- Has an energizer that is powered by a commercial storage battery that is not <u>(3)</u> more than 12 volts of direct current.
- Has an energizer that meets the standards established by the most current <u>(4)</u> version of the International Electrotechnical Commission Standard 60335-2-76.
- Is surrounded by a non-electric perimeter fence or wall that is not less than 5 <u>(5)</u> feet in height.
- Does not exceed 10 feet in height or 2 feet higher than the non-electric (6) perimeter fence or wall, whichever is higher.
- Is marked with conspicuous warning signs that are located on the <u>(7)</u> battery-charged security fence at not more than 30-foot intervals and read: "WARNING—ELECTRIC FENCE"."
- **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law.

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
