A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT TO ENACT THE REASONABLE ENACTMENT OF COMPREHENSIVE
LEGISLATION ADDRESSING IMMIGRATION MATTERS IN NORTH CAROLINA
(RECLAIM NC) ACT.

Whereas, the North Carolina General Assembly recognizes that the issue of immigration is the responsibility of the federal government; and

Whereas, the federal government has failed to address the need for enforcement of existing immigration laws or to act decisively to correct, amend, and reform existing immigration procedures and policies; and

Whereas, federal courts have consistently upheld the authority of the federal government to restrict the efforts of states to uphold and enforce federal immigration laws in order to protect their citizens and their economies; and

Whereas, the federal government has endowed illegally present aliens with certain entitlements to be provided by the various states via unfunded mandates; and

Whereas, those unfunded mandates and the failure to address illegal immigration places an unwarranted strain on our State's law enforcement agencies, educational institutions, and social safety nets and undermines our trust in the rule of law; and

Whereas, the General Assembly of North Carolina recognizes its responsibility to protect and defend the citizens and the economy of the State of North Carolina; and

Whereas, North Carolina recognizes that the greatness of this State is the result of appreciating, incorporating, and welcoming the vast diversity of immigrants who lawfully assimilate into the culture and fabric that is North Carolina; and

Whereas, we do now encourage the North Carolina congressional delegation to exert the strongest effort possible to enact appropriate federal legislation to secure our nation's borders, uphold existing immigration laws, and reform the procedures and policies regarding the immigration process in order to facilitate an even and orderly process for those wishing to immigrate to our country; and

Whereas, we encourage the President to work in a dedicated and cooperative fashion with Congress to restore dignity and transparency to the immigration process; and

Whereas, the wealth, beauty, and strength of North Carolina rests not only with her natural attributes of mountains, beaches, and abundant resources but in the character of her people and their ability to address problems and challenges before them with an objective resolve tempered with a sense of fairness and consideration for all people; Now, therefore, The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:



PART I. SHORT TITLE

SECTION 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as "The Reasonable Enactment of Comprehensive Legislation Addressing Immigration Matters in North Carolina Act" or as "The RECLAIM NC Act."

PART II. INCREASE PENALTIES FOR POSSESSION, MANUFACTURE, OR SALE OF FALSE IDENTIFICATION DOCUMENTS

SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 14-100.1 reads as rewritten:

"§ 14-100.1. ~~Possession or manufacture~~ Possession, manufacture, or sale of certain fraudulent forms of identification.

(a) Except as otherwise made unlawful by G.S. 20-30, it shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly ~~possess or manufacture~~ possess, manufacture, or sell a false or fraudulent form of identification as defined in this section for the purpose of deception, fraud, or other criminal conduct.

(b) Except as otherwise made unlawful by G.S. 20-30, it shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly obtain a form of identification by the use of false, fictitious, or fraudulent information.

(c) Possession of a form of identification obtained in violation of subsection (b) of this section shall constitute a violation of subsection (a) of this section.

(d) For purposes of this section, a "form of identification" means any of the following or any replica thereof:

(1) An identification card containing a picture, issued by any department, agency, or subdivision of the State of North Carolina, the federal government, or any other state.

(2) A military identification card containing a picture.

(3) A passport.

(4) An alien registration card containing a picture.

(e) A violation of this section shall be punished as a ~~Class 1 misdemeanor~~ Class I felony, except that the following violations of this section shall be punished as a Class 1 misdemeanor:

(1) A violation based on the mere possession of a false or fraudulent form of identification, rather than the manufacture or sale of a false or fraudulent form of identification.

(2) A violation by a person under the age of 21 for the purpose of the underage purchase of alcohol.

(3) A violation by a person under the age of 18 for the purpose of the underage purchase of tobacco products or cigarette wrapping papers."

SECTION 2.(b) G.S. 20-30 reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-30. Violations of license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special identification card provisions.

(a) Unlawful Acts. – It shall be unlawful for any person to commit any of the following acts:

(1) To display or cause to be displayed or to have in possession a driver's license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special identification card, knowing the same to be fictitious or to have been canceled, revoked, suspended or altered.

(2) To counterfeit, sell, lend to, or knowingly permit the use of, by one not entitled thereto, a driver's license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special identification card.

- 1 (3) To display or to represent as one's own a drivers license, learner's permit,
2 restricted drivers permit, or special identification card not issued to the
3 person so displaying same.
- 4 (4) To fail or refuse to surrender to the Division upon demand any driver's
5 license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special identification
6 card that has been suspended, canceled or revoked as provided by law.
- 7 (5) To use a false or fictitious name or give a false or fictitious address in any
8 application for a driver's license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit,
9 or special identification card, or any renewal or duplicate thereof, or
10 knowingly to make a false statement or knowingly conceal a material fact or
11 otherwise commit a fraud in any such application, or for any person to
12 procure, or knowingly permit or allow another to commit any of the
13 foregoing acts. Any license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or
14 special identification card procured as aforesaid shall be void from the
15 issuance thereof, and any moneys paid therefor shall be forfeited to the State.
16 ~~Any person violating the provisions of this subdivision shall be guilty of a~~
17 ~~Class 1 misdemeanor.~~
- 18 (6) To make a color photocopy or otherwise make a color reproduction of a
19 drivers license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special
20 identification card which has been color-photocopied or otherwise
21 reproduced in color, unless such color photocopy or other color reproduction
22 was authorized by the Commissioner. It shall be lawful to make a black and
23 white photocopy of a drivers license, learner's permit, restricted drivers
24 permit, or special identification card or otherwise make a black and white
25 reproduction of a drivers license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit,
26 or special identification card.
- 27 (7) To sell or offer for sale any reproduction or facsimile or simulation of a
28 driver's license, learner's permit, restricted drivers permit, or special
29 identification card. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to
30 agents or employees of the Division while acting in the course and scope of
31 their employment. ~~Any~~ Notwithstanding subsection (c) of this section, a
32 person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ~~subsection~~
33 subdivision shall be guilty of a ~~Class I~~Class H felony.
- 34 (8) To possess more than one commercial drivers license or to possess a
35 commercial drivers license and a regular drivers ~~license~~license or restricted
36 drivers permit. Any commercial drivers license other than the one most
37 recently issued is subject to immediate seizure by any law enforcement
38 officer or judicial official. Any regular drivers license possessed at the same
39 time as a commercial drivers license is subject to immediate seizure by any
40 law enforcement officer or judicial official.
- 41 (9) To present, display, or use a drivers license, learner's permit, restricted
42 drivers permit, or special identification card that contains a false or fictitious
43 name in the commission or attempted commission of a felony. ~~Any person~~
44 ~~violating the provisions of this subdivision shall be guilty of a Class I felony.~~
- 45 (b) General Penalty. – Except as otherwise provided in subsections (a) and (c) of this
46 section, a violation of this section shall be punished as a Class I felony.
- 47 (c) Penalty in Certain Cases. – A violation of this section by a person under the age of
48 21 for the purpose of the underage purchase of alcohol shall be punished as a Class 1
49 misdemeanor. A violation of this section by a person under the age of 18 for the purpose of the
50 underage purchase of tobacco products or cigarette wrapping papers shall be punished as a
51 Class 2 misdemeanor."

1 **SECTION 2.(c)** G.S. 143-341(8)i.5. reads as rewritten:

2 "5. Upon proper requisition, proper showing of need for use on
3 State business only, and proper showing of proof that all
4 persons who will be driving the motor vehicle have valid
5 drivers' licenses, to assign economically suitable
6 transportation, either on a temporary or permanent basis, to
7 any State employee or agency. An agency assigned a motor
8 vehicle may not allow a person to operate that motor vehicle
9 unless that person displays to the agency and allows the
10 agency to copy that person's valid driver's license.
11 Notwithstanding ~~G.S. 20-30(6)~~, G.S. 20-30(a)(6), persons or
12 agencies requesting assignment of motor vehicles may
13 photostat or otherwise reproduce drivers' licenses for
14 purposes of complying with this subpart.

15 As used in this subpart, "economically suitable
16 transportation" means the most cost-effective standard vehicle
17 in the State motor fleet, unless special towing provisions are
18 required by the agency. The Department may not assign any
19 employee or agency a motor vehicle that is not economically
20 suitable. The Department shall not approve requests for
21 vehicle assignment or reassignment when the purpose of that
22 assignment or reassignment is to provide any employee with
23 a newer or lower mileage vehicle because of his or her rank,
24 management authority, or length of service or because of any
25 non-job-related reason. The Department shall not assign
26 "special use" vehicles, such as four-wheel drive vehicles or
27 law enforcement vehicles, to any agency or individual except
28 upon written justification, verified by historical data, and
29 accepted by the Secretary. The Department may provide law
30 enforcement vehicles only to those agencies which have
31 statutory pursuit authority."
32

33 **PART III. CREATION OF REBUTTABLE PRESUMPTION AGAINST THE**
34 **PRETRIAL RELEASE OF CERTAIN UNDOCUMENTED ALIENS**

35 **SECTION 3.** G.S. 15A-533 reads as rewritten:

36 **"§ 15A-533. Right to pretrial release in capital and noncapital cases.**

37 (a) A defendant charged with any crime, whether capital or noncapital, who is alleged
38 to have committed this crime while still residing in or subsequent to his escape or during an
39 unauthorized absence from involuntary commitment in a mental health facility designated or
40 licensed by the Department of Health and Human Services, and whose commitment is
41 determined to be still valid by the judge or judicial officer authorized to determine pretrial
42 release to be valid, has no right to pretrial release. In lieu of pretrial release, however, the
43 individual shall be returned to the treatment facility in which he was residing at the time of the
44 alleged crime or from which he escaped or absented himself for continuation of his treatment
45 pending the additional proceedings on the criminal offense.

46 (b) A defendant charged with a noncapital offense must have conditions of pretrial
47 release determined, in accordance with G.S. 15A-534.

48 (c) A judge may determine in his discretion whether a defendant charged with a capital
49 offense may be released before trial. If he determines release is warranted, the judge must
50 authorize release of the defendant in accordance with G.S. 15A-534.

1 (d) There shall be a rebuttable presumption that no condition of release will reasonably
2 assure the appearance of the person as required and the safety of the community if a judicial
3 official finds the following:

- 4 (1) There is reasonable cause to believe that the person committed an offense
5 involving trafficking in a controlled substance;
- 6 (2) The drug trafficking offense was committed while the person was on pretrial
7 release for another offense; and
- 8 (3) The person has been previously convicted of a Class A through E felony or
9 an offense involving trafficking in a controlled substance and not more than
10 five years has elapsed since the date of conviction or the person's release
11 from prison for the offense, whichever is later.

12 (e) There shall be a rebuttable presumption that no condition of release will reasonably
13 assure the appearance of the person as required and the safety of the community, if a judicial
14 official finds the following:

- 15 (1) There is reasonable cause to believe that the person committed an offense for
16 the benefit of, at the direction of, or in association with, any criminal street
17 gang, as defined in G.S. 14-50.16;
- 18 (2) The offense described in subdivision (1) of this subsection was committed
19 while the person was on pretrial release for another offense; and
- 20 (3) The person has been previously convicted of an offense described in
21 G.S. 14-50.16 through G.S. 14-50.20, and not more than five years has
22 elapsed since the date of conviction or the person's release for the offense,
23 whichever is later.

24 (f) There shall be a rebuttable presumption that no condition of release will reasonably
25 assure the appearance of the person as required and the safety of the community if the person is
26 unlawfully present in the United States and a judicial official finds either of the following:

- 27 (1) There is reasonable cause to believe that the person committed one or more
28 of the following offenses:
 - 29 a. A sex offense. As used in this sub-subdivision, a "sex offense" is any
30 offense upon conviction of which the offense becomes a reportable
31 conviction, as that term is defined in G.S. 14-208.6(4).
 - 32 b. A violent felony, as that term is defined in G.S. 14-7.7(b), or any
33 other criminal offense that includes assault as an essential element of
34 the offense or as an aggravating factor in sentencing.
 - 35 c. A driving offense. As used in this sub-subdivision, the term "driving
36 offense" means a moving violation contained in Chapter 20 of the
37 General Statutes.
 - 38 d. A drug offense. As used in this sub-subdivision, the term "drug
39 offense" means a violation of G.S. 90-95.
 - 40 e. A gang offense. As used in this sub-subdivision, the term "gang
41 offense" means any violation of Article 13A of Chapter 14 of the
42 General Statutes.
- 43 (2) There is reasonable cause to believe that the person committed an offense
44 not listed in subdivision (f)(1) of this section and United States Immigration
45 and Customs Enforcement has guaranteed that, in all such cases in this State,
46 it will issue a detainer for the initiation of removal proceedings and agree to
47 reimburse the State for the cost of incarceration from the time of the
48 issuance of the detainer.

49 Persons who are considered for bond under the provisions of ~~subsections (d) and (e)~~ subsection
50 (d), (e), or (f) of this section may only be released by a district or superior court judge upon a

1 finding that there is a reasonable assurance that the person will appear and release does not
2 pose an unreasonable risk of harm to the community."
3

4 **PART IV. REIMBURSEMENT OF COST OF INCARCERATING UNDOCUMENTED** 5 **ALIENS**

6 **SECTION 4.(a)** Chapter 148 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new
7 section to read:

8 **"§ 148-2.1. Reimbursement of incarceration costs by prisoners who are unlawfully**
9 **present in the United States.**

10 (a) Undocumented Alien Prisoner Defined. – For purposes of this section, the term
11 "undocumented alien prisoner" means an inmate who is 18 years or older and who is
12 unlawfully present in the United States.

13 (b) Reimbursement Required. – An undocumented alien prisoner who is in the custody
14 of the Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public Safety shall reimburse the
15 State for the actual cost of the prisoner's incarceration, as determined by the Division. The
16 reimbursement shall be collected by the Division and remitted to the General Fund.

17 (c) Outstanding Amounts. – If an undocumented alien prisoner has not made the full
18 reimbursement required by this section upon the prisoner's release, the Division shall calculate
19 the amount of reimbursement that is outstanding and give a verified statement of that amount to
20 the prisoner. Any reimbursement that remains unpaid shall constitute a "debt" within the
21 meaning of G.S. 105A-2, and may be set off against any North Carolina income tax refund due
22 the prisoner in accordance with Chapter 105A of the General Statutes. The Department of
23 Revenue shall pursue collection of the debt through setoff for at least 10 years from the time of
24 the prisoner's release or termination or until the debt is satisfied.

25 (d) Inclusion in Judgment. – In sentencing an individual who will be subject to the
26 requirements of subsection (b) of this section, a judge may include in the judge's order a
27 requirement that the sentenced individual pay an amount estimated to be sufficient to cover the
28 total actual cost of incarcerating the prisoner over the entirety of the prisoner's incarceration.
29 The Department of Public Safety shall develop a system that enables judges to quickly and
30 accurately estimate the appropriate amount. Any amount paid by a prisoner in satisfaction of a
31 term in a court order imposed pursuant to this section shall be credited against the amount the
32 prisoner owes under this section."

33 **SECTION 4.(b)** G.S. 148-33.1(f) reads as rewritten:

34 "(f) A prisoner who is convicted of a felony and who is granted work-release privileges
35 shall give his work-release earnings, less standard payroll deductions required by law, to the
36 Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public Safety. A prisoner who is convicted
37 of a misdemeanor, is committed to a local confinement facility, and is granted work-release
38 privileges by order of the sentencing court shall give his work-release earnings, less standard
39 payroll deductions required by law, to the custodian of the local confinement facility. Other
40 misdemeanants granted work-release privileges shall give their work-release earnings, less
41 standard payroll deductions required by law, to the Division of Adult Correction of the
42 Department of Public Safety. The Division of Adult Correction of the Department of Public
43 Safety or the sentencing court, as appropriate, shall determine the amount to be deducted from
44 a prisoner's work-release earnings to pay for the cost of the prisoner's keep and to accumulate a
45 reasonable sum to be paid the prisoner when he is paroled or discharged from prison. The
46 Division or sentencing court shall also determine the amount to be disbursed by the Division or
47 clerk of court, as appropriate, for each of the following:

- 48 (1) To pay travel and other expenses of the prisoner made necessary by his
49 employment;
50 (2) To provide a reasonable allowance to the prisoner for his incidental personal
51 expenses;

- 1 (3) To make payments for the support of the prisoner's dependents in
2 accordance with an order of a court of competent jurisdiction, or in the
3 absence of a court order, in accordance with a determination of dependency
4 status and need made by the local department of social services in the county
5 of North Carolina in which such dependents reside;
- 6 (3a) To make restitution or reparation as provided in G.S. 148-33.2.
- 7 (4) To comply with an order from any court of competent jurisdiction regarding
8 the payment of an obligation of the prisoner in connection with any
9 judgment rendered by the court.
- 10 (5) To comply with a written request by the prisoner to withhold an amount,
11 when the request has been granted by the Division or the sentencing court, as
12 appropriate.
- 13 (6) To reimburse the State for the actual cost of the prisoner pursuant to
14 G.S. 148-2.1.

15 Any balance of his earnings remaining at the time the prisoner is released from prison shall
16 be paid to him. The Social Services Commission is authorized to promulgate uniform rules and
17 regulations governing the duties of county social services departments under this section."
18

19 **PART V. AUTHORIZE IMMIGRATION STATUS CHECKS FOR CERTAIN**
20 **PERSONS WHO ARE LAWFULLY STOPPED, DETAINED, OR ARRESTED**

21 **SECTION 5.** Article 23 of Chapter 15A of the General Statutes is amended by
22 adding a new section to read:

23 **"§ 15A-506. Immigration status checks of persons lawfully stopped, detained, or arrested.**

24 (a) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

- 25 (1) Law enforcement officer or agency. – A law enforcement officer or law
26 enforcement agency of this State, of a county, of a municipality, or of any
27 other political subdivision of this State.
- 28 (2) Any other law. – An ordinance of a county or municipality of this State or a
29 State law other than this section.

30 (b) Verification of Status Authorized. – For any lawful stop, detention, or arrest made
31 by a law enforcement officer or agency in the enforcement of any other law, where reasonable
32 suspicion exists that the person stopped, detained, or arrested is an alien who is unlawfully
33 present in the United States, the law enforcement officer or agency may make a reasonable
34 attempt to verify the immigration status of the person with the federal government pursuant to
35 subsection (c) of this section.

36 (c) Verification Procedure. – Verification of a person's immigration status under this
37 section shall be made as promptly as possible and within 24 hours of the stop, detention, or
38 arrest, in accordance with G.S. 64-9.

39 (d) Exceptions. – This section shall not apply, and verification of a person's
40 immigration status shall not be sought, if any of the following conditions are satisfied:

- 41 (1) It is not practicable to verify the person's immigration status.
- 42 (2) Verifying the person's immigration status may hinder or obstruct an
43 investigation.
- 44 (3) The person provides the law enforcement officer or agency with any of the
45 following:
- 46 a. A valid North Carolina drivers license.
- 47 b. A valid North Carolina identification card.
- 48 c. A valid North Carolina restricted drivers permit.
- 49 d. A valid North Carolina restricted identification card.
- 50 e. A valid tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification.

1 f. Any valid United States federal, State, or local government issued
2 identification, if the issuing entity requires proof of lawful presence
3 in the United States before issuance.

4 (4) The person contacted the law enforcement officer or agency in good faith for
5 any of the following reasons:

6 a. To act as a witness to a crime.

7 b. To report criminal activity.

8 c. To seek assistance as a victim of a crime.

9 (e) Consistency with Federal Law. – This section shall be implemented in a manner
10 consistent with federal laws regulating immigration, protecting the civil rights of all persons,
11 and respecting the privileges and immunities of United States citizens.

12 (f) Conduct Not Authorized by Section. – This section shall not be construed to
13 authorize any of the following:

14 (1) Extending the period that a person is detained or held in custody. A person
15 shall not be detained solely because the person's immigration status has not
16 yet been verified in accordance with this section.

17 (2) Sole consideration of race, color, or national origin in the enforcement of
18 this section, except to the extent permitted by the United States or North
19 Carolina Constitutions."

21 **PART VI. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS**

22 **SECTION 6.** Article 1 of Chapter 64 of the General Statutes is amended by adding
23 the following new sections to read:

24 **"§ 64-9. Permissible methods of verifying immigration status.**

25 Verification of a person's immigration status pursuant to this Chapter or any other provision
26 of State law shall be made consistently with federal law and may be made by any of the
27 following methods, as applicable:

28 (1) Pursuant to 8 U.S.C. §§ 1373(c) and 1644 or any other provision of federal
29 law.

30 (2) By a law enforcement officer who is authorized by the federal government to
31 verify or ascertain an alien's immigration status.

32 (3) In any other manner authorized by the federal government.

33 **"§ 64-10. Admissibility of immigration status records in courts of this State.**

34 Any record that relates to the immigration status of a person is admissible in any court of
35 this State without further foundation or testimony from a custodian of records if the record is
36 certified as authentic by the federal government agency that is responsible for maintaining the
37 record. A verification of an alien's immigration status received from the federal government
38 pursuant to G.S. 64-9 shall constitute proof of that alien's status. A court of this State shall
39 consider only a verification of immigration status made pursuant to G.S. 64-9 in determining
40 whether an alien is lawfully present in the United States.

41 **"§ 64-11. Law enforcement transport of certain unlawfully present aliens.**

42 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a State or local law enforcement agency may
43 securely transport an alien who is in the agency's custody and whom the agency has verified is
44 unlawfully present in the United States to a federal facility in this State or to any other point of
45 transfer into federal custody that is outside the jurisdiction of the law enforcement agency. A
46 law enforcement agency shall obtain judicial or executive authorization from the Governor
47 before securely transporting an alien who is unlawfully present in the United States to a point
48 of transfer that is outside this State.

49 **"§ 64-12. Construction and severability.**

50 (a) Construction. – This Chapter shall be construed in a manner consistent with federal
51 law.

1 the Commissioner and in accordance with G.S. 58-2-185. The agent may satisfy the
2 requirements of this section by obtaining reliable proof of North Carolina residency from the
3 applicant or the applicant's status as an eligible risk. Reliable proof of residency or eligible risk
4 includes but is not limited to:

- 5 (1) A pay stub with the payee's address.
- 6 (2) A utility bill showing the address of the applicant-payor.
- 7 (3) A lease for an apartment, house, modular unit, or manufactured home with a
8 North Carolina address signed by the applicant.
- 9 (4) A receipt for personal property taxes paid.
- 10 (5) A receipt for real property taxes paid to a North Carolina locality.
- 11 (6) A monthly or quarterly financial statement from a North Carolina regulated
12 financial institution.
- 13 (7) A valid unexpired North Carolina driver's license.
- 14 ~~(8) A matricula consular or substantially similar document issued by the~~
15 ~~Mexican Consulate for North Carolina.~~
- 16 ~~(9) A document similar to that described in subdivision (8) of this section,~~
17 ~~issued by the consulate or embassy of another country that would be~~
18 ~~accepted by the North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles as set forth in~~
19 ~~G.S. 20-7(b4)(9).~~
- 20 (10) A valid North Carolina vehicle registration.
- 21 (11) A valid military ID.
- 22 (12) A valid student ID for a North Carolina school or university."

23 **SECTION 7.(d)** G.S. 108A-55.3(b) reads as rewritten:

24 "(b) An applicant may meet the requirements of subsection (a) of this section by
25 providing at least two of the following documents:

- 26 (1) A valid North Carolina drivers license or other identification card issued by
27 the North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles.
- 28 (2) A current North Carolina rent or mortgage payment receipt, or current utility

47 26, Offenses Against Public Morality and Decency; Article 26A, Adult

The appropriate fee shall be paid before a person receives a regular drivers ~~license~~ license, restricted identification card, restricted drivers permit, or an endorsement."

"(t) Notwithstanding the requirements of subsection (b1) of this section that an applicant present a valid social security number, the Division shall issue a restricted drivers permit or a restricted identification card under subsection (f) of this section to an applicant present in the United States who meets all of the following requirements:

- (1) The applicant is not lawfully present in the United States.
- (2) The applicant agrees to a criminal history check and that check shows that the applicant does not have a criminal history. The criminal history check shall include the taking of the applicant's fingerprints.

1 (3) The applicant submits a valid birth certificate, passport from another
2 country, or a copy of the federal W-2 or W-7 Internal Revenue Service form
3 most recently submitted to the Internal Revenue Service by the applicant.

10 **PART X. AUTHORIZE IMPOUNDMENT AND SALE OF VEHICLES FOR DRIVING**
11 **WHILE LICENSE REVOKED, DRIVING WITHOUT A LICENSE, AND DRIVING**
12 **WHILE FAILING TO MAINTAIN FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY**

13 **SECTION 10.** Article 2 of Chapter 20 of the General Statutes is amended by
14 adding a new section to read:

15 **"§ 20-28.10. Seizure, impoundment, forfeiture of motor vehicles for certain other offenses**
16 **under this Chapter.**

17 (a) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

18 (1) Acknowledgment. – A written document acknowledging all of the
19 following:

20 a. That the motor vehicle in question was operated by a person charged
21 with an underlying offense.

22 b. That a lack of knowledge or consent to the operation of the vehicle in
23 question will not be a defense in the future, unless the motor vehicle
24 owner has taken all reasonable precautions to prevent the use of the
25 motor vehicle by this particular person and immediately reports,
26 upon discovery, any unauthorized use to the appropriate law
27 enforcement agency.

28 (2) Fair market value. – The value of a seized motor vehicle, as determined in
29 accordance with the schedule of values adopted by the Commissioner
30 pursuant to G.S. 105-187.3.

31 (3) Innocent owner. – A motor vehicle owner:

32 a. Who did not know and had no reason to know that the defendant's
33 conduct would constitute an underlying violation; or

34 b. Who knew that the defendant's conduct would constitute an
35 underlying violation but the defendant drove the vehicle without the
36 person's expressed or implied permission, and the owner files a
37 police report for unauthorized use of the motor vehicle and agrees to
38 prosecute the unauthorized operator of the motor vehicle; or

39 c. Whose vehicle was reported stolen; or

40 d. Who is in the business of renting vehicles, and the vehicle was driven
41 by a person who is not listed as an authorized driver on the rental
42 contract; or

43 e. Who is in the business of leasing motor vehicles, who holds legal
44 title to the motor vehicle as a lessor at the time of seizure, and who
45 has no actual knowledge of the revocation of the lessee's drivers
46 license or failure to maintain financial responsibility, as applicable, at
47 the time the lease is entered.

48 (4) Insurance company. – Any insurance company that has coverage on or is
49 otherwise liable for repairs or damages to the motor vehicle at the time of the
50 seizure.

- 1 (5) Insurance proceeds. – Proceeds paid under an insurance policy for damage to
2 a seized motor vehicle less any payments actually paid to valid lienholders
3 and for towing and storage costs incurred for the motor vehicle after the time
4 the motor vehicle became subject to seizure.
- 5 (6) Lienholder. – A person who holds a perfected security interest in a motor
6 vehicle at the time of seizure.
- 7 (7) Motor vehicle owner. – A person in whose name a registration card or
8 certificate of title for a motor vehicle is issued at the time of seizure.
- 9 (8) Order of forfeiture. – An order by the court which terminates the rights and
10 ownership interest of a motor vehicle owner in a motor vehicle and any
11 insurance proceeds or proceeds of sale in accordance with this section.
- 12 (9) Underlying violation. – Any of the following:
- 13 a. Driving while the defendant's drivers license was revoked pursuant to
14 an impaired drivers license revocation, as that term is defined in
15 G.S. 20-28.2(a).
- 16 b. A violation of G.S. 20-313.
- 17 c. Driving without a license under G.S. 20-35 or driving without a
18 restricted drivers permit under G.S. 20-35.
- 19 (b) When Motor Vehicle Becomes Property Subject to Order of Forfeiture. – A judge
20 may determine whether a vehicle driven at the time of the underlying offense becomes subject
21 to an order of forfeiture. The determination may be made at any of the following times:
- 22 (1) A sentencing hearing for the underlying offense.
- 23 (2) A separate hearing after conviction of the defendant.
- 24 (3) A forfeiture hearing held at least 60 days after the defendant failed to appear
25 at the scheduled trial for the underlying offense, and the defendant's order of
26 arrest for failing to appear has not been set aside.
- 27 The vehicle shall become subject to an order of forfeiture if the greater weight of the
28 evidence shows that the defendant is guilty of an underlying violation, except that if any of the
29 following conditions are satisfied, the vehicle shall not become subject to an order of forfeiture:
- 30 (1) The underlying violation is a violation of G.S. 20-313 and the defendant
31 tenders proof of financial responsibility that satisfies the requirements of
32 G.S. 20-7(c1) to the judge.
- 33 (2) The underlying violation is driving without a license under G.S. 20-35 or
34 driving without a restricted drivers permit under G.S. 20-35 and the
35 defendant presents the judge with the defendant's valid drivers license or
36 restricted drivers permit.
- 37 (c) Duty of Prosecutor to Notify Possible Innocent Parties. – In any case in which a
38 prosecutor determines that a motor vehicle driven by a defendant may be subject to forfeiture
39 under this section and the motor vehicle has not been permanently released to a nondefendant
40 vehicle owner pursuant to subsection (p) of this section, or a lienholder pursuant to subsection
41 (q) of this section, the prosecutor shall notify the defendant, each motor vehicle owner, and
42 each lienholder that the motor vehicle may be subject to forfeiture and that the defendant,
43 motor vehicle owner, or the lienholder may intervene to protect that person's interest. The
44 notice may be served by any means reasonably likely to provide actual notice and shall be
45 served at least 10 days before the hearing at which an order of forfeiture may be entered.
- 46 (d) Motor Vehicles Involved in Accidents. – If a motor vehicle subject to forfeiture was
47 damaged while the defendant operator was committing the underlying offense, or was damaged
48 incident to the seizure of the motor vehicle, the Division shall determine the name of any
49 insurance companies that are the insurers of record with the Division for the motor vehicle at
50 the time of the seizure or that may otherwise be liable for repair to the motor vehicle. In any
51 case where a seized motor vehicle was involved in an accident, the Division shall notify the

1 insurance companies that the claim for insurance proceeds for damage to the seized motor
2 vehicle shall be paid to the clerk of superior court of the county where the motor vehicle driver
3 was charged to be held and disbursed pursuant to further orders of the court. Any insurance
4 company that receives written or other actual notice of seizure pursuant to this section shall not
5 be relieved of any legal obligation under any contract of insurance unless the claim for property
6 damage to the seized motor vehicle minus the policy owner's deductible is paid directly to the
7 clerk of court. The insurance company paying insurance proceeds to the clerk of court pursuant
8 to this section shall be immune from suit by the motor vehicle owner for any damages alleged
9 to have occurred as a result of the motor vehicle seizure. The proceeds shall be held by the
10 clerk. The clerk shall disburse the insurance proceeds pursuant to further orders of the court.

11 (e) Forfeiture Hearing. – Unless a motor vehicle that has been seized pursuant to this
12 section has been permanently released to an innocent owner pursuant to subsection (p) of this
13 section, or to a lienholder pursuant to subsection (q) of this section, the court shall conduct a
14 hearing on the forfeiture of the motor vehicle. The hearing may be held at the sentencing
15 hearing on the underlying offense, at a separate hearing after conviction of the defendant, or at
16 a separate forfeiture hearing held not less than 60 days after the defendant failed to appear at
17 the scheduled trial for the underlying offense and the defendant's order of arrest for failing to
18 appear has not been set aside. If at the sentencing hearing or at a forfeiture hearing, the judge
19 determines that the motor vehicle is subject to forfeiture pursuant to this section and proper
20 notice of the hearing has been given, the judge shall order the motor vehicle forfeited unless
21 another motor vehicle owner establishes, by the greater weight of the evidence, that such motor
22 vehicle owner is an innocent owner as defined in this section, in which case the trial judge shall
23 order the motor vehicle released to the innocent owner pursuant to the provisions of subsection
24 (p) of this section. In any case where the motor vehicle is ordered forfeited, the judge shall:

- 25 (1) a. Authorize the sale of the motor vehicle at public sale or allow the
26 county board of education to retain the motor vehicle for its own use
27 pursuant to subsection (z) of this section; or
28 b. Order the motor vehicle released to a lienholder pursuant to the
29 provisions of subsection (g) of this section; and
30 (2) a. Order any proceeds of sale or insurance proceeds held by the clerk of
31 court to be disbursed to the county board of education; and
32 b. Order any outstanding insurance claims be assigned to the county
33 board of education in the event the motor vehicle has been damaged
34 in an accident incident to the seizure of the motor vehicle.

35 If the judge determines that the motor vehicle is subject to forfeiture pursuant to this
36 section, but that notice as required by subsection (c) has not been given, the judge shall
37 continue the forfeiture proceeding until adequate notice has been given. In no circumstance
38 shall the sentencing of the defendant be delayed as a result of the failure of the prosecutor to
39 give adequate notice.

40 (f) Release of Vehicle to Innocent Motor Vehicle Owner. – At a forfeiture hearing, if a
41 nondefendant motor vehicle owner establishes by the greater weight of the evidence that (i) the
42 motor vehicle was being driven by a person who was not the only motor vehicle owner or had
43 no ownership interest in the motor vehicle at the time of the underlying offense and (ii) the
44 petitioner is an innocent owner, a judge shall order the motor vehicle released to that owner,
45 conditioned upon payment of all towing and storage charges incurred as a result of the seizure
46 and impoundment of the motor vehicle.

47 Release to an innocent owner shall only be ordered upon satisfactory proof of:

- 48 (1) The identity of the person as a motor vehicle owner;
49 (2) The existence of financial responsibility to the extent required by Article 13
50 of this Chapter or by the laws of the state in which the vehicle is registered;
51 and

1 (3) The execution of an acknowledgment as defined in subdivision (a)(1) of this
2 section.

3 If the nondefendant owner is a lessor, the release shall also be conditioned upon the lessor
4 agreeing not to sell, give, or otherwise transfer possession of the forfeited motor vehicle to the
5 defendant or any person acting on the defendant's behalf. A lessor who refuses to sell, give, or
6 transfer possession of a seized motor vehicle to the defendant or any person acting on the
7 behalf of the defendant shall not be liable for damages arising out of the refusal.

8 No motor vehicle subject to forfeiture under this section shall be released to a nondefendant
9 motor vehicle owner if the records of the Division indicate the motor vehicle owner had
10 previously signed an acknowledgment, as required by this section, and the same person was
11 operating the motor vehicle while that person was committing an underlying violation, unless
12 the innocent owner shows by the greater weight of the evidence that the motor vehicle owner
13 has taken all reasonable precautions to prevent the use of the motor vehicle by this particular
14 person and immediately reports, upon discovery, any unauthorized use to the appropriate law
15 enforcement agency. A determination by the court at the forfeiture hearing held pursuant to
16 subsection (e) of this section that the petitioner is not an innocent owner is a final judgment and
17 is immediately appealable to the Court of Appeals.

18 (g) Release to Lienholder. – At a forfeiture hearing, the trial judge shall order a
19 forfeited motor vehicle released to the lienholder upon payment of all towing and storage
20 charges incurred as a result of the seizure of the motor vehicle if the judge determines, by the
21 greater weight of the evidence, that:

22 (1) The lienholder's interest has been perfected and appears on the title to the
23 forfeited vehicle;

24 (2) The lienholder agrees not to sell, give, or otherwise transfer possession of
25 the forfeited motor vehicle to the defendant or to the motor vehicle owner
26 who owned the motor vehicle immediately prior to forfeiture, or any person
27 acting on the defendant's or motor vehicle owner's behalf;

28 (3) The forfeited motor vehicle had not previously been released to the
29 lienholder;

30 (4) The owner is in default under the terms of the security instrument evidencing
31 the interest of the lienholder and as a consequence of the default the
32 lienholder is entitled to possession of the motor vehicle; and

33 (5) The lienholder agrees to sell the motor vehicle in accordance with the terms
34 of its agreement and pursuant to the provisions of Part 6 of Article 9 of
35 Chapter 25 of the General Statutes. Upon the sale of the motor vehicle, the
36 lienholder will pay to the clerk of court of the county in which the vehicle
37 was forfeited all proceeds from the sale, less the amount of the lien in favor
38 of the lienholder, and any towing and storage costs paid by the lienholder.

39 A lienholder who refuses to sell, give, or transfer possession of a forfeited motor vehicle to
40 the defendant, the vehicle owner who owned the motor vehicle immediately prior to forfeiture,
41 or any person acting on the behalf of the defendant or motor vehicle owner shall not be liable
42 for damages arising out of such refusal. The defendant, the motor vehicle owner who owned
43 the motor vehicle immediately prior to forfeiture, and any person acting on the defendant's or
44 motor vehicle owner's behalf are prohibited from purchasing the motor vehicle at any sale
45 conducted by the lienholder.

46 (h) Payment of Towing and Storage Charges Required. – Any order issued pursuant to
47 this section authorizing the release of a seized vehicle shall require the payment of all towing
48 and storage charges incurred as a result of the seizure and impoundment of the motor vehicle.
49 This requirement shall not be waived.

50 (i) Duty of Officer. – If the charging officer has probable cause to believe that a motor
51 vehicle may be subject to forfeiture under this section because the driver is engaging in an

1 underlying offense, the officer shall seize the motor vehicle and have it impounded. If the
2 officer determines prior to seizure that the motor vehicle had been reported stolen, the officer
3 shall not seize the motor vehicle pursuant to this section. If the officer determines prior to
4 seizure that the motor vehicle was a rental vehicle driven by a person not listed as an authorized
5 driver on the rental contract, the officer shall not seize the motor vehicle pursuant to this
6 section but shall make a reasonable effort to notify the owner of the rental vehicle that the
7 vehicle was stopped and that the driver of the vehicle was not listed as an authorized driver on
8 the rental contract. Probable cause may be based on the officer's personal knowledge, reliable
9 information conveyed by another officer, records of the Division, or other reliable source. The
10 seizing officer shall notify the executive agency designated pursuant to subsection (j) of this
11 section as soon as practical but no later than 24 hours after seizure of the motor vehicle of the
12 seizure in accordance with procedures established by the executive agency designated pursuant
13 to subsection (j) of this section.

14 (j) **Written Notification of Impoundment.** – Within 48 hours of receipt within regular
15 business hours of the notice of seizure, an executive agency designated by the Governor shall
16 issue written notification of impoundment to the Division, to any lienholder of record, and to
17 any motor vehicle owner who was not operating the motor vehicle at the time of the offense. A
18 notice of seizure received outside of regular business hours shall be considered to have been
19 received at the start of the next business day. The notification of impoundment shall be sent by
20 first-class mail to the most recent address contained in the Division's records. If the motor
21 vehicle is registered in another state, notice shall be sent to the address shown on the records of
22 the state where the motor vehicle is registered. This written notification shall provide notice
23 that the motor vehicle has been seized, state the reason for the seizure, and the procedure for
24 requesting release of the motor vehicle. Additionally, if the motor vehicle was damaged while
25 the defendant operator was committing an underlying offense or incident to the seizure, the
26 agency shall issue written notification of the seizure to the owner's insurance company of
27 record and to any other insurance companies that may be insuring other motor vehicles
28 involved in the accident. The Division shall prohibit title to a seized motor vehicle from being
29 transferred by a motor vehicle owner unless authorized by court order.

30 (k) **Additional Notification to Lienholders.** – In addition to providing written
31 notification pursuant to subsection (j) of this section, within eight hours of receipt within
32 regular business hours of the notice of seizure, the executive agency designated under
33 subsection (j) of this section shall notify by facsimile any lienholder of record that has provided
34 the executive agency with a designated facsimile number for notification of impoundment. The
35 facsimile notification of impoundment shall state that the vehicle has been seized, state the
36 reason for the seizure, and notify the lienholder of the additional written notification that will
37 be provided pursuant to subsection (j) of this section. The executive agency shall establish
38 procedures to allow a lienholder to provide one designated facsimile number for notification of
39 impoundment for any vehicle for which the lienholder is a lienholder of record and shall
40 maintain a centralized database of the provided facsimile numbers. The lienholder must provide
41 a facsimile number at which the executive agency may give notification of impoundment at any
42 time.

43 (l) **Review by Magistrate.** – Upon determining that there is probable cause for seizing a
44 motor vehicle, the seizing officer shall present to a magistrate within the county where the
45 driver was charged an affidavit of impoundment setting forth the basis upon which the motor
46 vehicle has been or will be seized for forfeiture. The magistrate shall review the affidavit of
47 impoundment and if the magistrate determines the requirements of this section have been met,
48 shall order the motor vehicle held. The magistrate may request additional information and may
49 hear from the defendant if the defendant is present. If the magistrate determines the
50 requirements of this section have not been met, the magistrate shall order the motor vehicle
51 released to a motor vehicle owner upon payment of towing and storage fees. If the motor

1 vehicle has not yet been seized, and the magistrate determines that seizure is appropriate, the
2 magistrate shall issue an order of seizure of the motor vehicle. The magistrate shall provide a
3 copy of the order of seizure to the clerk of court. The clerk shall provide copies of the order of
4 seizure to the district attorney and the attorney for the county board of education.

5 (m) Effecting an Order of Seizure. – An order of seizure shall be valid anywhere in the
6 State. Any officer with territorial jurisdiction and who has subject matter jurisdiction for
7 violations of this Chapter may use such force as may be reasonable to seize the motor vehicle
8 and to enter upon the property of the defendant to accomplish the seizure. An officer who has
9 probable cause to believe the motor vehicle is concealed or stored on private property of a
10 person other than the defendant may obtain a search warrant to enter upon that property for the
11 purpose of seizing the motor vehicle.

12 (n) Custody of Motor Vehicle. – Unless the motor vehicle is towed pursuant to a
13 statewide or regional contract, or a contract with the county board of education, the seized
14 motor vehicle shall be towed by a commercial towing company designated by the law
15 enforcement agency that seized the motor vehicle. Seized motor vehicles not towed pursuant to
16 a statewide or regional contract or a contract with a county board of education shall be retrieved
17 from the commercial towing company within a reasonable time, not to exceed 10 days, by the
18 county board of education or its agent who must pay towing and storage fees to the commercial
19 towing company when the motor vehicle is retrieved. If either a statewide or regional
20 contractor or the county board of education chooses to contract for local towing services, all
21 towing companies on the towing list for each law enforcement agency with jurisdiction within
22 the county shall be given written notice and an opportunity to submit proposals prior to a
23 contract for local towing services being awarded. The seized motor vehicle is under the
24 constructive possession of the county board of education for the county in which the operator
25 of the vehicle is charged at the time the vehicle is delivered to a location designated by the
26 county board of education or delivered to its agent pending release or sale, or in the event a
27 statewide or regional contract is in place, under the constructive possession of the Department
28 of Public Instruction, on behalf of the State at the time the vehicle is delivered to a location
29 designated by the Department of Public Instruction or delivered to its agent pending release or
30 sale. Absent a statewide or regional contract that provides otherwise, each county board of
31 education may elect to have seized motor vehicles stored on property owned or leased by the
32 county board of education and charge a reasonable fee for storage, not to exceed ten dollars
33 (\$10.00) per day. In the alternative, the county board of education may contract with a
34 commercial towing and storage facility or other private entity for the towing, storage, and
35 disposal of seized motor vehicles, and a storage fee of not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) per
36 day may be charged. Except for gross negligence or intentional misconduct, the county board
37 of education, or any of its employees, shall not be liable to the owner or lienholder for damage
38 to or loss of the motor vehicle or its contents, or to the owner of personal property in a seized
39 vehicle, during the time the motor vehicle is being towed or stored pursuant to this subsection.

40 (o) Release of Motor Vehicle Pending Trial. – A motor vehicle owner, other than the
41 driver at the time of the underlying offense resulting in the seizure, may apply to the clerk of
42 superior court in the county where the charges are pending for pretrial release of the motor
43 vehicle.

44 The clerk shall release the motor vehicle to a nondefendant motor vehicle owner
45 conditioned upon payment of all towing and storage charges incurred as a result of seizure and
46 impoundment of the motor vehicle under the following conditions:

47 (1) The motor vehicle has been seized for not less than 24 hours;

48 (2) A bond in an amount equal to the fair market value of the motor vehicle has
49 been executed and is secured by a cash deposit in the full amount of the
50 bond, by a recordable deed of trust to real property in the full amount of the
51 bond, by a bail bond under G.S. 58-71-1(2), or by at least one solvent surety,

1 payable to the county school fund and conditioned on return of the motor
2 vehicle, in substantially the same condition as it was at the time of seizure
3 and without any new or additional liens or encumbrances, on the day of any
4 hearing scheduled and noticed by the district attorney under subsection (c) of
5 this section unless the motor vehicle has been permanently released;

6 (3) Execution of an acknowledgment;

7 (4) A check of the records of the Division indicates that the requesting motor
8 vehicle owner has not previously executed an acknowledgment naming the
9 operator of the seized motor vehicle; and

10 (5) A bond posted to secure the release of this motor vehicle under this
11 subsection has not been previously ordered forfeited under subsection (z) of
12 this section.

13 In the event a nondefendant motor vehicle owner who obtains temporary possession of a
14 seized motor vehicle pursuant to this subsection does not return the motor vehicle on the day of
15 the forfeiture hearing as noticed by the district attorney under subsection (c) of this section or
16 otherwise violates a condition of pretrial release of the seized motor vehicle as set forth in this
17 subsection, the bond posted shall be ordered forfeited and an order of seizure shall be issued by
18 the court. Additionally, a nondefendant motor vehicle owner or lienholder who willfully
19 violates any condition of pretrial release may be held in civil or criminal contempt.

20 (p) Pretrial Release of Motor Vehicle to Innocent Owner. – A nondefendant motor
21 vehicle owner may file a petition with the clerk of court seeking a pretrial determination that
22 the petitioner is an innocent owner. The clerk shall consider the petition and make a
23 determination as soon as may be feasible. At any proceeding conducted pursuant to this
24 subsection, the clerk is not required to determine the issue of forfeiture, only the issue of
25 whether the petitioner is an innocent owner. If the clerk determines that the petitioner is an
26 innocent owner, the clerk shall release the motor vehicle to the petitioner subject to the same
27 conditions as if the petitioner were an innocent owner under subsection (f) of this section. The
28 clerk shall send a copy of the order authorizing or denying release of the vehicle to the district
29 attorney and the attorney for the county board of education. An order issued under this
30 subsection finding that the petitioner failed to establish that the petitioner is an innocent owner
31 may be reconsidered by the court as part of the forfeiture hearing conducted pursuant to
32 subsection (e) of this section.

33 (q) Pretrial Release of Motor Vehicle to Lienholder. –

34 (1) A lienholder may file a petition with the clerk of court requesting the court
35 to order pretrial release of a seized motor vehicle. The lienholder shall serve
36 a copy of the petition on all interested parties which shall include the motor
37 vehicle owner, the titled owner, the district attorney, and the county board of
38 education attorney. Upon 10 days' prior notice of the date, time, and location
39 of the hearing sent by the lienholder to all interested parties, a judge, after a
40 hearing, shall order a seized motor vehicle released to the lienholder
41 conditioned upon payment of all towing and storage costs incurred as a
42 result of the seizure and impoundment of the motor vehicle if the judge
43 determines, by the greater weight of the evidence, that:

44 a. Default on the obligation secured by the motor vehicle has occurred;

45 b. As a consequence of default, the lienholder is entitled to possession
46 of the motor vehicle;

47 c. The lienholder agrees to sell the motor vehicle in accordance with the
48 terms of its agreement and pursuant to the provisions of Part 6 of
49 Article 9 of Chapter 25 of the General Statutes. Upon sale of the
50 motor vehicle, the lienholder will pay to the clerk of court of the
51 county in which the driver was charged all proceeds from the sale,

1 less the amount of the lien in favor of the lienholder, and any towing
2 and storage costs paid by the lienholder;

3 d. The lienholder agrees not to sell, give, or otherwise transfer
4 possession of the seized motor vehicle while the motor vehicle is
5 subject to forfeiture, or the forfeited motor vehicle after the forfeiture
6 hearing, to the defendant or the motor vehicle owner; and

7 e. The seized motor vehicle while the motor vehicle is subject to
8 forfeiture, or the forfeited motor vehicle after the forfeiture hearing,
9 had not previously been released to the lienholder as a result of a
10 prior seizure involving the same defendant or motor vehicle owner.

11 (2) The clerk of superior court may order a seized vehicle released to the
12 lienholder conditioned upon payment of all towing and storage costs
13 incurred as a result of the seizure and impoundment of the motor vehicle at
14 any time when all interested parties have, in writing, waived any rights that
15 they may have to notice and a hearing, and the lienholder has agreed to the
16 provision of sub-subdivision (1)(d). of this subsection. A lienholder who
17 refuses to sell, give, or transfer possession of a seized motor vehicle while
18 the motor vehicle is subject to forfeiture, or a forfeited motor vehicle after
19 the forfeiture hearing, to:

20 a. The defendant;

21 b. The motor vehicle owner who owned the motor vehicle immediately
22 prior to seizure pending the forfeiture hearing, or to forfeiture after
23 the forfeiture hearing; or

24 c. Any person acting on the behalf of the defendant or the motor vehicle
25 owner shall not be liable for damages arising out of such refusal.
26 However, any subsequent violation of the conditions of release by
27 the lienholder shall be punishable by civil or criminal contempt.

28 (r) Insurance Proceeds. – In the event a motor vehicle is damaged incident to the
29 conduct of the defendant which gave rise to the seizure of a motor vehicle pursuant to this
30 section, the county board of education, or its authorized designee, is authorized to negotiate the
31 county board of education's interest with the insurance company and to compromise and accept
32 settlement of any claim for damages. Property insurance proceeds accruing to the defendant, or
33 other owner of the seized motor vehicle, shall be paid by the responsible insurance company
34 directly to the clerk of superior court in the county where the motor vehicle driver was charged.
35 If the motor vehicle is declared a total loss by the insurance company liable for the damages to
36 the motor vehicle, the clerk of superior court, upon application of the county board of
37 education, shall enter an order that the motor vehicle be released to the insurance company
38 upon payment into the court of all insurance proceeds for damage to the motor vehicle after
39 payment of towing and storage costs and all valid liens. The clerk of superior court shall
40 provide the Division with a certified copy of the order entered pursuant to this subsection, and
41 the Division shall transfer title to the insurance company or to such other person or entity as
42 may be designated by the insurance company. Insurance proceeds paid to the clerk of court
43 pursuant to this subsection shall be subject to forfeiture pursuant to subsection (z) of this
44 section and shall be disbursed pursuant to further orders of the court. An affected motor vehicle
45 owner or lienholder who objects to any agreed upon settlement under this subsection may file
46 an independent claim with the insurance company for any additional monies believed owed.
47 Notwithstanding any other provisions in this Chapter, nothing in this section shall require an
48 insurance company to make payments in excess of those required pursuant to its policy of
49 insurance on the seized motor vehicle.

50 (s) Expedited Sale of Seized Motor Vehicles in Certain Cases. – In order to avoid
51 additional liability for towing and storage costs pending resolution of the proceedings of the

1 defendant, the county board of education may, after expiration of 90 days from the date of
2 seizure, sell any motor vehicle having a fair market value of one thousand five hundred dollars
3 (\$1,500) or less. The county board of education may also sell a motor vehicle, regardless of the
4 fair market value, any time the outstanding towing and storage costs exceed eighty-five percent
5 (85%) of the fair market value of the vehicle, or with the consent of all the motor vehicle
6 owners. Any sale conducted pursuant to this subsection shall be conducted in accordance with
7 the provisions of subdivision (z)(1) of this section, and the proceeds of the sale, after the
8 payment of outstanding towing and storage costs or reimbursement of towing and storage costs
9 paid by a person other than the defendant, shall be deposited with the clerk of superior court. If
10 an order of forfeiture is entered by the court, the court shall order the proceeds held by the clerk
11 to be disbursed as provided in subdivision (z)(2) of this section. If the court determines that the
12 motor vehicle is not subject to forfeiture, the court shall order the proceeds held by the clerk to
13 be disbursed first to pay the sale, towing, and storage costs, second to pay outstanding liens on
14 the motor vehicle, and the balance to be paid to the motor vehicle owners.

15 (t) Retrieval of Certain Personal Property. – At reasonable times, the entity charged
16 with storing the motor vehicle may permit owners of personal property not affixed to the motor
17 vehicle to retrieve those items from the motor vehicle, provided satisfactory proof of ownership
18 of the motor vehicle or the items of personal property is presented to the storing entity.

19 (u) County Board of Education Right to Appear and Participate in Proceedings. – The
20 attorney for the county board of education shall be given notice of all proceedings regarding
21 underlying offenses related to a motor vehicle subject to forfeiture. However, the notice
22 requirement under this subsection does not apply to proceedings conducted under subsection
23 (p) of this section. The attorney for the county board of education shall also have the right to
24 appear and to be heard on all issues relating to the seizure, possession, release, forfeiture, sale,
25 and other matters related to the seized vehicle under this section. With the prior consent of the
26 county board of education, the district attorney may delegate to the attorney for the county
27 board of education any or all of the duties of the district attorney under this section. Clerks of
28 superior court, law enforcement agencies, and all other agencies with information relevant to
29 the seizure, impoundment, release, or forfeiture of motor vehicles are authorized and directed to
30 provide county boards of education with access to that information and to do so by electronic
31 means when existing technology makes this type of transmission possible.

32 (v) Payment of Fees Upon Conviction. – If the driver of a motor vehicle seized pursuant
33 to this section is convicted of an underlying offense, the defendant shall be ordered to pay as
34 restitution to the county board of education, the motor vehicle owner, or the lienholder the cost
35 paid or owing for the towing, storage, and sale of the motor vehicle to the extent the costs were
36 not covered by the proceeds from the forfeiture and sale of the motor vehicle. In addition, a
37 civil judgment for the costs under this section in favor of the party to whom the restitution is
38 owed shall be docketed by the clerk of superior court. If the defendant is sentenced to an active
39 term of imprisonment, the civil judgment shall become effective and be docketed when the
40 defendant's conviction becomes final. If the defendant is placed on probation, the civil
41 judgment in the amount found by a judge during the probation revocation or termination
42 hearing to be due shall become effective and be docketed by the clerk when the defendant's
43 probation is revoked or terminated.

44 (w) Trial Priority. – District court trials of underlying offenses involving forfeitures of
45 motor vehicles pursuant to this section shall be scheduled on the seizing officer's next court
46 date or within 30 days of the offense, whichever comes first. Once scheduled, the case shall not
47 be continued unless all of the following conditions are met:

48 (1) A written motion for continuance is filed with notice given to the opposing
49 party prior to the motion being heard.

50 (2) The judge makes a finding of a "compelling reason" for the continuance.

51 (3) The motion and finding are attached to the court case record.

1 Upon a determination of guilt, the issue of vehicle forfeiture shall be heard by the judge
2 immediately, or as soon thereafter as feasible, and the judge shall issue the appropriate orders
3 pursuant to subsection (e) of this section.

4 Should a defendant appeal the conviction to superior court, any party who has not
5 previously been heard on a petition for pretrial release under subsection (p) or (q) of this
6 section may be heard on a petition for pretrial release pursuant to subsection (p) or (q) of this
7 section. The provisions of subsection (o) of this section shall also apply to seized motor
8 vehicles pending trial in superior court. Where a motor vehicle was released pursuant to
9 subsection (o) of this section pending trial in district court, the release of the motor vehicle
10 continues, and the terms and conditions of the original bond remain the same as those required
11 for the initial release of the motor vehicle under subsection (o) of this section, pending the
12 resolution of the underlying offense involving impaired driving in superior court.

13 (x) Release of Impounded Motor Vehicles by Judge; Release Upon Conclusion of Trial.
14 – If the driver of a motor vehicle seized pursuant to this section (i) is subsequently not
15 convicted of an underlying offense due to dismissal or a finding of not guilty or (ii) the vehicle
16 has not previously been released to a lienholder pursuant to subsection (q) of this section, the
17 seized motor vehicle or insurance proceeds held by the clerk of court pursuant to subsection (d)
18 or (r) of this section shall be released to the motor vehicle owner conditioned upon payment of
19 towing and storage costs. The court shall not waive the payment of towing and storage costs.
20 The court shall include in its order notice to the owner of the seized motor vehicle still being
21 held, that within 30 days of the date of the court's order, the owner must make payment of the
22 outstanding towing and storage costs for the motor vehicle and retrieve the motor vehicle, or
23 give notice to Division of Motor Vehicles requesting a judicial hearing on the validity of any
24 mechanics' lien on the motor vehicle for towing and storage costs.

25 (y) Notwithstanding G.S. 44A-2(d), if the owner of the seized motor vehicle does not
26 obtain release of the vehicle within 30 days from the date of the court's order, the possessor of
27 the seized motor vehicle has a mechanics' lien on the seized motor vehicle for the full amount
28 of the towing and storage charges incurred since the motor vehicle was seized and may dispose
29 of the seized motor vehicle pursuant to Article 1 of Chapter 44A of the General Statutes. Notice
30 of the right to a judicial hearing on the validity of the mechanics' lien given to the owner of the
31 motor vehicle in open court in accordance with subsection (x) of this section or delivery to the
32 owner of the vehicle of a copy of the court's order entered in accordance with subsection (x) of
33 this section shall satisfy the notice requirement of G.S. 44A-4(b).

34 (z) Forfeiture of Impounded Motor Vehicle or Funds. –

35 (1) Sale. – A motor vehicle ordered forfeited and sold or a seized motor vehicle
36 authorized to be sold pursuant to subsection (s) of this section, shall be sold
37 at a public sale conducted in accordance with the provisions of Article 12 of
38 Chapter 160A of the General Statutes, applicable to sales authorized
39 pursuant to G.S. 160A-266(a)(2), (3), or (4), subject to the notice
40 requirements of this subsection, and shall be conducted by the county board
41 of education or a person acting on its behalf. Notice of sale, including the
42 date, time, location, and manner of sale, shall be given by first-class mail to
43 all motor vehicle owners of the vehicle to be sold at the address shown by
44 the records of the Division. Written notice of sale shall also be given to all
45 lienholders on file with the Division. Notice of sale shall be given to the
46 Division in accordance with the procedures established by the Division.
47 Notices required to be given under this subdivision shall be mailed at least
48 10 days prior to the date of sale. A lienholder shall be permitted to purchase
49 the motor vehicle at any such sale by bidding in the amount of its lien, if that
50 should be the highest bid, without being required to tender any additional
51 funds, other than the towing and storage fees. The county board of

1 education, or its agent, shall not sell, give, or otherwise transfer possession
2 of the forfeited motor vehicle to the defendant, the motor vehicle owner who
3 owned the motor vehicle immediately prior to forfeiture, or any person
4 acting on the defendant's or motor vehicle owner's behalf.

5 (2) Proceeds of sale. – Proceeds of any sale conducted under this section or
6 subdivision (g)(5) of this section shall first be applied to the cost of sale and
7 then to satisfy towing and storage costs. The balance of the proceeds of sale,
8 if any, shall be used to satisfy any other existing liens of record that were
9 properly recorded prior to the date of initial seizure of the vehicle. Any
10 remaining balance shall be paid to the county school fund in the county in
11 which the motor vehicle was ordered forfeited. If there is more than one
12 school board in the county, then the net proceeds of sale, after
13 reimbursement to the county board of education of reasonable administrative
14 costs incurred in connection with the forfeiture and sale of the motor vehicle,
15 shall be distributed in the same manner as fines and other forfeitures. The
16 sale of a motor vehicle pursuant to this section shall be deemed to extinguish
17 all existing liens on the motor vehicle and the motor vehicle shall be
18 transferred free and clear of any liens.

19 (3) Retention of motor vehicle. – A board of education may, at its option, retain
20 any forfeited motor vehicle for its use upon payment of towing and storage
21 costs. If the motor vehicle is retained, any valid lien of record at the time of
22 the initial seizure of the motor vehicle shall be satisfied by the county board
23 of education relieving the motor vehicle owner of all liability for the
24 obligation secured by the motor vehicle. If there is more than one school
25 board in the county, and the motor vehicle is retained by a board of
26 education, then the fair market value of the motor vehicle, less the costs for
27 towing, storage, reasonable administrative costs, and liens paid, shall be used
28 to determine and pay the share due each of the school boards in the same
29 manner as fines and other forfeitures.

30 (4) Order of forfeiture; appeals. – An order of forfeiture is stayed pending
31 appeal of a conviction for an offense that is the basis for the order. When the
32 conviction of an offense that is the basis for an order of forfeiture is appealed
33 from district court, the issue of forfeiture shall be heard in superior court de
34 novo. Appeal from a final order of forfeiture shall be to the Court of
35 Appeals."

37 **PART XI. EFFECTIVE DATE**

38 **SECTION 11.** Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, and 10 of this act become effective December 1,
39 2013, and apply to offenses committed on or after that date. Sections 7 and 9 of this act become
40 effective October 1, 2013. Except as otherwise provided, the remainder of this act is effective
41 when it becomes law.
