdemeanor I felony if the person commits an
21	assault or an affray on any of the following persons who are discharging or attempting to
22	discharge their official duties:
23	(1) An emergency medical technician.
24	(2) A medical responder.
25	(3) An emergency department nurse.
26	(4) An emergency department physician.
27	(5) A firefighter.
28	(b) Unless a person's conduct is covered under some other provision of law providing
29	greater punishment, a person is guilty of a Class I felony Class H felony if the person violates
30	subsection (a) of this section and (i) inflicts serious bodily injury or (ii) uses a deadly weapon
31	other than a firearm.
32	(c) Unless a person's conduct is covered under some other provision of law providing
33	greater punishment, a person is guilty of a Class F felony if the person violates subsection (a) of

- SECTION 3. G.S. 14-288.9(c) reads as rewritten:

"(c) Any person who commits an assault upon emergency personnel is guilty of a Class
1 misdemeanor.Class I felony. Any person who commits an assault upon emergency personnel
with or through the use of any dangerous weapon or substance shall be punished as a Class F
felon."

5 **SECTION 4.** This act becomes effective December 1, 2009, and applies to 6 offenses committed on or after that date. Prosecutions for offenses committed before the 7 effective date of this act are not abated or affected by this act, and the statutes that would be 8 applicable but for this act remain applicable to those prosecutions.
