3 SERVICE OF PROCESS FOR SUMMARY EJECTION.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5
6 **MODIFY EXPUNCTIONS**

7 **SECTION 1.(a)** G.S. 15A-145.5(a) reads as rewritten:

8 "**§ 15A-145.5. Expunction of certain misdemeanors and felonies; no age limitation.**

9 (a) For purposes of this section, the term "nonviolent misdemeanor" or "nonviolent
10 felony" means any misdemeanor or felony except the following:

- 11 (1) A Class A through G felony or a Class A1 misdemeanor.
- 12 (2) An offense that includes assault as an essential element of the offense.
- 13 (3) An offense requiring registration pursuant to Article 27A of Chapter 14 of
14 the General Statutes, whether or not the person is currently required to
15 register.
- 16 (4) Any of the following sex-related or stalking offenses: G.S. 14-27.7A(b),
17 14-190.7, 14-190.8, 14-190.9, 14-202, 14-208.11A, 14-208.18, 14-277.3,
18 14-277.3A, 14-321.1.
- 19 (5) Any felony offense in Chapter 90 of the General Statutes where the offense
20 involves methamphetamines, heroin, or possession with intent to sell or
21 deliver or sell and deliver cocaine.
- 22 (6) An offense under G.S. 14-12.12(b), 14-12.13, or 14-12.14, or any offense for
23 which punishment was determined pursuant to G.S. 14-3(c).
- 24 (7) An offense under G.S. 14-401.16.
- 25 (7a) An offense under G.S. 14-54(a), 14-54(a1), or 14-56.
- 26 (8) Any felony offense in which a commercial motor vehicle was used in the
27 commission of the offense.
- 28 (9) Any offense that is an attempt to commit an offense described in
29 subdivisions (1) through (8) of this subsection."

30 **SECTION 1.(b)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014, and applies to
31 petitions filed on or after that date, but petitions filed prior to that date are not abated by this
32 act.

34 **CONDITIONAL DISCHARGE IN LIEU OF DEFERRED PROSECUTION**



1 **SECTION 2.(a)** G.S. 15A-1341 reads as rewritten:

2 "**§ 15A-1341. Probation generally.**

3 (a) Use of Probation. – Unless specifically prohibited, a person who has been convicted
4 of any criminal offense may be placed on probation as provided by this Article if the class of
5 offense of which the person is convicted and the person's prior record or conviction level under
6 Article 81B of this Chapter authorizes a community or intermediate punishment as a type of
7 sentence disposition or if the person is convicted of impaired driving under G.S. 20-138.1.

8 ~~(a1) Deferred Prosecution-Conditional Discharge. – A person who has been charged~~
9 ~~with-Whenever a person pleads guilty to or is found guilty of a Class H or I felony or a~~
10 ~~misdemeanor may be placed misdemeanor, the court may, on motion of the defendant and the~~
11 ~~prosecutor, and without entering a judgment of guilt and with the consent of the person, defer~~
12 ~~further proceedings and place the person on probation as provided in this Article on motion of~~
13 ~~the defendant and the prosecutor for the purpose of allowing the defendant to demonstrate the~~
14 ~~defendant's good conduct, if the court finds each of the following facts:~~

15 ~~(1) Prosecution has been deferred by the prosecutor pursuant to written~~
16 ~~agreement with the defendant, with the approval of the court, for the purpose~~
17 ~~of allowing the defendant to demonstrate his good conduct.~~

18 ~~(2) Each known victim of the crime has been notified of the motion for~~
19 ~~probation by subpoena or certified mail and has been given an opportunity to~~
20 ~~be heard.~~

21 ~~(3) The defendant has not been convicted of any felony or of any misdemeanor~~
22 ~~involving moral turpitude.~~

23 ~~(4) The defendant has not previously been placed on probation and so states~~
24 ~~under oath.~~

25 ~~(5) The defendant is unlikely to commit another offense other than a Class 3~~
26 ~~misdemeanor.~~

27 ~~(a2) Deferred Prosecution-Conditional Discharge for Purpose of Drug Treatment Court~~
28 ~~Program. – A-When a defendant is eligible for a Drug Treatment Court Program pursuant to~~
29 ~~Article 62 of Chapter 7A of the General Statutes may be placed on probation if the court finds~~
30 ~~that prosecution has been deferred by the prosecutor, with the approval of the court, pursuant to~~
31 ~~a written agreement with the defendant, Statutes, the court may, without entering a judgment of~~
32 ~~guilt and with the consent of the defendant, defer further proceedings and place the defendant~~
33 ~~on probation for the purpose of allowing the defendant to participate in and successfully~~
34 ~~complete the Drug Treatment Court Program.~~

35 ~~(a3) Deferred Prosecution-Conditional Discharge for Prostitution. – A defendant whose~~
36 ~~prosecution is deferred pursuant to G.S. 14-204(e) for whom the court orders a conditional~~
37 ~~discharge pursuant to G.S. 14-204(b) may be placed on probation as provided in this Article.~~

38 ~~(a4) Compliance With Terms of Conditional Discharge. – Upon violation of a term or~~
39 ~~condition of a conditional discharge granted pursuant to this section, the court may enter an~~
40 ~~adjudication of guilt and proceed as otherwise provided. Upon fulfillment of the terms and~~
41 ~~conditions of a conditional discharge granted pursuant to this section, any plea or finding of~~
42 ~~guilty previously entered shall be withdrawn and the court shall discharge the person and~~
43 ~~dismiss the proceedings against the person.~~

44 (b) Supervised and Unsupervised Probation. – The court may place a person on
45 supervised or unsupervised probation. A person on unsupervised probation is subject to all
46 incidents of probation except supervision by or assignment to a probation officer.

47 (c) Repealed by Session Laws 1995, c. 429, s. 1.

48 (d) Search of Sex Offender Registration Information Required When Placing a
49 Defendant on Probation. – When the court places a defendant on probation, the probation
50 officer assigned to the defendant shall conduct a search of the defendant's name or other
51 identifying information against the registration information regarding sex offenders compiled

1 by the Division of Criminal Statistics of the Department of Justice in accordance with Article
2 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes. The probation officer may conduct the search using
3 the Internet site maintained by the Division of Criminal Statistics.

4 (e) Review of Defendant's Juvenile Record. – The probation officer assigned to a
5 defendant may examine and obtain copies of the defendant's juvenile record in a manner
6 consistent with G.S. 7B-3000(b) and (e1)."

7 **SECTION 2.(b)** G.S. 7A-49.4(b) reads as rewritten:

8 "(b) Administrative Settings. – An administrative setting shall be calendared for each
9 felony within 60 days of indictment or service of notice of indictment if required by law, or at
10 the next regularly scheduled session of superior court if later than 60 days from indictment or
11 service if required. At an administrative setting:

- 12 (1) The court shall determine the status of the defendant's representation by
13 counsel;
- 14 (2) After hearing from the parties, the court shall set deadlines for the delivery
15 of discovery, arraignment if necessary, and filing of motions;
- 16 (3) If the district attorney has made a determination regarding a plea
17 arrangement, the district attorney shall inform the defendant as to whether a
18 plea arrangement will be offered and the terms of any proposed plea
19 arrangement, and the court may conduct a plea conference if supported by
20 the interest of justice;
- 21 (4) The court may hear pending pretrial motions, set such motions for hearing
22 on a date certain, or defer ruling on motions until the trial of the case; and
- 23 (5) The court may schedule more than one administrative setting if requested by
24 the parties or if it is found to be necessary to promote the fair administration
25 of justice in a timely manner.

26 Whenever practical, administrative settings shall be held by a superior court judge residing
27 within the district, but may otherwise be held by any superior court judge.

28 If the parties have not otherwise agreed upon a trial date, then upon the conclusion of the
29 final administrative setting, the district attorney shall announce a proposed trial date. The court
30 shall set that date as the tentative trial date unless, after providing the parties an opportunity to
31 be heard, the court determines that the interests of justice require the setting of a different date.
32 In that event, the district attorney shall set another tentative trial date during the final
33 administrative setting. The trial shall occur no sooner than 30 days after the final administrative
34 setting, except by agreement of the State and the defendant.

35 Nothing in this section precludes the disposition of a criminal case by ~~plea, deferred~~
36 ~~prosecution, plea~~ or dismissal prior to an administrative setting."

37 **SECTION 2.(c)** G.S. 7A-272 reads as rewritten:

38 "**§ 7A-272. Jurisdiction of district court; concurrent jurisdiction in guilty or no contest**
39 **pleas for certain felony offenses; appellate and appropriate relief procedures**
40 **applicable.**

41 ...

42 (e) With the consent of the chief district court judge and the senior resident superior
43 court judge, the district court has jurisdiction to preside over the supervision of a probation
44 judgment entered in superior court in which the defendant is required to participate in a drug
45 treatment court program pursuant to G.S. 15A-1343(b1)(2b) or a therapeutic court as defined in
46 subsection (f) of this section, or is participating in the drug treatment court pursuant to a
47 ~~deferred prosecution agreement under the terms of a conditional discharge under~~
48 G.S. 15A-1341(a2). The district court may modify or extend the probation judgment, but
49 jurisdiction to revoke probation supervised under this subsection is as provided in
50 G.S. 7A-271(f).

1 (f) As used in subsection (e) of this section, the term "therapeutic court" refers to a
2 court, other than drug treatment court established pursuant to Article 62 of Chapter 7A of the
3 General Statutes, in which a criminal defendant, either as a condition of probation or pursuant
4 to ~~a deferred prosecution agreement~~ the terms of a conditional discharge under G.S. 15A-1341,
5 is ordered to participate in specified activities designed to address underlying problems of
6 substance abuse and mental illness that contribute to the person's criminal activity. The ordered
7 activities shall, at a minimum, require the person to participate in treatment and attend regular
8 court sessions of the therapeutic court over an extended period of time. The senior resident
9 superior court judge and the chief district court judge shall agree in writing that the therapeutic
10 court is being established and shall file the written agreement with the Administrative Office of
11 the Courts before jurisdiction established by subsection (e) of this section may be exercised by
12 the district court."

13 **SECTION 2.(d)** G.S. 14-313(f) reads as rewritten:

14 "(f) ~~Deferred prosecution~~ Conditional Discharge. – Notwithstanding G.S. 15A-1341(a1),
15 any person charged with a misdemeanor under this section shall be qualified for ~~deferred~~
16 ~~prosecution~~ a conditional discharge pursuant to Article 82 of Chapter 15A of the General
17 Statutes provided the defendant has not previously been placed on probation for a violation of
18 this section and so states under oath."

19 **SECTION 2.(e)** G.S. 15A-146(d) reads as rewritten:

20 "(d) A person charged with a crime that is dismissed pursuant to compliance with a
21 deferred prosecution agreement or the terms of a conditional discharge and who files a petition
22 for expunction of a criminal record under this section must pay the clerk of superior court a fee
23 of one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175.00) at the time the petition is filed. Fees collected
24 under this subsection are payable to the Administrative Office of the Courts. The clerk of
25 superior court shall remit one hundred twenty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$122.50) of each fee
26 to the North Carolina Department of Justice for the costs of criminal record checks performed
27 in connection with processing petitions for expunctions under this section. The remaining
28 fifty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$52.50) of each fee shall be retained by the Administrative
29 Office of the Courts and used to pay the costs of processing petitions for expunctions under this
30 section. This subsection does not apply to petitions filed by an indigent."

31 **SECTION 2.(f)** G.S. 15A-932 reads as rewritten:

32 "**§ 15A-932. Dismissal with leave when defendant fails to appear and cannot be readily**
33 **found or pursuant to a deferred prosecution agreement found.**

34 (a) The prosecutor may enter a dismissal with leave for nonappearance when a
35 defendant:

- 36 (1) Cannot be readily found to be served with an order for arrest after the grand
37 jury had indicted him; or
38 (2) Fails to appear at a criminal proceeding at which his attendance is required,
39 and the prosecutor believes the defendant cannot be readily found.

40 ~~(a1) The prosecutor may enter a dismissal with leave pursuant to a deferred prosecution~~
41 ~~agreement entered into in accordance with the provisions of Article 82 of this Chapter.~~

42 (b) Dismissal with leave for nonappearance ~~or pursuant to a deferred prosecution~~
43 ~~agreement~~ results in removal of the case from the docket of the court, but all process
44 outstanding retains its validity, and all necessary actions to apprehend the defendant,
45 investigate the case, or otherwise further its prosecution may be taken, including the issuance of
46 nontestimonial identification orders, search warrants, new process, initiation of extradition
47 proceedings, and the like.

48 (c) The prosecutor may enter the dismissal with leave for nonappearance ~~or pursuant to~~
49 ~~a deferred prosecution agreement~~ orally in open court or by filing the dismissal in writing with
50 the clerk. If the dismissal for nonappearance ~~or pursuant to a deferred prosecution agreement~~ is
51 entered orally, the clerk must note the nature of the dismissal in the case records.

1 (d) Upon apprehension of the defendant, or in the discretion of the prosecutor when he
2 believes apprehension is imminent, the prosecutor may reinstitute the proceedings by filing
3 written notice with the clerk.

4 (d1) If the proceeding was dismissed pursuant to subdivision (2) of subsection (a) of this
5 section and charged only offenses for which written appearance, waiver of trial or hearing, and
6 plea of guilty or admission of responsibility are permitted pursuant to G.S. 7A-148(a), and the
7 defendant later tenders to the court that waiver and payment in full of all applicable fines, costs,
8 and fees, the clerk shall accept said waiver and payment without need for a written
9 reinstatement from the prosecutor. Upon disposition of the case pursuant to this subsection, the
10 clerk shall recall any outstanding criminal process in the case pursuant to G.S. 15A-301(g)(2)b.

11 (e) If the defendant fails to comply with the terms of a deferred prosecution agreement,
12 the prosecutor may reinstitute the proceedings by filing written notice with the clerk."

13 **SECTION 2.(g)** G.S. 15A-1342 reads as rewritten:

14 **"§ 15A-1342. Incidents of probation.**

15 (a) Period. – The court may place a convicted offender on probation for the appropriate
16 period as specified in G.S. 15A-1343.2(d), not to exceed a maximum of five years. The court
17 may place a defendant as to whom prosecution has been deferred or who receives a conditional
18 discharge on probation for a maximum of two years. The probation remains conditional and
19 subject to revocation during the period of probation imposed, unless terminated as provided in
20 subsection (b) or G.S. 15A-1341(c).

21 Extension. – In addition to G.S. 15A-1344, the court with the consent of the defendant may
22 extend the period of probation beyond the original period (i) for the purpose of allowing the
23 defendant to complete a program of restitution, or (ii) to allow the defendant to continue
24 medical or psychiatric treatment ordered as a condition of the probation. The period of
25 extension shall not exceed three years beyond the original period of probation. The special
26 extension authorized herein may be ordered only in the last six months of the original period of
27 probation. Any probationary judgment form provided to a defendant on supervised probation
28 shall state that probation may be extended pursuant to this subsection.

29 (a1) Supervision of Defendants on Deferred ~~Prosecution~~ Prosecution or Conditional
30 Discharge. – The Section of Community Corrections of the Division of Adult Correction of the
31 Department of Public Safety may be ordered by the court to supervise an offender's compliance
32 with the terms of a conditional discharge or deferred prosecution agreement entered into under
33 G.S. 15A-1341(a1) or (a3). Violations of the terms of the agreement shall be reported to the
34 court as provided in this Article and to the district attorney in the district in which the
35 agreement was entered.

36 ...

37 (i) Immunity from Prosecution upon Compliance. – Upon the expiration or early
38 termination as provided in subsection (b) of a period of probation imposed after deferral of
39 prosecution and before ~~conviction~~ conviction or a conditional discharge, the defendant shall be
40 immune from prosecution of the charges ~~deferred~~ deferred or discharged and dismissed.

41"

42 **SECTION 2.(h)** G.S. 15A-1343 reads as rewritten:

43 **"§ 15A-1343. Conditions of probation.**

44 ...

45 (c1) Supervision Fee. – Any person placed on supervised probation pursuant to
46 subsection (a) of this section shall pay a supervision fee of forty dollars (\$40.00) per month,
47 unless exempted by the court. The court may exempt a person from paying the fee only for
48 good cause and upon motion of the person placed on supervised probation. No person shall be
49 required to pay more than one supervision fee per month. The court may require that the fee be
50 paid in advance or in a lump sum or sums, and a probation officer may require payment by
51 such methods if he is authorized by subsection (g) to determine the payment schedule.

1 Supervision fees must be paid to the clerk of court for the county in which the judgment was
2 ~~entered or entered~~, the deferred prosecution agreement was ~~filed~~-filed, or the conditional
3 discharge was ordered. Fees collected under this subsection shall be transmitted to the State for
4 deposit into the State's General Fund.

5 (c2) Electronic Monitoring Device Fees. – Any person placed on house arrest with
6 electronic monitoring under subsection (a1) or (b1) of this section shall pay a fee of ninety
7 dollars (\$90.00) for the electronic monitoring device and a daily fee in an amount that reflects
8 the actual cost of providing the electronic monitoring. The court may exempt a person from
9 paying the fees only for good cause and upon motion of the person placed on house arrest with
10 electronic monitoring. The court may require that the fees be paid in advance or in a lump sum
11 or sums, and a probation officer may require payment by those methods if the officer is
12 authorized by subsection (g) of this section to determine the payment schedule. The fees must
13 be paid to the clerk of court for the county in which the judgment was ~~entered or entered~~, the
14 deferred prosecution agreement was ~~filed~~-filed, or the conditional discharge was ordered. Fees
15 collected under this subsection for the electronic monitoring device shall be transmitted to the
16 State for deposit into the State's General Fund. The daily fees collected under this subsection
17 shall be remitted to the Department of Public Safety to cover the costs of providing the
18 electronic monitoring."

19 **SECTION 2.(i)** G.S. 143B-708 reads as rewritten:

20 "**§ 143B-708. Community service program.**

21 ...

22 (c) A fee of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) shall be paid by all persons who
23 participate in the program or receive services from the program staff. Only one fee may be
24 assessed for each sentencing transaction, even if the person is assigned to the program on more
25 than one occasion, or while on deferred prosecution, a conditional discharge, or ~~while~~-serving a
26 sentence for the offense. A sentencing transaction shall include all offenses considered and
27 adjudicated during the same term of court. Fees collected pursuant to this subsection shall be
28 deposited in the General Fund. If the person is convicted in a court in this State, the fee shall be
29 paid to the clerk of court in the county in which the person is convicted, regardless of whether
30 the person is participating in the program as a condition of parole, of probation imposed by the
31 court, or pursuant to the exercise of authority delegated to the probation officer pursuant to
32 G.S. 15A-1343.2(e) or (f). If the person is participating in the program as a result of a
33 conditional discharge or a deferred prosecution or similar program, the fee shall be paid to the
34 clerk of court in the county in which the agreement is filed. Persons participating in the
35 program for any other reason shall pay the fee to the clerk of court in the county in which the
36 services are provided by the program staff. The fee shall be paid in full before the person may
37 participate in the community service program, except that:

- 38 (1) A person convicted in a court in this State may be given an extension of time
39 or allowed to begin the community service before the person pays the fee by
40 the court in which the person is convicted; or
- 41 (2) A person performing community service pursuant to a conditional discharge,
42 deferred prosecution or similar agreement may be given an extension of time
43 or allowed to begin community service before the fee is paid by the official
44 or agency representing the State in the agreement.
- 45 (3) A person performing community service as a condition of parole may be
46 given an extension of time to pay the fee by the Post-Release Supervision
47 and Parole Commission. No person shall be required to pay the fee before
48 beginning the community service unless the Commission orders the person
49 to do so in writing.
- 50 (4) A person performing community service as ordered by a probation officer
51 pursuant to authority delegated by G.S. 15A-1343.2 may be given an

1 extension of time to pay the fee by the probation officer exercising the
2 delegated authority.

3 ...

4 (e) The community service staff shall report to the court in which the community
5 service was ordered, a significant violation of the terms of the probation, or deferred
6 prosecution, related to community service, including a willful failure to pay any moneys due
7 the State under any court order or payment schedule adopted by the Section of Community
8 Corrections of the Division of Adult Correction. The community service staff shall give notice
9 of the hearing to determine if there is a willful failure to comply to the person who was ordered
10 to perform the community service. This notice shall be given by either personal delivery to the
11 person to be notified or by depositing the notice in the United States mail in an envelope with
12 postage prepaid, addressed to the person at the last known address available to the preparer of
13 the notice and reasonably believed to provide actual notice to the person. The notice shall be
14 mailed at least 10 days prior to any hearing and shall state the basis of the alleged willful failure
15 to comply. The court shall then conduct a hearing, even if the person ordered to perform the
16 community service fails to appear, to determine if there is a willful failure to complete the work
17 as ordered by the community service staff within the applicable time limits. The hearing may
18 be held in the county in which the ~~probation judgment or deferred prosecution order~~ requiring
19 the performance of community service was imposed, the county in which the violation
20 occurred, or the county of residence of the person. If the court determines there is a willful
21 failure to comply, it shall revoke any drivers license issued to the person and notify the
22 Division of Motor Vehicles to revoke any drivers license issued to the person until the
23 community service requirement has been met. In addition, if the person is present, the court
24 may take any further action authorized by Article 82 of Chapter 15A of the General Statutes for
25 violation of a condition of probation."

26 **SECTION 2.(j)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014. Deferred
27 prosecution agreements filed before the effective date of this section are not abated or affected
28 by this section, and the statutes that would be applicable but for this section remain applicable
29 to those deferred prosecutions.

31 **POSSESSION OF MARIJUANA PARAPHERNALIA/CLASS 3 MISDEMEANOR**

32 **SECTION 3.(a)** G.S. 90-113.22 reads as rewritten:

33 **"§ 90-113.22. Possession of drug paraphernalia.**

34 (a) It is unlawful for any person to knowingly use, or to possess with intent to use, drug
35 paraphernalia to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert,
36 produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, package, repackage, store, contain, or conceal a
37 controlled substance other than marijuana which it would be unlawful to possess, or to inject,
38 ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the body a controlled substance other than marijuana
39 which it would be unlawful to possess.

40 (b) ~~Violation~~ Except as provided in G.S. 90-113.22A, a violation of this section is a
41 Class 1 misdemeanor.

42 (c) Prior to searching a person, a person's premises, or a person's vehicle, an officer
43 may ask the person whether the person is in possession of a hypodermic needle or other sharp
44 object that may cut or puncture the officer or whether such a hypodermic needle or other sharp
45 object is on the premises or in the vehicle to be searched. If there is a hypodermic needle or
46 other sharp object on the person, on the person's premises, or in the person's vehicle and the
47 person alerts the officer of that fact prior to the search, the person shall not be charged with or
48 prosecuted for possession of drug paraphernalia for the needle or sharp object. The exemption
49 under this subsection does not apply to any other drug paraphernalia that may be present and
50 found during the search. For purposes of this subsection, the term "officer" includes "criminal

1 justice officers" as defined in G.S. 17C-2(3) and a "justice officer" as defined in
2 G.S. 17E-2(3)."

3 **SECTION 3.(b)** Article 5B of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by
4 adding a new section to read:

5 **"§ 90-113.22A. Possession of marijuana drug paraphernalia.**

6 (a) It is unlawful for any person to knowingly use, or to possess with intent to use, drug
7 paraphernalia to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert,
8 produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, package, repackage, store, contain, or conceal
9 marijuana, or to inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce marijuana into the body.

10 (b) A violation of this section is a Class 3 misdemeanor."

11 **SECTION 3.(c)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014, and applies to
12 offenses committed on or after that date.

13
14 **HUMAN TRAFFICKING COMMISSION/STUDY ERIN'S LAW**

24 students in kindergarten through grade six that could be included as part of
25 the Basic Education Program for the public schools.
26 (4) Identify methods for increasing teacher, student, and parent awareness of
27 issues regarding sexual abuse of children, including the warning signs
28 indicating that a child may be a victim of sexual abuse, actions that a child
29 who is a victim of sexual abuse may take to obtain assistance and
30 intervention, and available counseling options for children affected by sexual
31 abuse.
32 (5) Study any other issue the Commission considers relevant to this topic.

33 **SECTION 4.(b)** The Human Trafficking Commission shall submit a final report of
34 the results of its study and its recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 2015
35 General Assembly.

44 **institutions or local confinement facilities; furnishing tobacco products or**
45 **mobile phones to inmates.**

47 (d) Any person who knowingly gives or sells a mobile telephone or other wireless
48 communications device, or a component of one of those devices, to an inmate in the custody of
49 the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public Safety or to an inmate in the
50 custody of a local confinement facility, or any person who knowingly gives or sells any such

1 device or component to a person who is not an inmate for delivery to an inmate, is guilty of a
2 ~~Class 1 misdemeanor.~~Class H felony.

3 (e) Any inmate of a local confinement facility who possesses any tobacco product, as
4 defined in G.S. 148-23.1, other than for authorized religious purposes, ~~or who possesses a~~
5 ~~mobile telephone or other wireless communications device or a component of one of those~~
6 ~~devices,~~ is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

7 (f) Any inmate in the custody of the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of
8 Public Safety or an inmate of a local confinement facility who possesses a mobile telephone or
9 other wireless communication device or a component of one of those devices is guilty of a
10 Class H felony."

20 attack upon the residence, office, temporary accommodation or means of transport of any one
21 of those officers or persons in a manner likely to endanger the ~~officer,~~officer or person, shall
22 be guilty of a felony and shall be punished as a Class I felon."

23 **SECTION 6.(b)** G.S. 14-16.7 reads as rewritten:

24 "**§ 14-16.7. Threats against executive, legislative, or court officers.**

25 (a) Any person who knowingly and willfully makes any threat to inflict serious bodily
26 injury upon or to kill any legislative officer, executive officer, or court officer, or who
27 knowingly and willfully makes any threat to inflict serious bodily injury upon or kill any other
28 person as retaliation against any legislative officer, executive officer, or court officer because of
29 the exercise of that officer's duties, shall be guilty of a felony and shall be punished as a Class I
30 felon.

31 (b) Any person who knowingly and willfully deposits for conveyance in the mail any
32 letter, writing, or other document containing a threat to ~~inflict serious bodily injury upon or to~~
33 ~~kill any legislative officer, executive officer, or court officer,~~ commit an offense described in
34 subsection (a) of this section shall be guilty of a felony and shall be punished as a Class I
35 felon."

36 **SECTION 6.(c)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014, and applies to

38 39 **ADD RETIRED QUALIFIED CORRECTIONAL OFFICERS/COURSE EXEMPTION**

47 standards of the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of
48 Public Safety and was authorized by the Division of Adult Correction
49 of the Department of Public Safety to carry a handgun in the course
50 of assigned duties.

32 analyst regarding the results of forensic testing admissible pursuant to G.S. 8-58.20, and
33 reported by that analyst, shall be permitted by remote testimony if all of the following occur:

- 34 (1) The State has provided a copy of the report to the attorney of record for the
35 defendant, or to the defendant if that person has no attorney, as required by
36 G.S. 8-58.20(d). For purposes of this subdivision, "report" means the full
37 laboratory report package provided to the district attorney.
38 (2) The State notifies the attorney of record for the defendant, or the defendant if
39 that person has no attorney, at least 15 business days before the proceeding
40 at which the evidence would be used of its intention to introduce the
41 testimony regarding the results of forensic testing into evidence using remote
42 testimony.
43 (3) The defendant's attorney of record, or the defendant if that person has no
44 attorney, fails to file a written objection with the court, with a copy to the
45 State, at least five business days before the proceeding at which the
46 testimony will be presented that the defendant objects to the introduction of
47 the remote testimony.

48 If the defendant's attorney of record, or the defendant if that person has no attorney, fails to
49 file a written objection as provided in this subsection, then the analyst shall be allowed to
50 testify by remote testimony.

1 (c) Testimony. – The method used for remote testimony authorized by this section shall
2 allow the trier of fact and all parties to observe the demeanor of the analyst as the analyst
3 testifies in a similar manner as if the analyst were testifying in the location where the hearing or
4 trial is being conducted. The court shall ensure that the defendant's attorney, or the defendant if
5 that person has no attorney, has a full and fair opportunity for examination and
6 cross-examination of the analyst.

7 (d) Nothing in this section shall preclude the right of any party to call any witness."

45 **"§ 14-269.2. Weapons on campus or other educational property.**

47 (g) This section shall not apply to any of the following:

48 (1) A weapon used solely for educational or school-sanctioned ceremonial
49 purposes, or used in a school-approved program conducted under the
50 supervision of an adult whose supervision has been approved by the school
51 authority.

- 1 (1a) A person exempted by the provisions of G.S. 14-269(b).
 2 (2) Firefighters, emergency service personnel, ~~and~~ North Carolina Forest
 3 Service personnel, detention officers employed by and authorized by the
 4 sheriff to carry firearms, and any private police employed by a school, when
 5 acting in the discharge of their official duties.
 6 (3) Home schools as defined in G.S. 115C-563(a).
 7 (4) Weapons used for hunting purposes on the Howell Woods Nature Center
 8 property in Johnston County owned by Johnston Community College when
 9 used with the written permission of Johnston Community College or for
 10 hunting purposes on other educational property when used with the written
 11 permission of the governing body of the school that controls the educational
 12 property.
 13 (5) A person registered under Chapter 74C of the General Statutes as an armed
 14 armored car service guard or an armed courier service guard when acting in
 15 the discharge of the guard's duties and with the permission of the college or
 16 university.
 17 (6) A person registered under Chapter 74C of the General Statutes as an armed
 18 security guard while on the premises of a hospital or health care facility
 19 located on educational property when acting in the discharge of the guard's
 20 duties with the permission of the college or university.
 21 (7) A volunteer school safety resource officer providing security at a school
 22 pursuant to an agreement as provided in G.S. 115C-47(61) and either
 23 G.S. 162-26 or G.S. 160A-288.4, provided that the volunteer school safety

 37 years to have access to, or possession, custody or use in any manner whatever, of any gun,
 38 pistol or other dangerous firearm, whether such weapon be loaded or unloaded, unless the
 39 person has the permission of the child's parent or guardian, and the child is under the
 40 supervision of an adult. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a
 41 Class 2 misdemeanor.

42 (b) Air rifles, air pistols, and BB guns shall not be deemed "dangerous firearms" within
 43 the meaning of subsection (a) of this section except in the following counties: ~~Anson,~~ Caldwell,
 44 Caswell, Chowan, ~~Cleveland,~~ Cumberland, Durham, Forsyth, Gaston, ~~Harnett,~~ Haywood,

30 section shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor for the first ~~offense.~~ A offense and a Class H
31 felony for a second or subsequent offense is punishable as a Class I felony offense. A violation
32 of subsection (a1) of this section punishable under G.S. 14-415.21(a) is not punishable under
33 this section."

34 **SECTION 13.(b)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2014, and applies to
35 offenses committed on or after that date.
