2	(a) Program. – There is established the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Program to be					
3	administered by the System Office of The University of North Carolina, in conjunction with the					
4	Authority and the Commission. The purpose of the Program is to recruit, prepare, and support					
5	students residing in or attending institutions of higher education located in North Carolina for					
6	preparation as highly effective STEM or special education teachers in the State's public schools.					
7	The Program shall be used to provide a forgivable loan to individuals interested in preparing to					
8	teach in the public schools of the State in STEM or special education licensure areas. State.					
9	(b) Trust Fund. – There is established the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Program					
10	Trust Fund to be administered by the Authority, in conjunction with the System Office of The					
11	University of North Carolina. All funds (i) appropriated to, or otherwise received by, the Program					
12	for forgivable loans and other Program purposes, (ii) received as repayment of forgivable loans,					
13	and (iii) earned as interest on these funds shall be placed in the Trust Fund. The purpose of the					
14	Trust Fund is to provide financial assistance to qualified students for completion of teacher					
15	education and licensure programs to fill STEM or special education licensure areas positions in					
16	the public schools of the State.					
17	(c) Uses of Monies in the Trust Fund. – The monies in the Trust Fund may be used only					
18	for (i) forgivable loans granted under the Program, (ii) administrative costs associated with the					
19	Program, including recruitment and recovery of funds advanced under the Program, (iii)					
20	mentoring and coaching support to forgivable loan recipients, and (iv) extracurricular					
21	enhancement activities of the Program in accordance with the following:

37	remain in teaching but to provide leadership for tomorrow's schools.

40	<u>c.</u> The sum of up to five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the Director of the Program to implement the recruitment activities					
40 41	identified in subsection (d) of this section.					
42	(2) The Authority may use the greater of two hundred fifty thousand dollars					
43	(\$250,000) or four percent (4%) of the funds appropriated to the Trust Fund					
44	each fiscal year for administrative costs associated with the Program.					
45	(3) The Authority shall provide the Commission with up to six hundred thousand					
46	dollars (\$600,000) from the Trust Fund in each fiscal year for the Commission					
47	to provide mentoring and coaching support to forgivable loan recipients					
48	through the North Carolina New Teacher Support Program in an amount of					
49	up to two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200) for each Program recipient.					
50	Funds shall be prioritized for teachers serving in North Carolina public					
51	schools identified as low-performing under G.S. 115C-105.37.

1 2	(d) Director of the Program. – The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall appoint a Director of the Program. The Director shall appoint staff to the			
3	Commission and shall be responsible for recruitment and coordination of the Program, including			
4	proactive, aggressive, and strategic recruitment of potential recipients. Recruitment activities			
5	shall include (i) targeting regions of the State with the highest teacher attrition rates and teacher			
6	recruitment challenges, (ii) actively engaging with educators, business leaders, experts in human			
7	resources, elected officials, and other community leaders throughout the State, and (iii) attracting			
8	candidates in STEM and special education licensure areas to the Program. The Director shall			
9	report to the President of The University of North Carolina. The Authority shall provide office			
10	space and clerical support staff, as necessary, to the Director for the Program.			
11	(e) Student Selection Criteria for Forgivable Loans. – The Commission shall adopt			
12	stringent standards for awarding forgivable loans based on multiple measures to ensure that only			
13	the strongest applicants receive them, including the following:			
14	(1) Grade point averages.			
15	 Performance on relevant career and college readiness assessments. Emails and a start of the particular and a start of the particul			
16 17	(3) Experience, accomplishments, and other criteria demonstrating qualities			
17	positively correlated with highly effective teachers, including excellent verbal			
18 19	and communication skills.			
19 20	(4) Demonstrated commitment to serve in a STEM or special education licensure			
20 21	(f) Program Selection Criteria. – The Authority shall administer the Program in			
21	cooperation with each constituent institution of The University of North Carolina and up to eight			
22	four institutions of higher education with approved educator preparation programs selected by			
23 24	the Commission that represent a diverse selection of both postsecondary constituent institutions			
25	of The University of North Carolina and private postsecondary institutions operating in the State.			
26	The Commission shall adopt stringent standards for selection of the most effective educator			
27	preparation programs, including the following:			
28	(1) Demonstrates high rates of educator effectiveness on value-added models and			
29	teacher evaluations, including using performance-based, subject-specific			
30	assessment and support systems, such as edTPA or other metrics of evaluating			
31	candidate effectiveness that have predictive validity.			
32	(2) Demonstrates measurable impact of prior graduates on student learning,			
33	including impact of graduates teaching in STEM or special education			
34	licensure areas.learning.			
35	(3) Demonstrates high rates of graduates passing exams required for teacher			
36	licensure.			
37	(4) Provides curricular and co-curricular enhancements in leadership, facilitates			
38	learning for diverse learners, and promotes community engagement,			
39	classroom management, and reflection and assessment.			
40	(5) Requires at least a minor concentration of study in the subject area that the			
41	candidate may teach.			
42	(6) Provides early and frequent internship or practical experiences, including the			
43	opportunity for participants to perform practicums in diverse school			
44	environments.			
45	(7) Is approved by the State Board of Education as an educator preparation

3	(a) Notes. – All forgivable loans shall be evidenced by notes made payable to the				
4	Authority that bear interest at a rate not to exceed ten percent (10%) per year as set by the				
5	Authority and beginning on the first day of September after the completion of the program				
6	leading to teacher licensure or 90 days after graduation, whichever is later. If a forgivable loan is				
7	terminated, the note shall be made payable to the Authority 90 days after termination of the				
8	forgivable loan. The forgivable loan may be terminated upon the recipient's withdrawal from the				
9	Program or by the recipient's failure to meet the standards set by the Commission.				
10	(b) Forgiveness. – The Authority shall forgive the loan and any interest accrued on the				
11	loan if, within 10 years after graduation from a program leading to teacher licensure, exclusive				
12	of any authorized deferment for extenuating circumstances, the recipient serves as a teacher in a				
13	STEM or special education licensure area, as provided in G.S. 116-209.62(h), North Carolina				
14	public school for every year the teacher was awarded the forgivable loan, in any combination of				
15	the following:				
16	(1) <u>One year Six months at a North Carolina public school identified as</u>				
17	low-performing under G.S. 115C-105.37 at the time the teacher accepts				
18	employment at the school or, if the teacher changes employment during this				
19	period, at another school identified as low-performing.				
20	(2) <u>Two years One year at a North Carolina public school not identified as</u>				
21	low-performing under G.S. 115C-105.37.				
22	The Authority shall also forgive the loan if it finds that it is impossible for the recipient to				
23	work for up to eight four years, within 10 years after completion of the program leading to teacher				
24	licensure, at a North Carolina public school because of the death or permanent disability of the				
25	recipient. If the recipient repays the forgivable loan by cash payments, all indebtedness shall be				
26	repaid within 10 years after completion of the program leading to teacher licensure supported by				
27	the forgivable loan. If the recipient completes a program leading to teacher licensure, payment				
28	of principal and interest shall begin no later than the first day of September after the completion				
29	of the program. Should a recipient present extenuating circumstances, the Authority may extend				
30	the period to repay the loan in cash to no more than a total of 12 years."				
31	SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2023, and applies to applications				
32	for the award of funds beginning in the 2024-2025 academic year.
