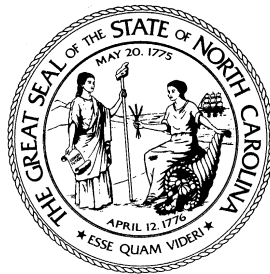

TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA:

The General Assembly adopted the General Statutes as the general law in North Carolina in 1943 and at the time assigned to the Division of Legislative Drafting and Codification of Statutes of the Attorney General's Office the duty of keeping the laws as clear and concise as possible by means of continuous statutory research and correction.

The General Statutes Commission was created by the General Assembly in 1945 for the purpose of advising the Division of Legislative Drafting in its continuous statutory research and correction, in the publication of the General Statutes, and in making a continuing study of all matters involved in the preparation and publication of modern codes of law. In 1951, the General Assembly expressly authorized the General Statutes Commission to recommend substantive changes in the law. In 1981, the General Assembly expressly authorized the General Statutes Commission to receive and consider proposed changes in the law recommended by The American Law Institute, by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws (also known as the Uniform Law Commission), or by other learned bodies.

Effective June 1, 2011, the General Assembly transferred the General Statutes Commission and its staff and the remaining functions of the Division of Legislative Drafting and Codification of Statutes from the Department of Justice to the General Assembly. The transfer was made by Session Law 2011-97. Under that session law, the Commission is located within the General Assembly for administrative purposes but continues to exercise all its prescribed statutory powers independently.

MEMBERSHIP AND MEETINGS OF THE COMMISSION DURING THE BIENNIUM

Eleven members were reappointed during the biennium. Professor Richard T. Bowser of Raleigh was reappointed by the Dean of Campbell University School of Law. Mr. Peter G. Pappas of Greensboro was reappointed by the President of the North Carolina Bar Association. Representative Ted Davis, Jr., of Wilmington was reappointed by the Speaker of the House. Mr. Marc D. Bishop of Greensboro was reappointed by the Governor. Mr. Carlton M. Mansfield of Pembroke was reappointed by the Governor. Senator Chuck Edwards of Flat Rock was reappointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Professor John J. Korzen of Kernersville was reappointed by the Dean of Wake Forest University School of Law. Ms. Sabra J. Faires of Cary was reappointed by the General Statutes Commission. Professor Susan E. Hauser of Raleigh was reappointed by the Dean of North Carolina Central University School of Law. Mr. Starkey Sharp of Kitty Hawk was reappointed by the President of the North Carolina State Bar. Professor Lewis Moore Everett of Durham was reappointed by the Dean of The University of North Carolina School of Law.

Two new members were appointed during the biennium. Professor Jane R. Wettach of Durham was appointed by the Dean of Duke University School of Law to replace Ms. Marguerite I. Most of Hillsborough. Professor Vanessa Zborek of Winston-Salem was appointed by the Dean of Elon University School of Law to replace Professor Andrew J. Haile of Summerfield.

Ms. Kama Bethel Pierce of Matthews served as a member of the General Statutes Commission until her term expired on May 31, 2019. Ms. Pierce was appointed by the Governor to fill the unexpired term of Professor Robert O. Jenkins of Raleigh who resigned from the Commission on September 19, 2017, due to the closing of the Charlotte School of Law.

The General Statutes Commission meets regularly on the first Friday of each month except July and August. Special meetings may be called by the chairman or by any two members of the Commission whenever the work of the Commission requires. PUBLICATION OF THE GENERAL STATUTES

A 2019 replacement set of the General Statutes of North Carolina, consisting of 27 volumes plus two index volumes (volumes 28 and 29), was published in December 2019. The 27 volumes in the 2019 replacement set include two additional volumes that resulted from the splitting of former volumes 1 through 3 into new volumes 1 through 5 to reduce the size of the volumes. The 2017 replacement set consisted of 25 volumes plus two index volumes.

The 2019 replacement set contains the general laws of a permanent nature enacted by the General Assembly through Session Laws 2019-227 of the 2019 Regular Session. General laws of a permanent nature enacted by later session laws from the 2019 Regular Session were included in the 2020 Interim Supplement.

A 2019 edition of the Annotated Rules of North Carolina was published in December 2018, and a supplement was published in May 2019.

A 2020 Interim Supplement to the 2019 replacement set of the General Statutes of North Carolina, consisting of two volumes, and a 2020 Replacement Index, consisting of two volumes, were published in October 2020. The 2020 Interim Supplement is a cumulative supplement that contains the acts of a general and permanent nature enacted by the General Assembly in Session Laws 2019-228 through 2020-1 of the 2019 Regular Session and Session Laws 2020-2 through 2020-94 of the 2020 Regular Session.

A 2020 edition of the Annotated Rules of North Carolina was published in December 2019, and a supplement was published in May 2020.

A 2021 edition of the Annotated Rules of North Carolina was published in December 2020,

and a supplement will be published in May 2021.

COMMITTEES OF THE GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION

The General Statutes Commission has the following committees of experts to assist it in work on major projects.

Trusts Drafting Committee

The General Statutes Commission originally created this Committee in 1973 to draft a revision of the trust laws of the State. The Committee's initial project was a revision of Chapter 36 of the General Statutes, containing the trust statutes of North Carolina, which was enacted as Chapter 685 of the 1977 Session Laws. Since that time, the Committee has continually provided the General Statutes Commission with expertise in the areas of estates, trusts, and property and has prepared legislative proposals for the Commission's consideration; many of these have been enacted by the General Assembly. Members of the Committee during the biennium were Professor James B. McLaughlin, Jr., Mr. J. Stanley Atwell, and Mr. Thomas F. Wiggins. The Revisor of Statutes serves as an ex officio member of the Committee.

Partition Task Force

The General Statutes Commission created the Partition Task Force in 2017 to study various issues relating to the partition of property and to make an initial review of and recommendation regarding the Uniform Partition of Heirs Property Act as approved by the Uniform Law Commission in 2010. In August 2017, the Task Force submitted a report setting out various recommendations for the Commission's consideration. Since that time, members of the Task Force have continually provided the Commission with expertise in the area of partition of property and have recommended legislative proposals for the Commission's consideration in its effort to recodify and update the existing partition statutes. Members of the Task Force during the biennium were Mr. Starkey Sharp, Professor Judith Welch Wegner, Mr. Paul Stam, and Mr. C. Thomas Steele, Jr. After considering the Partition Task Force's recommendations, the Commission recommended a legislative proposal to modernize the partition of property statutes, which the General Assembly enacted as S.L. 2020-23.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER GROUPS

The General Statutes Commission has cooperated and coordinated with the North Carolina General Assembly, North Carolina Conference of Clerks of Superior Court, North Carolina Association of Registers of Deeds, North Carolina Department of the Secretary of State, North Carolina Office of the Commissioner of Banks, North Carolina Department of Transportation, North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation, North Carolina Administrative Office of the Courts, North Carolina Bankers Association, North Carolina Bar Association, North Carolina League of Municipalities, North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, John Locke Foundation, North Carolina Credit Union League, North Carolina Home Builders Association, University of

North Carolina School of Government, North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, North Carolina Medical Care Commission, North Carolina Cemetery Commission, Private Protective Services Board, Alarm Systems Licensing Board, State Board of Examiners for Nursing Home Administrators, State Board of Examiners of Electrical Contractors, North Carolina State Board of Dental Examiners, North Carolina State Board of Examiners in Optometry, State Board of Environmental Health Specialist Examiners, and others. The Commission continues its interest in the work of the Uniform Law Commission and The American Law Institute.

The General Statutes Commission has continued its efforts to circulate its proposals among individuals and groups believed to be interested in the various topics considered by the Commission.

The General Statutes Commission welcomes and solicits recommendations from any source as to areas for further legislation. STUDIES DIRECTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The General Assembly directed the General Statutes Commission to study the following two issues:

Study of Crimes Defined by Ordinance or Rule

Section 6 of S.L. 2019-198, as amended by Section 4.35(a) of S.L. 2020-3, directed the General Statutes Commission to study “the reports received [by the Joint Legislative Administrative Procedure Oversight Committee pursuant to S.L. 2018-69, as amended by S.L. 2019-198] and make recommendations regarding whether any conduct currently criminalized either (i) by an ordinance of a county, city, town, or metropolitan sewerage district or (ii) in the North Carolina Administrative Code by an agency, board, or commission, should have criminal penalties provided by a generally applicable State law.” The Commission was directed to “report to the 2021 General Assembly and to the Joint [Legislative] Oversight Committee on General Government on or before March 1, 2021.”

The Commission opened a docket on this study and spent several meetings studying this issue. This year, the Commission will file a report with the General Assembly and the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on General Government. The report will contain an executive summary, background information, a summary of the proceedings of the Commission, the findings

of the Commission, and the following recommendations:

1. The Commission recommends the establishment of a criminal code recodification commission. The Commission believes that such a commission, consisting of persons with expertise in criminal law, would be better suited than is the General Statutes Commission to study and make recommendations regarding the State's criminal laws.

2. The Commission recommends the enactment of a legislative proposal included as an appendix to the report and entitled, "AN ACT TO ELIMINATE PROVISIONS THAT BROADLY CRIMINALIZE VIOLATIONS OF RULES OF CERTAIN LICENSING BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS AND TO MAKE TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING AMENDMENTS IN THE SURROUNDING LANGUAGE, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION."

Study of Planning and Development Regulations

Section 2.10 of S.L. 2019-111 (Senate Bill 355, Land-Use Regulatory Changes) provides:

If Part II of this act becomes law in 2019, it is the intent of the General Assembly that legislation contained in Part I of this act or in other acts enacted in the 2019 Regular Session of the 2019 General Assembly, or [sic] that affects statutes repealed and replaced by similar provisions in Chapter 160D of the General Statutes, as enacted by Part II of this act, also be incorporated into Chapter 160D of the General Statutes. It is the further intent of the General Assembly that legislation contained in the telecommunications provisions of Part II of this act makes no substantive policy changes from the statutes repealed.

Section 2.10 also directs the General Statutes Commission to "study the need for legislation to accomplish this intent and [to] report its findings and recommendations, including any legislative proposals, to the 2020 Regular Session of the 2019 General Assembly."

The Commission opened a docket on this study and spent several meetings studying this issue. On May 7, 2020, the Commission filed a report with the General Assembly. The report contains an introduction, a summary of the proceedings of the Commission, the findings of the Commission, and a recommendation to enact a legislative proposal entitled, "AN ACT TO COMPLETE THE CONSOLIDATION OF LAND USE PROVISIONS INTO ONE CHAPTER OF THE GENERAL STATUTES AS DIRECTED BY S.L. 2019-111, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION." The General Assembly enacted this legislative proposal as S.L. 2020-25.

RECOMMENDED LEGISLATION, 2021

During the biennium, the General Statutes Commission has received suggestions for statutory changes from various sources including practicing attorneys, State officials and agencies, and from its Trusts Drafting Committee, its Partition Task Force, and its own membership. In addition, the Commission has from time to time undertaken studies of specific areas of the law to determine the need for statutory change. The Commission reviewed all suggested changes and docketed those that it believed warranted further consideration. Some have resulted in recommended bills, and others are still under consideration.

The proposals set out below have been considered by the Commission and found to warrant recommendation to the General Assembly. A brief description of each proposal is set out and, in addition, a separate memorandum for each proposal will be made available to the members of the General Assembly.

The Commission, acting pursuant to G.S. 164-13, therefore recommends enactment of proposals in the following areas:

1. **An act to provide that in a tax foreclosure action a commissioner's fee shall not be included in the amount necessary to redeem the real property during the period between the date of sale and the judgment confirming the sale and make technical changes.** This proposal amends G.S. 105-374, concerning the foreclosure of a tax lien in the nature of an action to foreclose a mortgage, to provide that a commissioner's fee shall not be included in the amount necessary to redeem the real property during the period between the date of sale and the judgment confirming the sale. The proposal also amends G.S. 105-373, concerning settlements of tax collectors, and G.S. 105-378, concerning limitation on use of remedies, to remove obsolete language concerning tax lien sales. The proposal further makes technical changes to the affected statutes.

2. **An act to update the mailing method of notice to a judgment debtor of an execution sale of real property.** This proposal amends G.S. 1-339.54, concerning notice to a judgment debtor of an execution sale of real property, to allow the sheriff to send a copy of the notice of execution sale by registered mail or certified mail, return receipt requested, to the judgment debtor's last address. The proposal also makes technical changes to the affected statute.

3. **An act to provide that a settlement agent may disburse settlement proceeds in reliance on a check drawn on the account of or issued by a licensed mortgage lender, to make amendments relating to the North Carolina Commercial Receivership Act, and to make technical changes to various laws regulating financial practices.** This proposal amends the

Good Funds Settlement Act to provide that a settlement agent may disburse settlement proceeds in reliance on a check drawn on the account of or issued by a licensed mortgage lender. This amendment was requested by the Office of the Commissioner of Banks. The proposal also makes amendments relating to the North Carolina Commercial Receivership Act, many of which were requested by the Bankruptcy Section of the North Carolina Bar Association. The proposal also makes technical changes to various laws regulating financial practices.

(GSC DN 18-9)

4. **An act to eliminate provisions that broadly criminalize violations of rules of certain licensing boards and commissions and to make technical and conforming amendments in the surrounding language.** This proposal eliminates provisions that broadly criminalize violations of rules of the following licensing boards and commissions: State Banking Commission, Cemetery Commission, Private Protective Services Board, Alarm Systems Licensing Board, State Board of Examiners of Electrical Contractors, State Board of Dental Examiners, State Board of Examiners in Optometry, Board of Examiners for Nursing Home Administrators, State Board of Environmental Health Specialist Examiners, and Medical Care Commission. A draft of the proposal was circulated to these boards and commissions, which have no objections known to the General Statutes Commission as of the date of this biennial report. The proposal also makes technical and conforming amendments to the affected statutes.

5. **An act to clarify the trust exclusion to the rule against perpetuities and make technical changes in the surrounding language.** This proposal would implement a recommendation of the Estate Planning and Fiduciary Law Section of the North Carolina Bar Association to revise North Carolina's Uniform Statutory Rule Against Perpetuities Act to clarify that the Rule does not apply to nonvested property interests or powers of appointment over property or property interests of trusts to which G.S. 41-23 ("Perpetuities and suspension of power of alienation for trusts") applies. Specifically, the proposal clarifies that if G.S. 41-23 governs the validity of a trust, then G.S. 41-15 ("Statutory rule against perpetuities") does not apply to nonvested property interests in or fiduciary or nonfiduciary powers of appointment over property or interests in property of that trust. The proposal also makes technical changes to the affected statutes.

6. **An act to update the definitions of "terms of a trust" and "trust instrument" and revise the article on power holders of trusts.** This proposal would implement recommendations of the Estate Planning and Fiduciary Law Section of the North Carolina Bar Association to update the definitions of "terms of a trust" and "trust instrument" in the North Carolina Uniform Trust Code and to amend Article 8A of the Trust Code on power holders of trusts to expand the definition of "power holder" and the power of a power holder, to elaborate on the duties and liabilities of a power holder and a trustee, and to provide default rules regarding

limitations of actions against power holders, defenses in actions against power holders, vacancies in the office of power holders, and bonds of power holders.

7. **An act to clarify the effects of a default bid in private judicial sales and public or private partition sales.** This proposal clarifies that a defaulting bidder is liable on the bid in a private judicial sale, like in a public judicial sale, and that in a partition sale, any party to the partition proceeding or the officer or person designated to make the sale may petition the court to revoke its order of confirmation if the purchaser has defaulted on the purchaser's bid.

8. **An act to remove the location requirement for holographic wills to align North Carolina with all other states recognizing holographic wills.** This proposal amends G.S. 28A-2A-9 (Manner of probate of holographic will) and G.S. 31-3.4 (Holographic will) to remove the location requirement for holographic wills to align North Carolina with all other states recognizing holographic wills. The proposal has been circulated to the North Carolina Bar Association, the North Carolina Conference of Clerks of Superior Court, and others. There is no opposition known to the General Statutes Commission as of the date of this biennial report. The proposal also makes technical changes to the affected statutes.

In addition to these proposals, the Commission recommends for introduction its usual technical corrections bill, which corrects errors in grammar, erroneous statutory references, and other obvious errors and makes other technical changes in the General Statutes.
