- 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. CLASS SIZE REQUIREMENT PHASE IN

SECTION 1.(a) Section 8.33(b) of S.L. 2016-96 is repealed.

9 SECTION 1.(b) Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-301, as amended by this act and any 10 other provision of law, for the 2017-2018 school year, the average class size for kindergarten 11 through third grade in a local school administrative unit shall not exceed 20 students. At the 12 end of the second school month and for the remainder of the school year, the size of an 13 individual class in kindergarten through third grade shall not exceed 23 students. The class size 14 requirements set forth in G.S. 115C-301, as amended by this act, shall apply beginning with the 15 2018-2019 school year.

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PART II. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS AND ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 115C-47(10) reads as rewritten:

- "(10) To Assure Appropriate Class Size. It shall be the responsibility of local boards of education to assure that the class size requirements set forth in G.S. 115C-301 for kindergarten through third grade are met. Any teacher who believes that the requirements of G.S. 115C-301 have not been met shall make a report to the principal and superintendent, and the superintendent shall immediately determine whether the requirements have in fact not been met. If the superintendent determines the requirements have not been met, he or she shall make a report to the next local board of education meeting. The local board of education shall take action to meet the requirements of the statute. If the local board cannot organizationally correct the exception, it shall immediately apply to the State Board of Education for additional personnel or a waiver of the class size requirements, as provided in G.S. 115C-301(g).
- 32Upon notification from the State Board of Education that the reported33exception does not qualify for an allotment adjustment or a waiver under34provisions of G.S. 115C-301, the local board, within 30 days, shall take35action necessary to correct the exception.exception, as required in36G.S. 115C-301(g).



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1	At the end of the second month of September and end of February of				
2	each school year, the local board of education, through the superintendent,				
3	shall file a report with the State Board of Education, Superintendent of Public				
4	Instruction, in a format prescribed by the State Board of Education,				
5	Superintendent of Public Instruction, describing the organization of each				
6	school, the duties of each teacher, and the size of each class.for each school				
7	in the local school administrative unit, as required by G.S. 115C-301(f). As				
8	of February 1 each year, local boards of education, through the

11	In addition to assuring that the requirements of G.S. 115C-301 are met,				
12	each local board of education shall also have the duty to provide an adequate				
13	number of classrooms to meet the requirements of that statute."				
14	SECTION 2.(b) G.S. 115C-301 reads as rewritten:				
15	"§ 115C-301. Allocation of teachers; class size.				
16	(a) Request for Funds. – The State Board of Education, based upon the reports of local				
17	boards of education and such other information as the State Board may require from local				
18	boards, shall determine for each local school administrative unit the number of teachers and				
19	other instructional personnel to be included in the State budget request.				
20	(b) Allocation of Positions. – The State Board of Education is authorized to adopt rules				
21	to allot instructional personnel and teachers, within funds appropriated.				
22	(c) Maximum Class Size for Kindergarten Through Third Grade. – The average class				
23	size for kindergarten through third grade in a local school administrative unit shall at no time				
24	exceed the funded allotment ratio of teachers to students in kindergarten through third grade. At				
25	the end of the second school month and for the remainder of the school year, the size of an				
26	individual class in kindergarten through third grade shall not exceed the allotment ratio by more				
27 28	than three students. The funded class size allotment ratio for kindergarten through third grade				
28 29	shall be as follows: (1) For kindergarten, one teacher per 18 students.				
29 30	 For kindergarten, one teacher per 18 students. For first grade, one teacher per 16 students. 				
31	(3) For second grade, one teacher per 10 students.				
32	(4) For third grade, one teacher per 17 students.				
33	In grades four through 12, local school administrative units shall have the maximum				
33 34	flexibility to use allotted teacher positions to maximize student achievement.

36	(f) <u>Second MonthBiannual</u> Reports. – At the end of the second monthSeptember and				
37	end of February of each school year, each local board of education, through the superintendent,				
38	shall file a report report, based on information provided by the principal, for each school within				
39	the local school administrative unit with the State Board of Education. Superintendent of Public				
40	<u>Instruction</u> . The report shall be filed in a format prescribed by the State Board of				
41	EducationSuperintendent of Public Instruction and shall include the organization for each				
42	school, school in the local school administrative unit, including the following information:				
43	(1) For each class in each grade level at each school, the following:

16 PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 3. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes
 law and applies beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.
