

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HUNGER IN NORTH CAROLINA

More than **2 million of our neighbors in NC live with food insecurity**—the lack of continuous access to the basic food required for a healthy life. That is **almost 22%** of our state population.

North Carolina and Louisiana lead the nation with the **highest percentage of children under 5 years of age who are food insecure** on a regular basis: 1 in 4 (23.5%).

THE RESPONSE

North Carolina's **Feeding America Food Banks** represent the **largest private sector response to hunger** in our state.

During FY2011-12, **North Carolina's Feeding America Food Banks** distributed more than **130 million pounds of nutritious food** and other grocery products, the **equivalent of nearly 110 million meals**.

Corporate partners, donors and volunteers contribute generously in time, money and donated food throughout the year. Food banks rely on **these private donations and volunteers to get the food distributed through our statewide network of 2,300 partners** (local pantries, soup kitchens, emergency shelters, etc.).

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Donate money — With our donor and volunteer network **we can turn 95 cents of every dollar donated into providing food** to those in need. **Money** also enables us **purchase healthy produce, and foods** that have not been donated.
