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1 (a) The Opportunity Scholarship Grant Fund Reserve is established as a reserve to be 2 administered by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina for the purpose of 3 allocating funds to the Authority for the award of scholarship grants in accordance with this Part. 4 The **Reserve**-Grant Fund shall consist of monies appropriated from the General Fund to the 5 Reserve Grant Fund by the General Assembly and any interest accrued to it thereon. These funds 6 shall be used to award scholarship grants to eligible students for the school year that begins in 7 the fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the appropriation is made to the Reserve.
